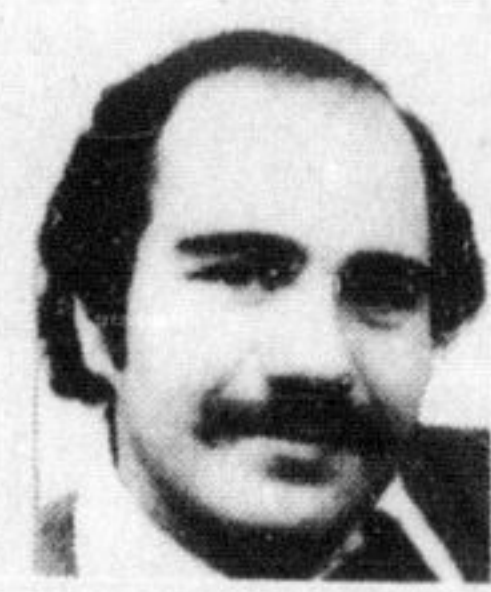
Carnegie registered his third consecutive shutout in leading his teammates to victory. Pollen skated like a whirlwind all evening scoring three goals and adding an assist.

Hood, the fiery centre led the offensive charge with two goals and an assist. Pollen chipped in with a goal and an assist. Other point getters for the Optimists were: Ron Lassaline and Paul Wilson with goals and Terry Boudreau two assists, Tracy Harding and Jon Griffiths singles. The victory could prove to be costly however, as both Terry Boudreau and team captain Trevor Riebot are scheduled for X-rays for wrist and rib injuries. Moms organize to help kids in soccer club

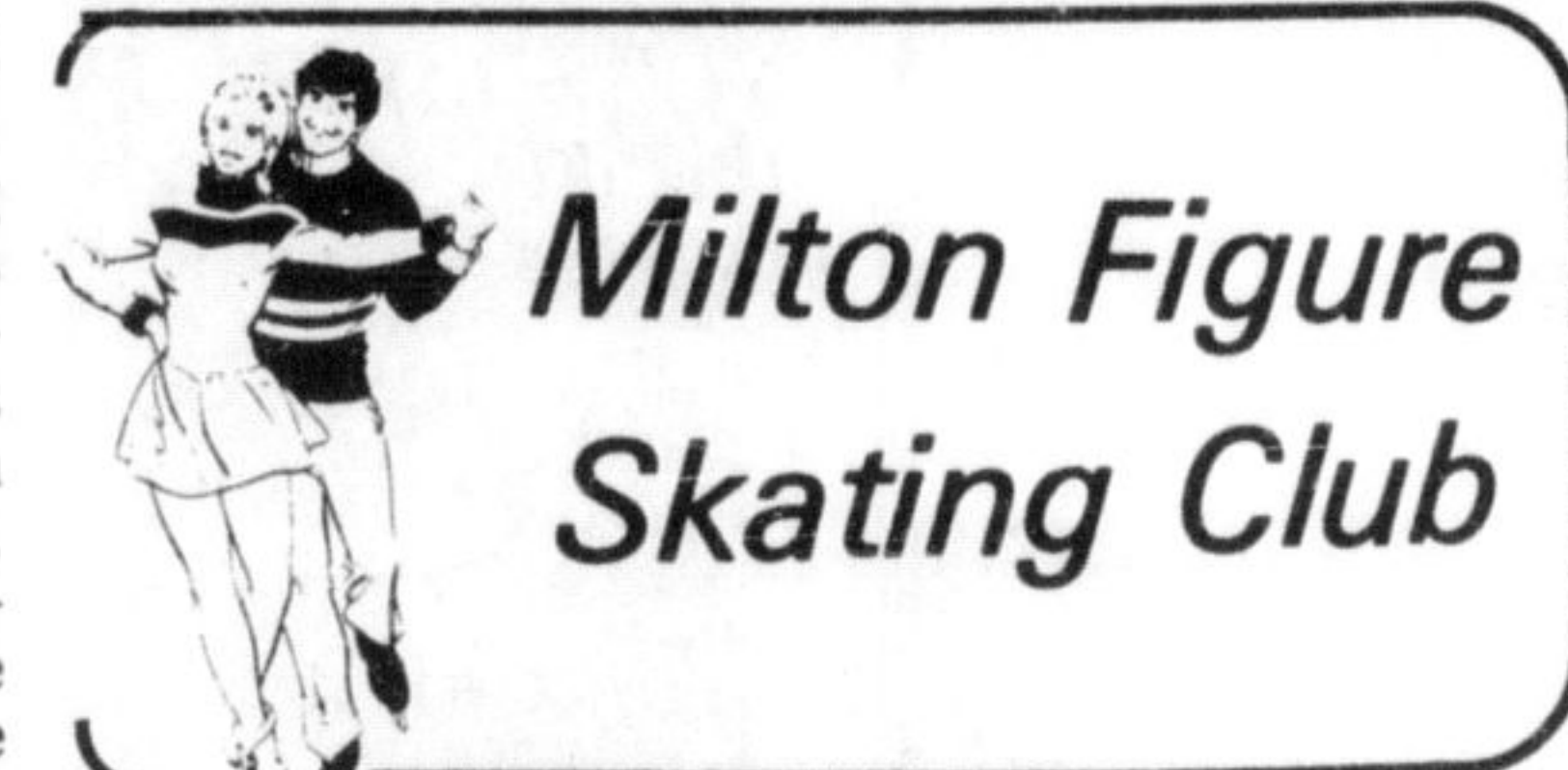
