## Horseman of the Year' Waples first to earn million in a single season, a total of

Harness racing, Happy Lady, and Ron Waples, the first harness driver to earn \$1 million and record 300 victories in one year, solely in Canada's 1978 Horse of the Year and 1978 Horseman of the Year, respectively, in a Canadian pari-mutuel track \$480,422,

Happy Lady, a three-yearold filly owned by Linda Lockey and Myra Masterson of St. Catharines, Ont., campaign earning the most recording 12 winning efforts

Happy Lady received 23 of the 39 votes for Horse of the with pacing star Year, Dream Maker a distant second, with seven votes. She was also voted Canada's Three-Year-Old Pacing Filly

The pacing starlet's important stakes victories included the \$266,165 Monticello-OTB Classic IV, the Lady Maud Roosevelt and the \$28,300 Constance Scott Stakes at Mohawk.

For the second straight year, Ron Waples has been voted Canada's Horseman of the Year.

Waples, 34, of Rockwood, Ont., leads Canada's 3,609 harness drivers with more than \$1.2 million in purses and 276 in-Canada wins to

Although he often commuted to distant race tracks campaigning his classy stable, Waples has enjoyed enormous success on the OJC's Greenwood-Mohawk circuit, which is the base of his operation. Earlier this year he became the first

driver to earn \$1 million in purses in a single season on the OJC's Circuit.

Some of his important stakes victories on the OJC's Circuit this year included the \$89,500 Canadian Pacing Derby, the \$59,800 Mohawk Gold Cup and the \$29,100 Beaches Stakes, all with pacing star Dream Maker.

Waples received 14 of 38 votes for Horseman of the year, Dave Wall of Komoka, Ont., received seven votes followed by A. M. "Mac" Cuddy, of Strathroy, Ont. with six votes.
