A taste of things to come

Jan. 6, 1981-Flyers captain Marty Venner today announced the firing of owner Vern Gooding. The Flyers captain said he was making the decision as a result of a players' meeting which endorsed the owner's dismissal.

"The situation has become unbearable for the players," said Venner. "Something had to be done and we figured getting rid of Vern was a lot easier than bringing in a whole slew of players." No decision was made with respect to Gooding's wife Beth who, despite keeping a low profile, is heavily involved with the running of

the team. "She does a good job in the hall after the game," added Venner. "and she keeps track of the stats pretty well so we'll keep her. But the owner has got to go."

The situation was brought about by Gooding's threat to replace coach Punch Imlach with Big Daddy Idi Amin who lost his job as the coach of the Ugandan Red Army team two years ago when he had to leave town in a hurry.

Big Daddy, as he's affectionately known to his admirers hasn't coached for over a year. Indications were that he would employ the same type of discipline he used last year in the Milton Industrial League as well as his previous stints with the Ugandan national team—which saw him change bodies frequently, although none of his former players every played again.

"Look, all we're doing is playing hockey for Milton," said Venner. "We don't get paid and we have to uphold the town's honor in the province.

"We've put up with Vern's shenanigans long enough. This isn't the 1970s anymore. We're looking for an owner who remains in the background and just pays the bills so we have something to do every Friday night."

Venner added that few prospective owners have come forward, although he had several names in mind. Among those mentioned were John Paul Getty II, Mayor Anne MacArthur and Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini. The Iranian leader has vowed to take the team on a tour of the States.

Meanwhile, Gooding didn't take the decision very well and immediately went into a conference with former Toronto Maple Leaf president Harold Ballard. Last year, both Ballard and Imlach lost their jobs when Darryl Sittler axed the pair for interfering in his livelihood.

"I really can't imagine why the players decided to let me go," explained Gooding, in tears. "We'd played almost two-thirds of the schedule and we still had the same coach we started out with. I just felt that it was time for a change. Big Daddy had promised nine-a-day workouts."

The team has been playing well lately, boasting a winning record in the practices and a losing record in the games. But added together, Flyers were playing .500 hockey.

"You should see the things that are going on here," said one identified Flyer veteran. "Gooding kept changing the locks to the dressing room so we can't steal the sticks and give them to our girlfriends' little brothers to play road hockey.

"Things are getting pretty bad. I joined the team so I could get my choice of girls at the dances after the games. And now, none of the girls will come near us.'

Gooding has since enlisted the support of new national Liberal leader Don Gordon who is a former mayor of Milton.

"Gordon is trying to get Prime Minister Joke Lark to pass legislation for an owners' union," explained Gooding. "He said if Lark doesn't pass the legislation he'll open a publishing house and get the copyright to Maureen McTeer's memoirs."

Meanwhile, Flyers held their first practice in Miami Beach and easily defeated a team of Miami Dolphin cheerleaders in a game of water

Gooding was last seen in the dressing room of the Milton novice rep team, pleading with the players to let him own the team.

goals with singles going to Barry Musselman and Harold Merry.



They're definitely not a last-place club." Will's sentiments are echoed in the standings. The


