Milton hobby driver Dave McKee broke Ray Hughes' stranglehold on the Ontario Amateur Racing Club's season championship for the second week in a row by winning Flamboro Speedway's annual Twin 25's.

McKee finished second behind Don Rammage in the first 25-lap race but won the second 25-lapper, thus winning the series in total points. McKee, driving his ever popular blue and white Chevrolet, placed third in the first heat.

John Hasselheldt, back after missing a couple of weeks because of sickness in the family, took second place in the second heat in number 66, the yellow, black and red entry from Home Hardware.

In late model super sport action, Milton's Wayne Howden, driving

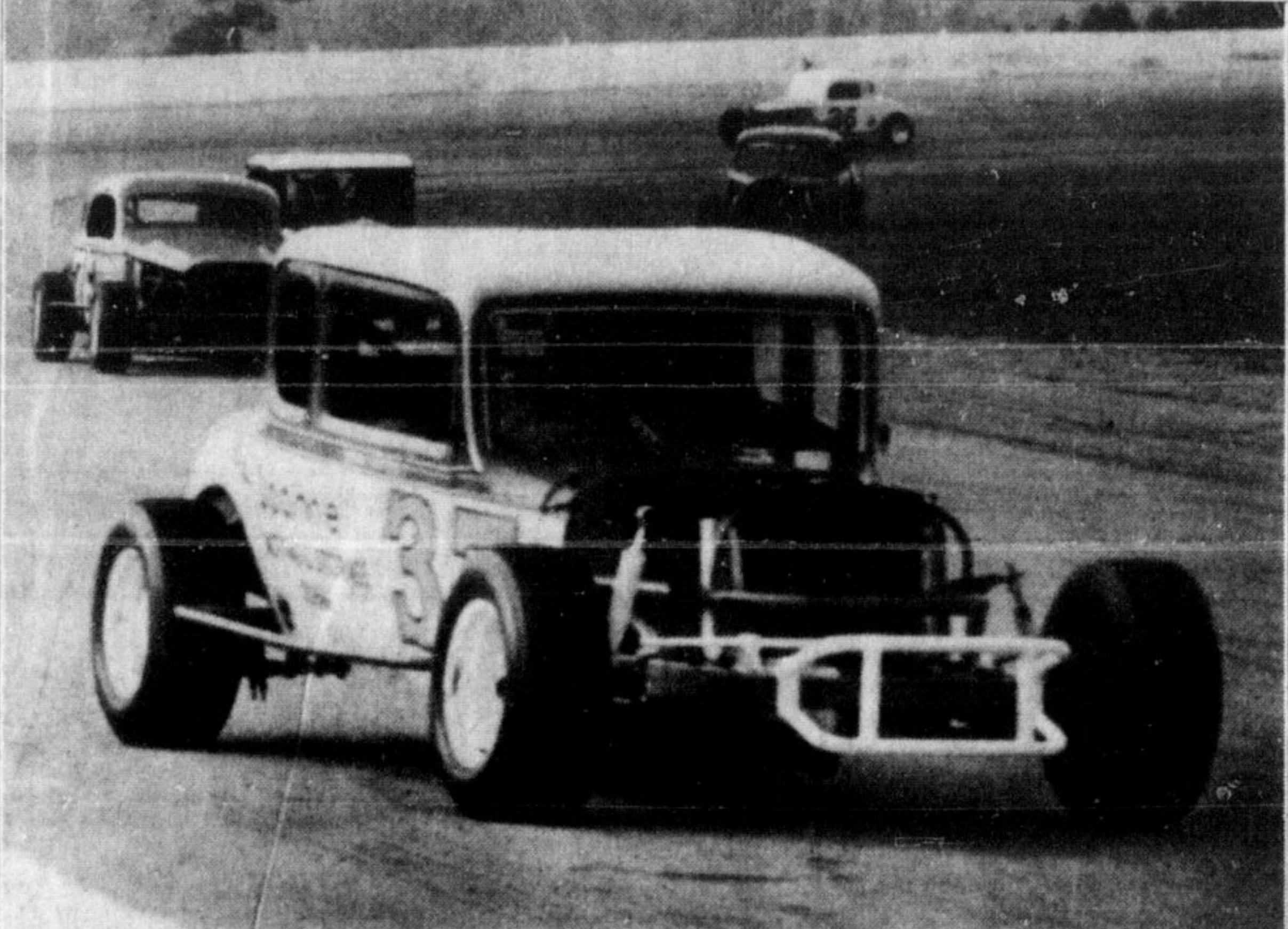
number 16, finished second in the second heat behind late model class front runner Don Biederman. Biederman later won the feature race.

Jim Tardiff, a former motorcycle racer who has been on four wheels at Flamboro for six weeks now, won the second heat in the street-stocker class and finished second in the feature.

Tardiff's car, a silver-blue Chevrolet, has quickly developed into one of the top running machines on the track in a relatively short time.

The season is 75 per cent completed now and it looks like McKee could give Ray Hughes a battle for the championship.

Tardiff may finish quite high in the standings but may not have the chance to win the street stock title because of his late start.

# Rockwell leaves league

# Farmers cautioned

Heavy infestations of armyworms are present in several parts of Ontario. Now is the time to check fields for the presence of armyworms. Armyworms will damage cereal grains, corn and grasses.

They can cause severe damage, eating the plant leaves and/or seeds depending on the crop. The best time to check for armyworms is in the evening when the worms feed on the plant.

In the daytime they are not visible.

All fields should be checked since the infestations may be localized.

The worms are brown to dark green caterpillars with longitudinal stripes. They are up to one and a half inches long at maturity.

If there are five to six armyworms per square foot, it is economical to spray the crop.

Most of the worms should be less than one and a half inches long for practical control.

Spray treatment is best in the evening when the

armyworms are feeding. Recommendations can be found in the 1979 Field Crop Recommendation publication No. 296.

Regular field checks and prompt treatment can prevent excessive damage should armyworms be found in the area.

# Soccer tourney to be held here

Milton has been selected to host several rounds of a provincial soccer tournament on the Labour Day weekend.

A total of 16 games leading up to the semi-finals will be played at four soccer pitches in the area as part of the Vanguard Invitational Tournament for the bantam division. Milton will be represented by its own team, Stoppes Cleaners, coached by Charlie Cropper.

Milton will host the tournament until the semi-final stage. Both the semi and final will be held in Mississauga on Sept. 3.

Teams will be coming from all over the province although a majority of them will be from around the area. Teams are expected from Sarnia and Sault Ste. Marie which will be billeted in Milton homes.

Games will be equally divided among four soccer pitches. The A and C pitches at E.C. Drury School, Brian Best Park and the pitch at the Italian-Canadian Club will host four games each on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 1-2.

At the same time, tournaments will be held at other points in the province for the other divisions. So far, no other Milton team has been invited to play in any other tourney. The bantams are permitted to play because they are the host team.
