Squash club ready for busy season

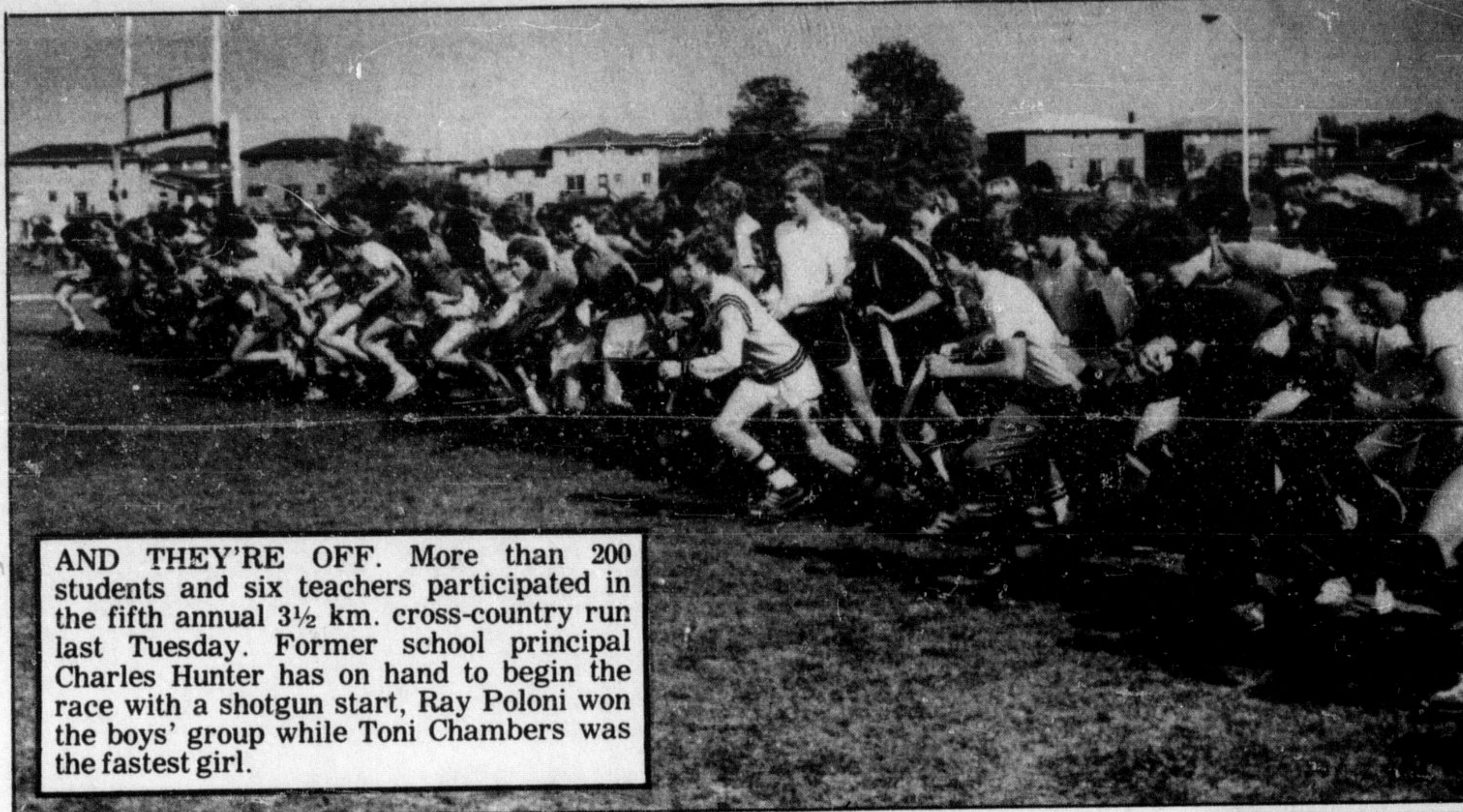
After a quiet summer, four squash courts, play is underway again at the Milton Squash Club.

Leading the junior girls team were Cheryl Roberts, Gillian Willowby, Renee Nolet and Valerie Plant.

"The boys have been running about two miles a day to prepare for it," said an obviously-pleased Laister.

"They'd never run that distance before but when they found out I was going to run, they wanted to run with me."

"The whole school is rather excited about their performances. More students are anxious to run in the club."

Laister added the boys will aim for races up to 20 km later in the year.

The Trillium School opened in September at the south end of E.C.

Drury School. The school has an enrolment of 25 of which 10 are members of the cross-country running team.

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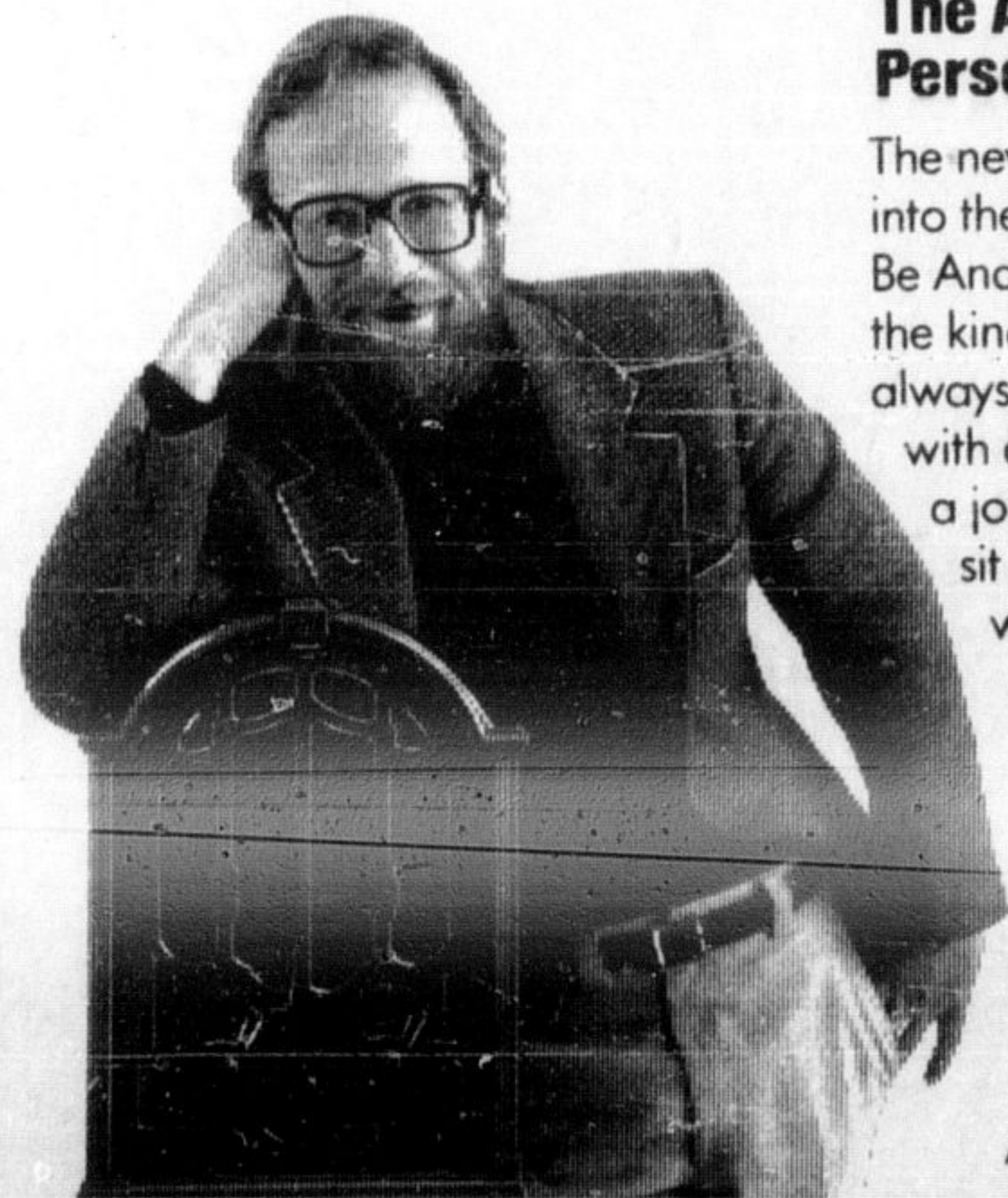
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
