my belief that the region should take full responsibility to co-operate in favor of the governments and working with the mayors of our municipalities, I will do everything possible to cooperate to serve the best interests of all citizens," he

Improvements in transportation and police protection within the region were touched by Raftis.

"Much more emphasis must be placed on community services, the so-called soft services," he said.

"It will be the responsibility of the Health and Social Services Committee to examine needs and use of federal and provincial grants to obtain maximum value."

Raftis said, "We must remember a society cannot consume more than it can produce and it cannot produce as much as it would like to consume."

The club's meeting on Dec. 13 was opened by Sam Finnie with Mae Crawford at the piano for O Canada and






