CTC midgets take league series opener

It was a continual come-from-behind battle for the Canadian Tire major midgets but they eliminated Ancaster in the first round of the Tri-County playoffs in three games.

Milton edged Ancaster 3-2 in the opening game. The two teams tied 3-3 in the second but Milton took the third by a slim 3-2 margin for the series.

In the second game in Milton Sunday, Ancaster skated to a 3-0 lead on three powerplay goals by Mark McClure, Doug Guyatt and Rob McLennan at the end of the second period.

Jeff Defrietas, Tom Galloway and Paul Van Oorschot all went 100 per cent, sinking every shot

they attempted. The trend continued.

Jamie Racinsky hooped 12 points against Eastdale at 66 per cent, Perry Martin nine, John Hackett eight at 80 per cent,

and Earl Essery eight at 66 per cent. Galloway again hit 100 per cent.

Van Oorschot took the top scoring position against Brighton and St. Peter's with 36 points

for a total of 50 points in the tournament at 72 per cent.

The team totals at the tournament settled 260 points in four games at a 90 per cent success.

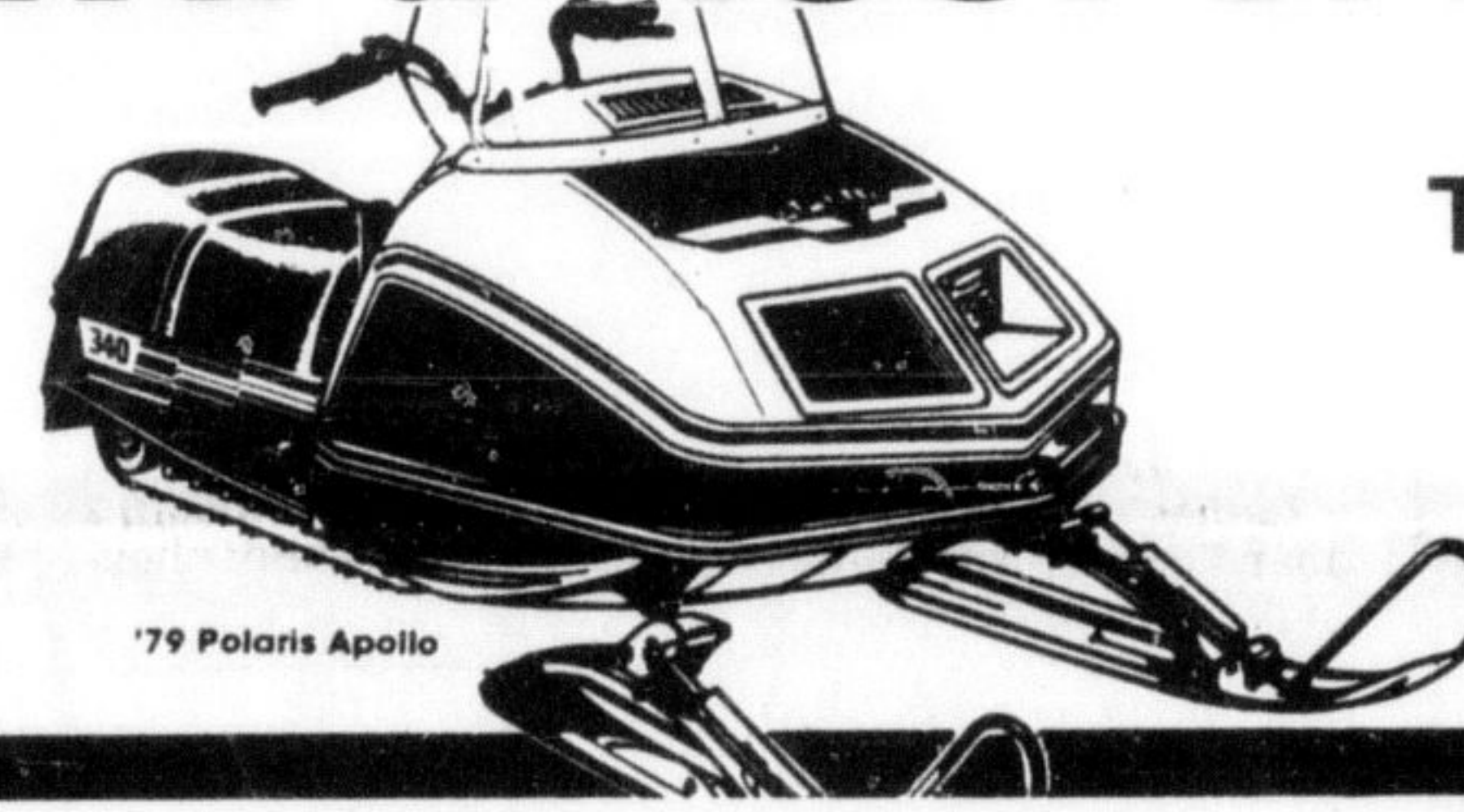

The next game in this two-of-three series will be played in Milton at 4 p.m. on Saturday and promises to be another thriller.

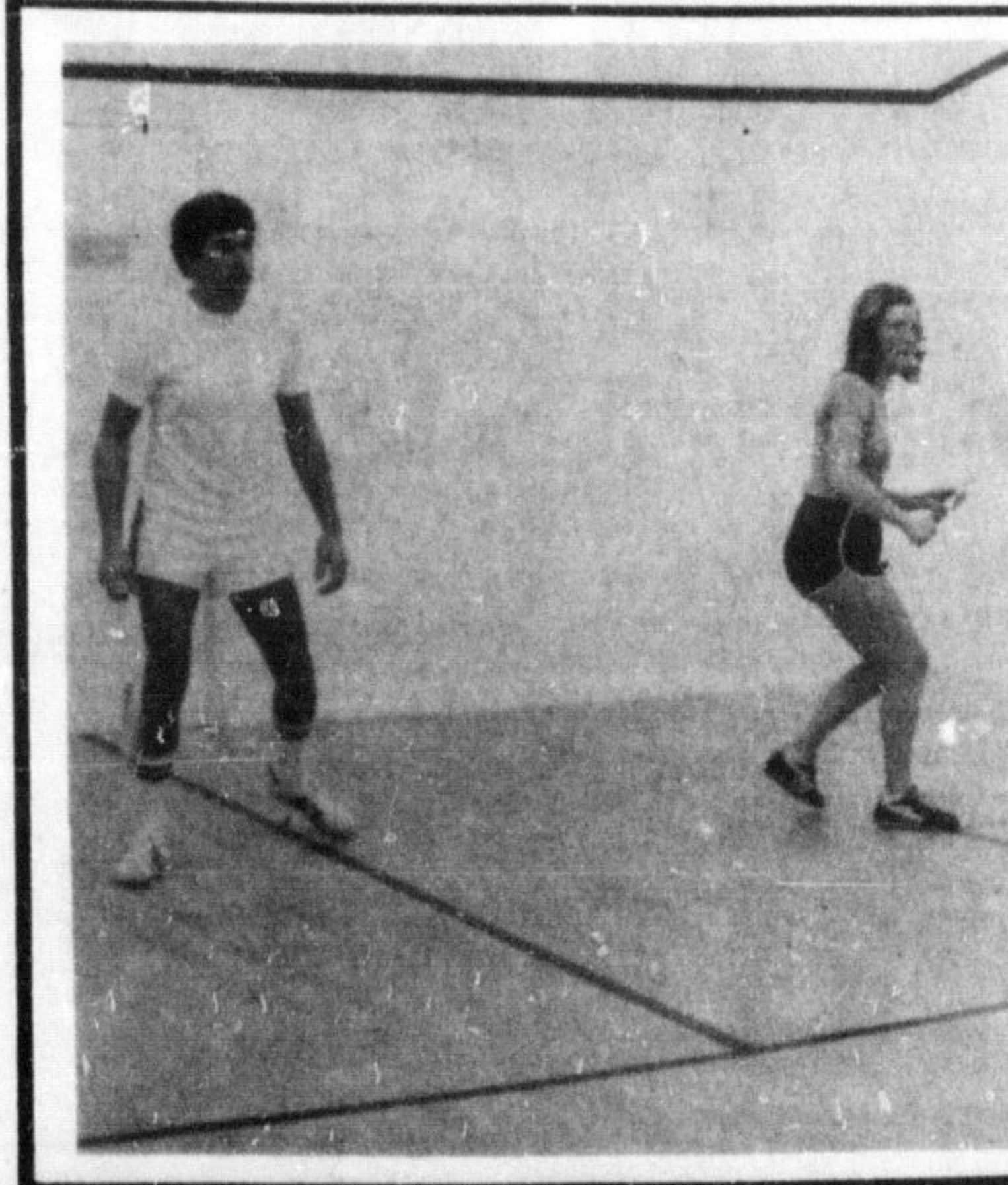
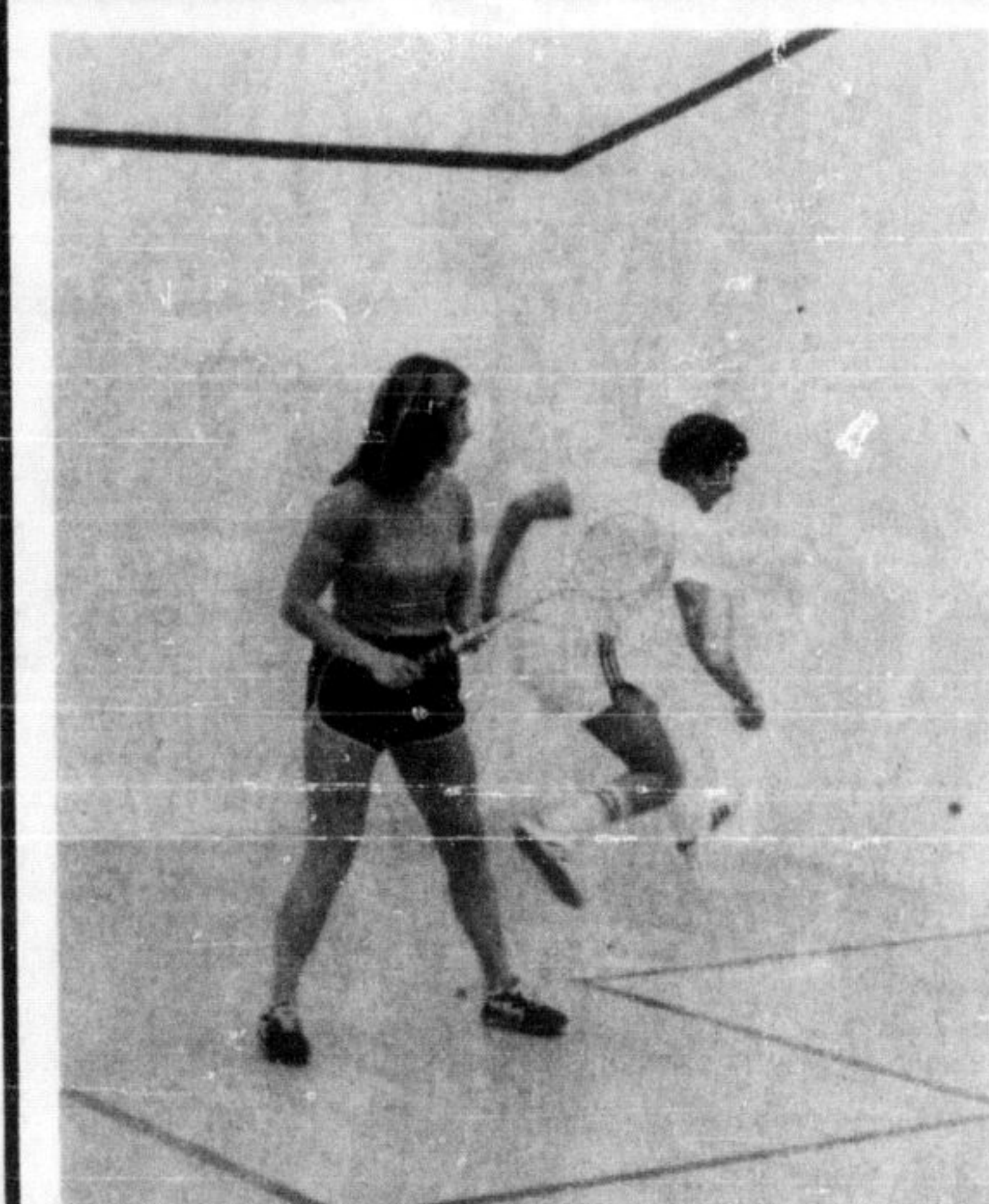
