

OMB favors Site F

The Ontario Municipal Board has approved Halton's application to locate and construct a sanitary landfill operation at Site F.

In a decision dated Friday, June 15 the OMB gave the region approval to go ahead with the \$3.7 million facility to be located at the north-western corner of Tremaine and Britannia Roads in southwestern Milton.

The decision is by Walter Schvies, chairman of the hearing and his associate A.J.C. Chapman.

The board sat at Halton Centennial Manor in Milton for the months of January, February and March listening to lawyers' cases presented

by the region, Milton and the Tremaine-Britannia Citizens' Group.

A spokesman for the region said Monday the OMB decision upholds Halton's application.

He said the region will issue five-year debentures to pay the \$3.7 million.

Milton Council learned of the OMB decision at its meeting Monday night. It referred the matter to its technical advisory committee chaired by deputy clerk Roy Main, to bring in a recommendation.

Councillor Rick Day said if the committee feels it necessary to launch an appeal, it should perhaps consider two appeals in order that the town ensures it gets the matter reviewed before the 28-day deadline.

Citizens and organizations have four weeks to appeal an OMB decision. Councillor Gus Goutouski informed council the town has spent approximately \$174,000 fighting Site F.

Councillor Gord Krantz said he was concerned. He said the town shouldn't spend another \$174,000, the equivalent of three mills, fighting something the OMB has approved.

Stu McFadden, president of the Tremaine-Britannia Citizens' Group, said the OMB decision was not unexpected.

He said the group expected the decision and has already organized further fund-raising programs to continue the fight.

"We haven't thrown in the towel yet,"

He said the group will consult with its lawyer David Estrin this week.

It will also consider coordinating its appeal with the town.

Dave Katz, an executive member of the citizens' group, said he was not surprised by the board's ruling.

He said it verified the group's opinion that the board was biased in favor of the region from the beginning.

Having had a quick look at the report, he said it appears the board considered all of the region's arguments without those of the citizens or the town.

"It's far from over," he said. "This is the fourth

or fifth round. This is a 15-round fight."

The group will continue the fight.

A strawberry social is planned for the Hopedale Mall in Oakville Friday and Saturday.

The group will attend the Milton Optimists' chili cookoff July 14. It has booked a booth at the CNE and registered

for the Milton and Acton fall fairs.

Mr. Katz said the group has raised "thousands and thousands" of dollars.

"We raised every nickel of it," he said. "We raised it through hard work and dedication."

Speaking of the group's determination to fight the dump, he said, "If it's the right thing to do, you do it."

Bavarian Inn appeals licence suspension

The Bavarian Inn in Milton Mall has been slapped with a one week liquor licence suspension following a hearing by the Ontario Liquor Licence Board.

The seven-day licence suspension was due to take effect this week. An appeal launched by the Bavarian Inn postpones the suspension until the case is heard by a tribunal from the Ontario Liquor Licence Board.

The restaurant-tavern was charged earlier this year with serving alcoholic beverages to minors by Halton Regional Police, after two 17-year-old Milton girls were charged with drinking under age.

Earlier this month, both girls pleaded guilty to the charges.

According to Milton liquor inspector Bob Moreau, the recent court case results prompted

the Ontario Liquor Licence Board to go ahead with a hearing.

The case provided "bona fide proof" both girls were at the Bavarian Inn and drinking, he said.

The licence suspension is the first to be laid against the establishment. But Mr. Moreau said the Bavarian Inn has been warned "several" times by representatives of the Board on the subject of serving to minors.

Mr. Moreau said the case is not likely to be heard until late summer or early fall. Milton Mall management officials have refused to comment on the suspension.

Jewels stolen

Halton Regional Police are investigating the theft of an estimated \$2,450 worth of jewelry taken from the residence of Marie Crawford of 43 Campbellville Rd. in Campbellville.

According to police, Mrs. Crawford allowed three female parties into her home Friday afternoon, after they requested to use a telephone book.

Courses in human relations, communications and organizational development are also planned at the centre.
