10 is directed and co-produced by Blake (The Pink Panther, Darling Lili) Edwards, so it's no surprise that his wife Julie Andrews stars in this, his latest production. Halton rejects proposal to change Guelph Line signs

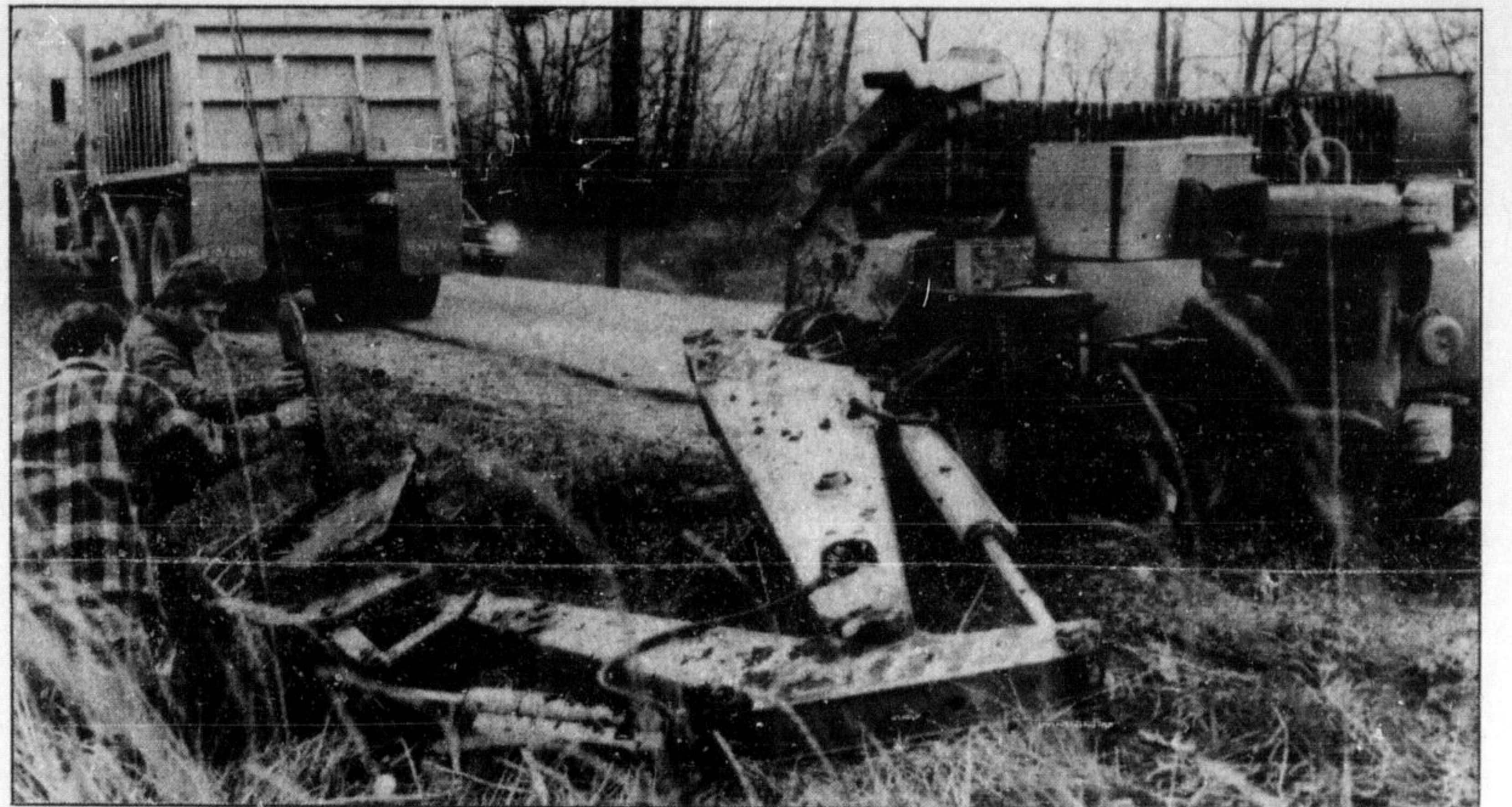
Regional council will be asked to leave stop signs the way they are at the Guelph Line-Eden Mills Rd. intersection despite a Wellington County request they be changed. The signs currently are used to stop traffic north and south at the Guelph Line. Wellington County has asked the signs be placed to stop what it feels is high-speed traffic going east and west into Eden Mills. The other reason is to reduce the amount of traffic going into the hamlet. Dr. Don Furness and his wife Jane attended the regional public works meeting to oppose the change of signage. He lives on the south-west corner of the intersection. He said he and six neighbors are concerned

the removal of the north-south stop signs would promote speeding, particularly with the nightly closing of Mohawk Raceway. Dr. Furness said he is hoping for a Halton-Wellington agreement to have stop signs at all four corners of the intersection with a red flashing warning light. Councillor Bill Johnson of Milton said he did not want the north-south stop signs removed because "the area will become a race track."

On the other side of the argument was Councillor Mike Armstrong of Halton Hills who said hundreds of studies have shown that stop signs actually increase the chance of a collision, especially if the roadway is well used. Regional staff did a study of the intersection and found that during a peak hour, 110 vehicles use the north-south road and 33 used the east-west route. "In reviewing all approaches to this intersection, it can be estimated that over a 24-hour period, 1,500 vehicles are inconvenienced by having to stop whereas only 600 vehicles are allowed the through movement. "It was also observed that a knoll just south of the intersection on the Guelph Line restricted sight distance. "This could be hazardous for north-bound vehicles stopped on the Guelph Line at the intersection, "public works director Bob Moore said in his report on the sign change.

A lengthy debate ensued on putting in red flashing lights, red and amber flashing lights, putting in larger stop warning signs further down each road, and whether or not stop signs actually cause accidents. Finally, Oakville Councillor Laurie Mannell said, "...so what we have to do here is just leave the signs where they are and let Wellington put in stop signs if they want."

This was followed by a motion to that effect. A change in titles will result in officers serving in the uniform division, courts bureau, training bureau, public relations and crime prevention being called Sergeant and Staff Sergeant. Acting Sergeant or Acting Staff Sergeant regardless of whether they work in the uniform or plain clothes division. A change was introduced by Acting Chief James Harding at a meeting of the Halton Board of Police Commissioners. The board approved the move and agreed to refer the subject to the Halton Region Police negotiating committee to be discussed during contract talks.

Santa Claus fund said slipping

Milton's Santa Claus Parade Fund is well behind, but organizers remain optimistic financial support for the \$5,215 project will come through in the end. The parade committee has collected to date \$1,320 for the Nov. 17 occasion. "As it gets closer to Christmas and the parade date, I think the spirit will be there," said Karen Beker, public relations spokesman for the group. The greatest expense is for bands and major-ettes, approximately \$3,500, according to Mrs. Beker. The committee introduced for the first time to the community a Santa Bank, but response is slow. The group hoped to secure \$1,400 but so far has managed only \$140.

The committee expects to receive part of the funding through business and service club donations, said Mrs. Beker. Judging of a Christmas poster contest sponsored by the committee will take place Nov. 8 in the evening at Milton Mall. Trophies will be presented to a top winner in grades one to four. As well, winners will receive a "McDonald Meal", courtesy McDonald's Restaurant in Milton.

A new ranking system for Halton Regional Police is likely to take effect next year. All non-commissioned ranks are now called either Sergeant, Staff Sergeant, Acting Sergeant or Acting Staff Sergeant regardless of whether they work in the uniform or plain clothes division.

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Police study 911 hot line

An emergency hot line for Halton residents is under close scrutiny by the Halton Regional Police Commission. The proposal for the 911 emergency number came under discussion at a meeting of the commissioners Thursday. The plan states the 911 number would ring into a police station, allowing officers to immediately notify fire, ambulance or the police department. When an emergency call is now received requesting the police, it is received at the switchboard, then transferred to the communications office; which in turn is given to the dispatcher for the necessary action. The police communication system now costs \$123,600 per year, but the additional 911 service would boost the bill to \$238,165. Acting as consultant for the plan is former Halton Regional Police Chief Ken Skerrett. The commission has referred the subject to its next meeting, to which Mr. Skerrett has been invited to provide further details on the proposal.

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Vandal sought

Police are continuing their investigation into the theft and burning of a 1977 sports car belonging to a Milton man. Police have made no arrests. It is the second incident of its kind in two months. The car, owned by Jay Cassidy of 318 Kingsway Place, was stolen October 20 from his driveway. The car had been left locked, but with a spare key in the glove compartment. The car was later discovered at Sherman Sand and Gravel on Derry Rd. The car was completely gutted by fire.

THE EXPROPRIATIONS ACT
NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER OF an application by Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario as represented by the Minister of Government Services (expropriating authority) for approval to expropriate land being part of Lots 14 and 15, in Concession 4, New Survey, in the Town of Milton and part of Lot 15, in Concession 5, New Survey, in the Town of Halton Hills, both in the Regional Municipality of Halton in the Province of Ontario for the purpose of acquiring land for the James Snow Parkway.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the land described in Schedule "A" attached hereto.

Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing.

NOTES:

1. The Expropriations Act provides that,

(a) where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Attorney General;

(b) the inquiry officer,

(i) shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and

(ii) may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.

2. "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows:

"owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;

"registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper registry, land titles or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll.

3. The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
