Ready for winter

At its Oct. 22 meeting, Milton Council: -Accepted tender bids from R. Leslie Wilson, Jack Campbell, Roland Height, George Robertson and Nellis Construction Ltd. for rental of sanding trucks for winter road use. Rates for the trucks varied from \$14 to \$16 per hour, depending on the individual bid. A tender bid of \$32 per hour was accepted from Nellis Construction for rental of a snowplow.

-Passed a by-law to licence house trailers, camping trailers, recreational vehicles and mobile homes.

-Did not endorse a resolution from the Township of West Carleton regarding the proposed 1980 equalization factors. Council did endorse a resolution from the Town of Dunnville concerning unprotected railway crossings.

-Received a report from treasurer Don Lougheed on updated equalization factors.

-Approved all outstanding accounts for payment totalling \$636,581,38.

-Learned of Ontario Municipal Board approval of a Niagara Escarpment Commission appeal of a Halton Land Division Committee decision concerning sale of lands by William Laurenssen. The OMB also approved two town by-laws: an amendment to the town's parking by-law; and a zoning amendment.

-Proclaimed Youth Appreciation Week in Milton from Nov. 11 to 17, and approved the request from Milton Optimist Club allowing the council chambers to be used by children learning about civic affairs.

-Approved a request from Milton Youth Bowling Council to sell chocolate-covered almonds door-to-door to raise funds.

-Received a request from James Heffrun to put a locked gate in the fence around his back yard.

-Received a report from Milton Fire Department, noting there was seven fire calls in Milton in September. Five of the seven were in the urban area.

-Received a report from Halton and Mississauga Ambulance Service. There were 73 calls in Milton division in August.

-Received a letter from McMurrich and Oxley Architects Ltd. offering their services for the restoration work to be done on the old court house.

-Received a copy of a letter to Halton Police Commission regarding vandalism in Halton. The letter was written by S. Sgt. Bernie Ward, who is working on a regional anti-vandalism project.

-Gave final approval to the Main St. revitalization program contained in the semi-mall proposal, put fourth in a series of public meetings earlier this year.

-Proclaimed Career Week in Milton, acting on a request from the provincial government's Secretariat for Social Development.

-Passed a by-law authorizing the reconstruction of Main St. from Ontario St. eastward by 650 metres.

-Learned of Niagara Escarpment Commission approval allowing Tom Howarth and Paul Keats to build single-family homes on their lands. The NEC denied approval for a similar structure to Jaan Jurss on his land on Derry Rd. near Guelph Line. NEC development permits were given to Italian-Canadian Club to allow expansion of the clubhouse, and the Rinaldo Marcoccia for a driveshed on Derry Rd.

-Approved insurance coverage of the Santa Claus Parade, scheduled for Main St. Nov. 17.

-Allowed three members of town staff to attend a seminar on planning and zoning law in Toronto on Friday, Nov. 30.

At its Monday, Oct. 29 meeting, Milton Council:


-Supported an application from Charles Martin to build a home on Parkway Belt lands.


