Milton scored the first

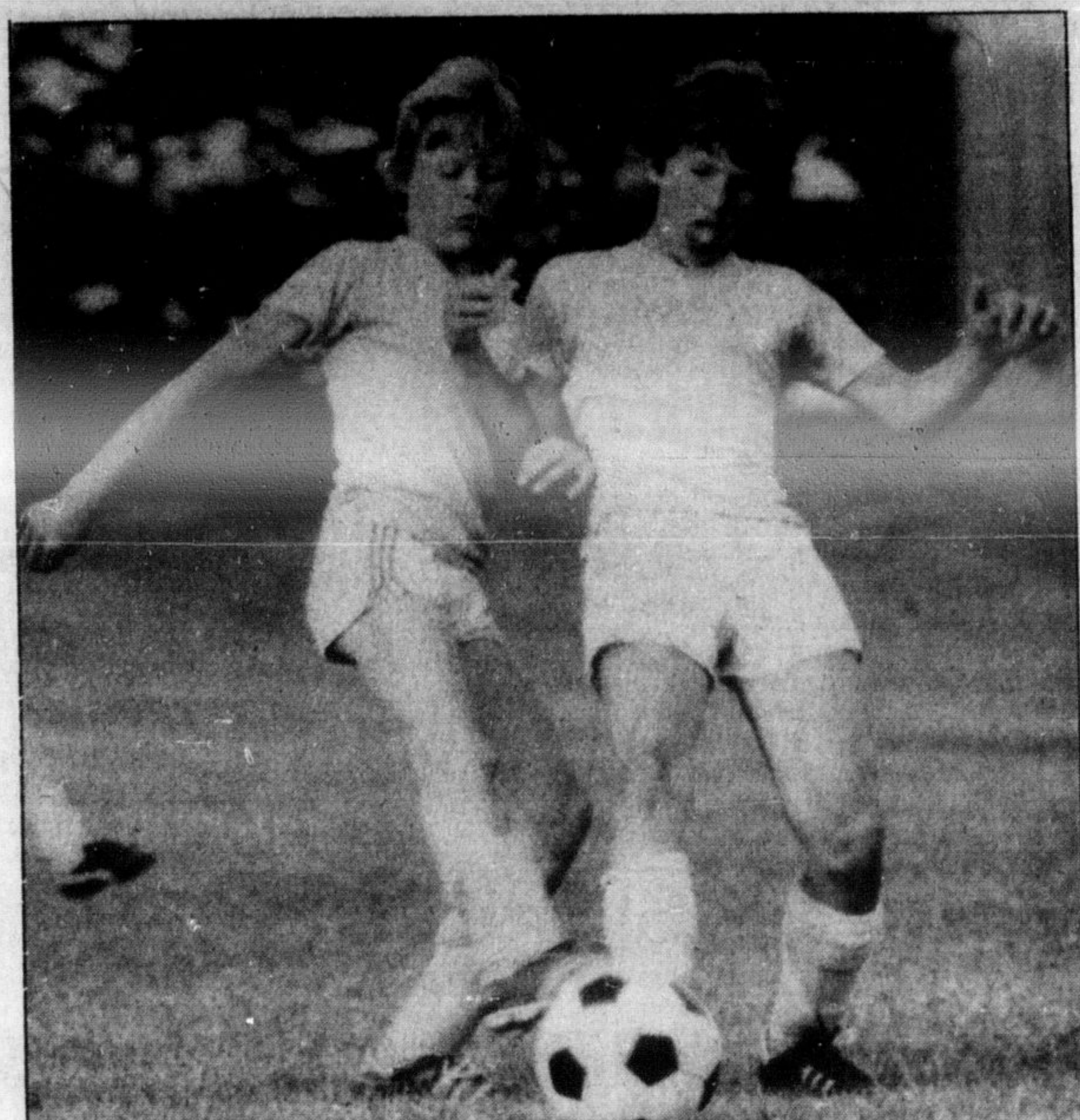
