Dog teams will return soon to Halton winter carnival

Plans are underway for Halton's celebration of winter, the annual winter carnival to be held at Kelso Park on Sunday Feb. 18.
The three municipalities of Milton, Halton Hills and Oakville will sponsor the day long event.

similar turnout this year. A schedule of events and competitions remains to be determined but a winter survival course, ski-binding clinic and log-sawing demonstration are already in the books.
For those individuals who are kept running to enjoy as many events as possible, a variety of service clubs will be on hand with a good supply of hot food and drinks.
The Milton Firefighters Auxiliary will be doing 'out' hot chili and food will be available from a variety of other community organizations.




