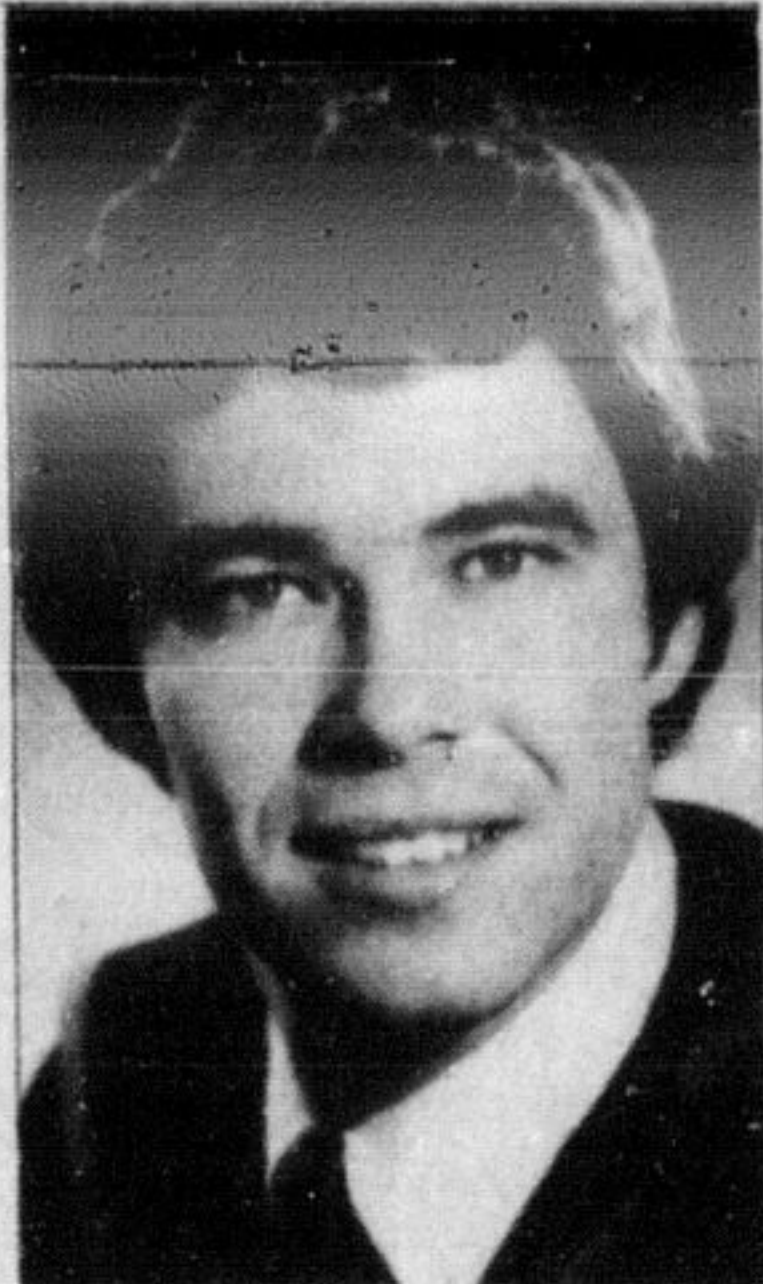
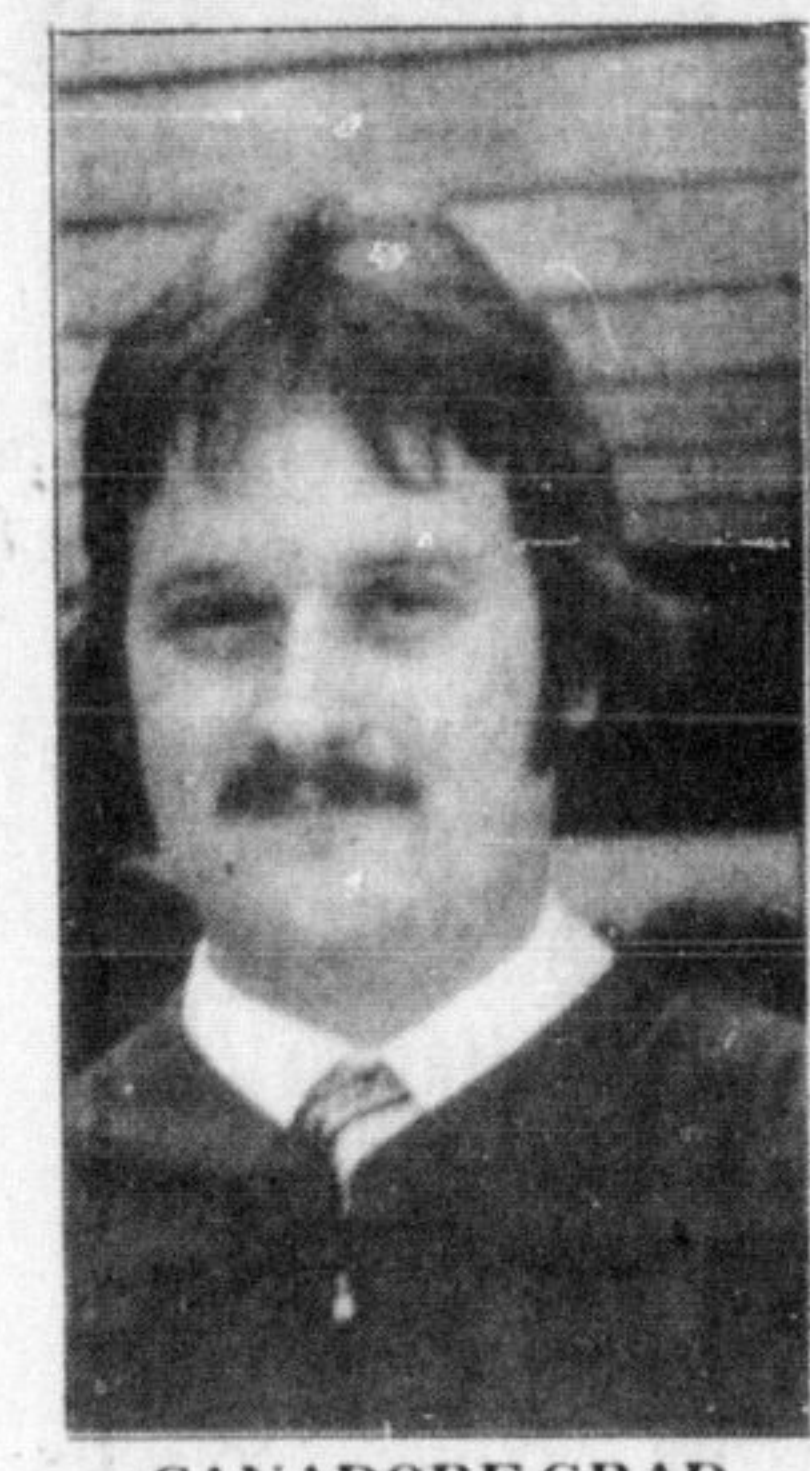


Graduates

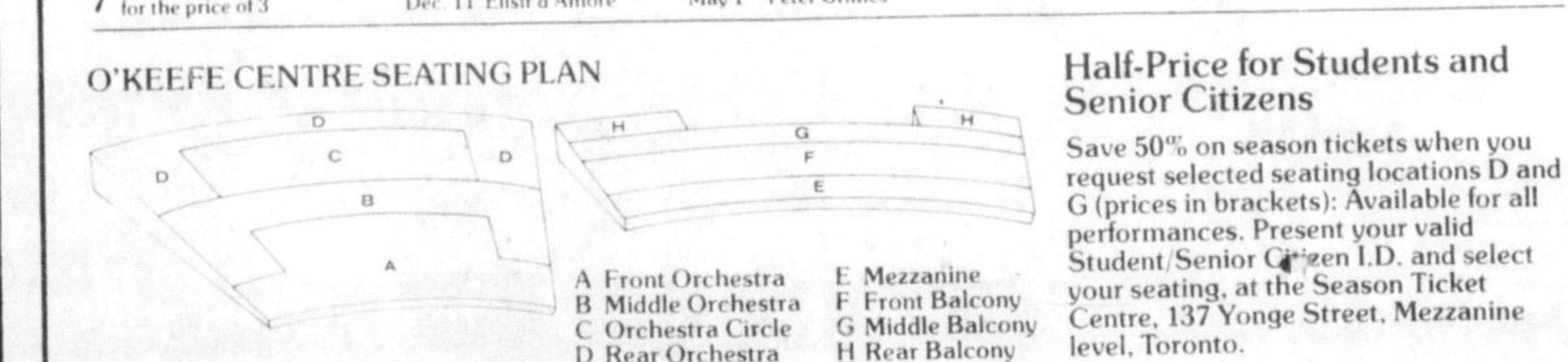

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT NOTICE

BUS OWNERS & OPERATORS

New mandatory bus inspection legislation comes into effect October 31, 1979.

Under the new regulations, a "BUS" means any motor vehicle with dual wheels or tandem rear axles, designed to carry 10 or more passengers, other than those fitted with a truck or delivery body.

The new inspection program covers nearly all bus categories, including buses privately owned and operated by colleges and universities, church and service groups, sports organizations and industry.

A Public Meeting Will Be Held at 7:30 p.m. on THURSDAY, JUNE 28, 1979 at the Holiday Inn, Oakville, 360 Iroquois Shore Road, Oakville, Ontario.

Ministry personnel will be on hand to discuss the new legislation.
