Ice fishing fever has attacked a lot of Halton Outdoorsmen including yours truly, who intends to go to Pt. Bolster this Friday for Perch and Herring.

Most fish hut operators are in full swing now on Lake Simcoe. I have a full list of operators and their phone numbers as have many members of the HSA club who get the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters magazine.

Do not be afraid to phone me or a member of the club as we are always willing to help.

The fish are fair at Simcoe and Lake Nippissing but there is not much action with Pickerel yet. They should start hitting in about two weeks, Lake Erie is always a good spot to go for jumbo perch. They report the surface is frozen but people are advised not to go on the lake without the help of a local guide or word from the Ministry of the Environment.

This is good advice to follow concerning any frozen surface in the province.

There are a few pickerel from Lake Scugog but again be careful of the ice conditions. Five cars went through the ice a couple of weeks ago.

Lake Temagami, like Nippissing, has bad slush conditions at present, so wait a few more days. *

The OFAH is still doing a tremendous job for the outdoorsman in Ontario despite rising costs and sometimes dwindling enthusiasm.

The officers, directors and zone chairman have a tremendous work load and are just as busy as you and I think they are.

They spend at least two weekends a month away from their families to attend meetings and meet with government officials. At every meeting attended, they have your interests at heart whether you're a fisherman, hunter, naturalist, bird watcher or a just plain trail walker.

Why do we all not offer to help more? George Cook, a long time member and chairman from zone five, summed it up when he wrote, "I wonder what it will take to get clubs and people more active. When the last deer has been shot and the last deer hunting area closed, when the last fish is caught in our lakes and streams, we will all wake up with a bang! You think perhaps this will never happen? Well we have news for you. It could happen if everyone doesn't get active. It may take a few years to complete but it could happen sooner than we think."

That sounds like doom and gloom but it certainly was not meant to be just a warning. Remember what happened to the tons of beautiful Lake Trout from Lake Ontario and do not blame it all on the lamprey.

Certainly they made short work of what was left after man commercially fished them to death. The same thing happened to hundreds of tons of beautiful blue pickerel from Lake Erie. The second largest body of fresh water in the world, Lake Superior, received the

same treatment. Your federation members are working to see it does not happen again. Will you help?

One of the biggest events of the year at the HSA is the annual awards night and wildlife dinner this Saturday.
