Legionaires keep pace with three more wins

Milton major atom Legionaires are keeping pace with the Milton Tridents in winning three games in Tri-County play and extended their unbeaten streak to 19 games.
On Sunday they hosted a hard-hitting Brampton squad and had little trouble disposing of their visitors by a 7-0 score. Steve Scannell was Milton's big shooter as Darren Shaw and Sean Davidson made excellent moves and passing plays to set him for the hat trick.
Milton's defence was evident as they halted Brampton attackers with jolting hits, causing them to lose control of the puck.
In two other contests the Legion defeated Flamborough 7-0 and Dundas 4-1. Back in Milton Memorial, the Legion atoms held a 2-0 lead after the opening period with Scannell scoring from Davidson and Todd Horne nabbing the other with Davidson assisting.
Scannell had Shaw assisting on the lone second period marker.
In the final frame Tim Rayner fired one from Doug Beamish, Scannell completed his hat trick and Davidson added two more with Lee Johnson assisting once.
The atoms travelled to Flamborough on Tuesday, Dec. 5 and met a scrappy and disorganized Sabre team. It took the locals a period to get on track but netted two in the second and four in the third to claim a 7-0 rout.
Both Mike DelPapa and Todd Horne fired hat tricks and Scannell notched the single goal. Craig Defrietas was awarded the shutout.
In Dundas Saturday in a cold and dreary rink, the locals ran into hosts with excellent goaltending.
Strong positional play helped Dundas Blues to keep the score close. But Milton was not to be denied the win as the team continually pressed and had their efforts pay off with a 4-0 win.
Scannell opened the scoring in the first period from Bruce Cameron and Shaw. Horne scored from Rayner and Beamish for a 2-0 lead in the second frame before the Blues added their red light by Shawn Harris.
Davidson was unassisted in retaining the two-goal margin and in the final period, Eric Chudleigh padded the lead.

Comeback victory is clutched by midgets

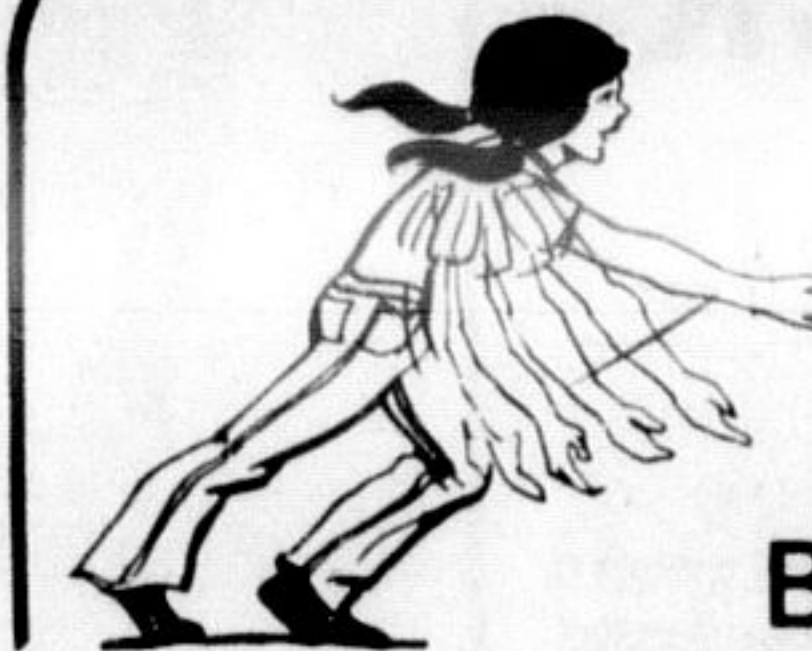

THE STATE OF THE HALTON TEACHERS/BOARD CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS

Negotiations between the Halton Board of Education and the elementary and secondary teachers are at an impasse. Talks concerning the Board's 1978-79 contracts with each teacher group began over ten months ago. A Fact Finder, appointed by the Education Relations Commission, recently released his report detailing the items in dispute in each set of negotiations. Here are the positions expressed by both sides to the Fact Finder on major items:

SALARY

5½% increase in total costs. This is the Board's offer, structured so that lower-paid teachers receive the highest percentage increase. The highest-paid teachers would still receive an increase over 1977-78 resulting in a maximum salary of \$28,186 for classroom teachers.

INSURED BENEFITS

Secondary = \$160,000, Elementary = \$133,000. These are the costs of an extensive dental plan which the teachers have requested be paid by the Board. These costs are in addition to the 75% of premiums currently offered by the Board for OHIP, Extended Health and Group Life Insurance.

STAFFING

Secondary = \$1,628,000 This is the cost of hiring 68 more secondary school teachers to lower the Pupil Teacher Ratio.

Elementary = \$980,000 This is the cost of hiring a minimum of 50 more elementary teachers.

The Board feels that there will not be adequate educational benefit to justify these costs. Current class sizes in Halton schools are educationally sound and economically responsible.

PARAPROFESSIONALS

This term describes school staff that assist in many non-instructional duties. The Board wishes to maintain the use of these staff members within the staffing ratio. The elementary teachers request that these non-teachers be compensated above and beyond the budgeted staffing ratio.

The secondary teachers seek that no non-teacher be hired within the staffing ratio.

THE BOTTOM LINE

The secondary dispute is now in mediation with a provincially appointed mediator. The elementary teachers have requested the appointment of a mediator. This is the situation as it stands following the Fact Finder's report.

The heart of the matter is this: controlling the cost of providing the best education possible for the students of Halton. The Board wishes to continue negotiations reasonably and responsibly with Halton teachers.
