Exchange raises \$800 so far

A two-day sale of used figure skates and uniforms produced a total of \$800 in sales at the Milton Figure Skating Club's annual exchange at the Milton Mall Friday and Saturday.

The exchange continued last night at the opening day of the club at Milton Memorial Arena. Further results were not yet available.

The figure skating club takes 10 per cent of the sales as its fee for putting

on and advertising the exchange.

Meanwhile, the membership in the club is approaching capacity at 140 members but, there are still spots available in each of the three categories—junior,

intermediate and senior.

The bulk of the members, 96, are juniors which has a limit of 125.

The youngest to register were three years old. The limit in juniors was extended because

the response was overwhelming.

The club also doubled the number of boys in the club from six to 12.

The Milton club will host the six-member inter-club competition Feb. 3. Clubs coming are Georgetown, Port Credit, Brampton, Streetsville and Acton which hosted the event last year.

Other dates in the club's schedule are Nov. 29 when the inter-club competition run-off will be held; the Christmas party Dec. 20; on Jan. 6 the competitions for each of the groups will be held; Feb. 3 for the inter-club competition; and, Mar. 9 when the season ends and the Pop Concert, i.e. a recital, will close the season.

Big purses at stake

Several top harness drivers and horses will be on hand when Mohawk Raceway features Ontario Week, from Friday to Tuesday.

Six big stake races with combined purses exceeding \$150,000 will be featured during the five-day program. In addition, a \$20,000 handicap is planned for opening night.

The stakes will attract the best Ontario-sired horses in the province as

well as the finest fillies and mares on the continent which will compete in the \$50,000 Milton Pacing Stakes on Sunday evening.

In addition to the racing, patrons will have an opportunity to see some of the leading standardbred sires in the province. Fifteen stallions are scheduled to visit Mohawk Raceway during the course of Ontario Week.

Among this group are Smog, Armbr Nadrir and Super Wave, stallions which have proved they

can sire quality stock. Many of the horses racing in the Ontario Sires Stakes each evening will be the offspring of the stallions displayed in the Mohawk grandstand.

Bea Farber, America's top-flight woman harness driver will be on hand Sunday evening to challenge the Mohawk drivers at their own game.

Farber has proved she can hold her own against the men on any track on the continent and her appearance during

Ontario Week will provide additional excitement during the action-packed week.

Along with racing Mohawk is putting together a country fair.

The fair will run throughout Ontario Week and there will be food and handicrafts available for sale. In addition to the local produce and handicrafts, the Ontario government will have several exhibits set up in the fair area.

Mohawk Raceway is just north of Highway 401 off Guelph Line.
