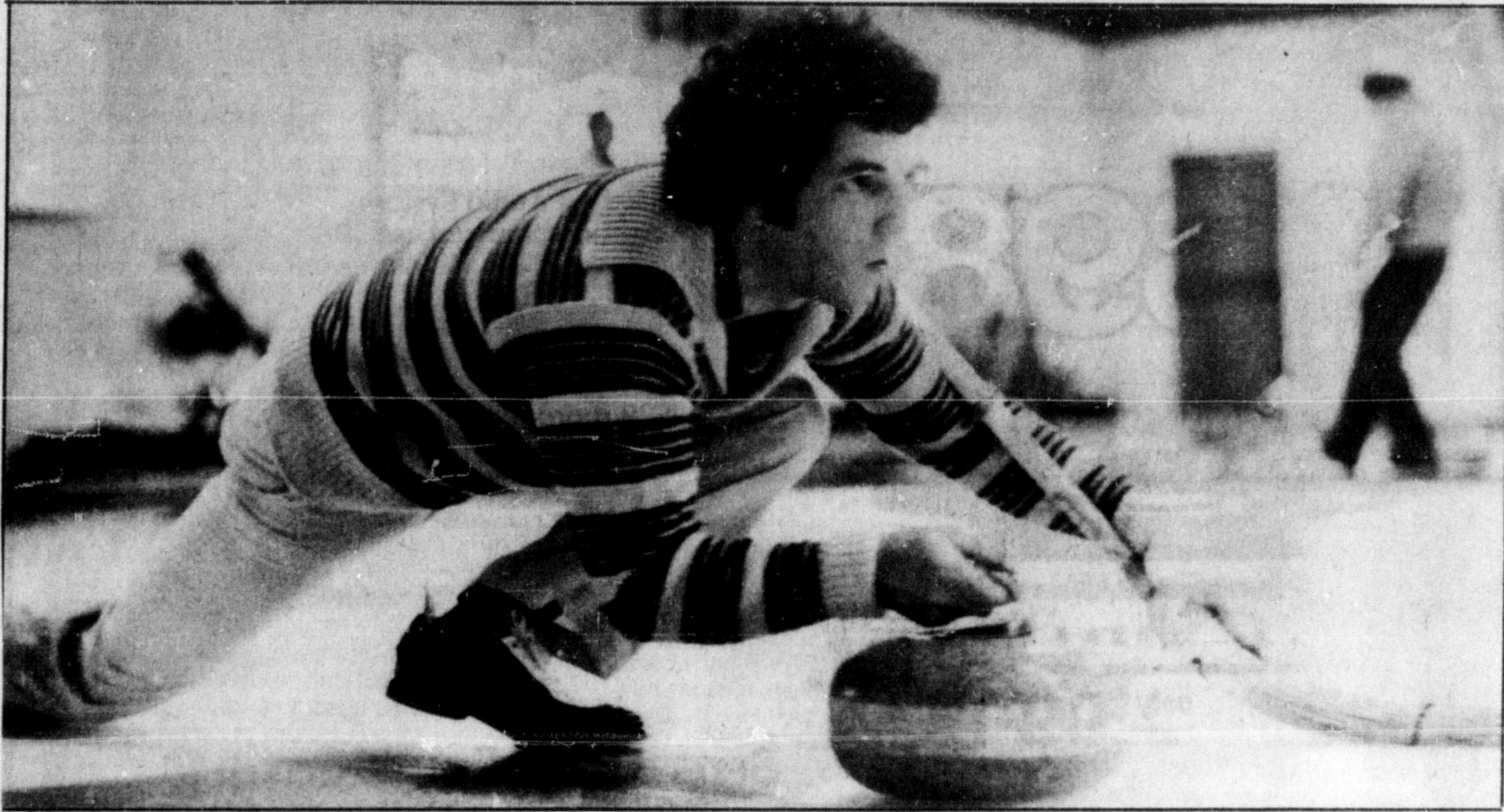

## Docs come from behind

Milton Docs & Dents minor atoms strung together seven consecutive goals, rallying from a 4-1 disadvantage to turn back Oakville 9-5 Sunday at Memorial Arena.

The Docs and Dents had a successful week, tying Georgetown 7-7 Tuesday in Georgetown before blanking Guelph 10-0 in Guelph Saturday afternoon as the squad turned their goal scorers loose during the week. Against Guelph, Milton trailed 4-1 midway through the final period before rebounding with a solid team effort to take command of the contest.

Milton's Chris Harrison opened the scoring 93 seconds into the game, converting a good passing play with Adam Mead.

Oakville struck back with three unanswered goals in the first period and one more in the second before the Docs and Dents applied some medicine to their offensive ills.

Matt McCandless began the comeback connecting with a blast from the circle. Todd Hlushko continued the rally two minutes later before Bryan Haringa tied the score before the end of the middle frame.

Milton took the lead just 33 seconds into the third when McCandless hit for his second of the night. Harrison, Hlushko and Harrison again kept the rally going scoring before the periods halfway mark.

Both teams traded goals late in the game with McCandless scoring for Milton. Milton netminder Jim Murray came up with some excellent stops including a great toe stop from a shot directly in front of the goal and several others on deflections.

Against Guelph, Milton took command outshooting the home team by a 44-5 margin. McCandless led the potent attack with four

goals while Haringa and Jason Bahman added a pair of goals apiece. Doug Poulton and Paul Allen scored singles.

Steven Dall and Murray shared the shutout honors.

Last Tuesday night, Georgetown rallied with 28 seconds to play to tie Milton for the second time this year.

Milton led 3-2 at the end of the first before Georgetown tied it at 4-4 going into the final

period.

McCandless started Milton with his first of three after just 12 seconds. Hlushko scored on a nice end-to-end rush before McCandless got his second of the night late in the opening period.

In the second period, Bahman put Milton ahead for the first time in the game from John Snow before Georgetown rallied for two unanswered goals to take the

lead.

McCandless and Danny Brown scored in the third for the Docs & Dents which tied the score at 6-6. Allen connected on a rebound from a shot by Hlushko to give Milton the lead with just three minutes to play.

This set the stage for the final goal of the game while Milton was short-handed and Georgetown had pulled their goaltender for an extra attacker.

## Major atoms to final in Dundas tourney

Milton Legionaires major atoms advanced to the finals of the Valleytown Invitational tournament before bowing to a power-laden squad from Belle River 7-0 in Dundas on the weekend.

Belle River was easily the top team at the tourney running up 13-3 and 13-0 scores before encountering Milton in the championship game.

Milton advanced to the final by virtue of a 3-2 penalty-shot victory over arch-rival Oakville and a 1-0 blanking of Burlington in the 10-team draw-

style tourney. Oakville and Milton tied 1-1 at the end of regulation time. Milton won the contest by outscoring Oakville 2-1 in five penalty shots.

Robbie Wilson had scored Milton's lone goal in regulation time at 8:22 of the third period from Stuart Thorne. The draw necessitated the penalty shots.

Oakville scored on their first shot but Milton goalkeeper Blair Leonard blanked them to the rest of the way. Geoff Pollen and the winner by Scott Hilson on the last

penalty shot secured the win. Both netminders, Denis Poulin and Leonard, were cited by Milton coach Dennis Buttrey for their outstanding play during the tourney.

Wayne Rivers scored at 5:01 from Doug Drennan to allow the Legionaires to slip by Burlington 1-0 in the semi-final. Leonard earned the shutout.

# Dick wins county title

A crowd of more than 200 watched the girls' volleyball team of W.I. Dick Middle School capture the Halton County championships for the third consecutive year at E.C. Drury School Wednesday night.

The squad capped its fine play of the season with some excellent teamwork and fine style to win every game in the three-team tournament.

North Halton swept the tournament when the boys' team from Centennial Public School in Georgetown won the championship 2-0 over Tecumseh of Burlington.

W.I. Dick defeated Eastview from Oakville and John T. Tuck from Burlington twice in the two-game round-robin before downing Tuck 2-0 in the best-of-three final.

"Don't say we won easily," said Dick coach Sue Amos. "We won comfortably. Tournaments like this are very unpredictable."

Miss Amos commented on her team's composure and team spirit throughout the competition.

"They kept their composure and played their game throughout the series. More important than winning or learning volleyball skills, the girls learned to get along and rely on one another. They really came to understand the meaning of total effort and team spirit."

It was a long march to the championships for the team which began practices in September. The efforts paid off in a 56-6 record in exhibition and league games which culminated with the county title.

In addition, the team won a tourney in Burlington in October and the Milton District High School tournament earlier in November.

The members of the team were mentioned in last week's paper.

The managers of the team are Kirsten Jarvis, Shelby Smith, Monique Hadley and Leanne Caputo.

This ends volleyball for elementary schools this year. The schools begin basketball soon.

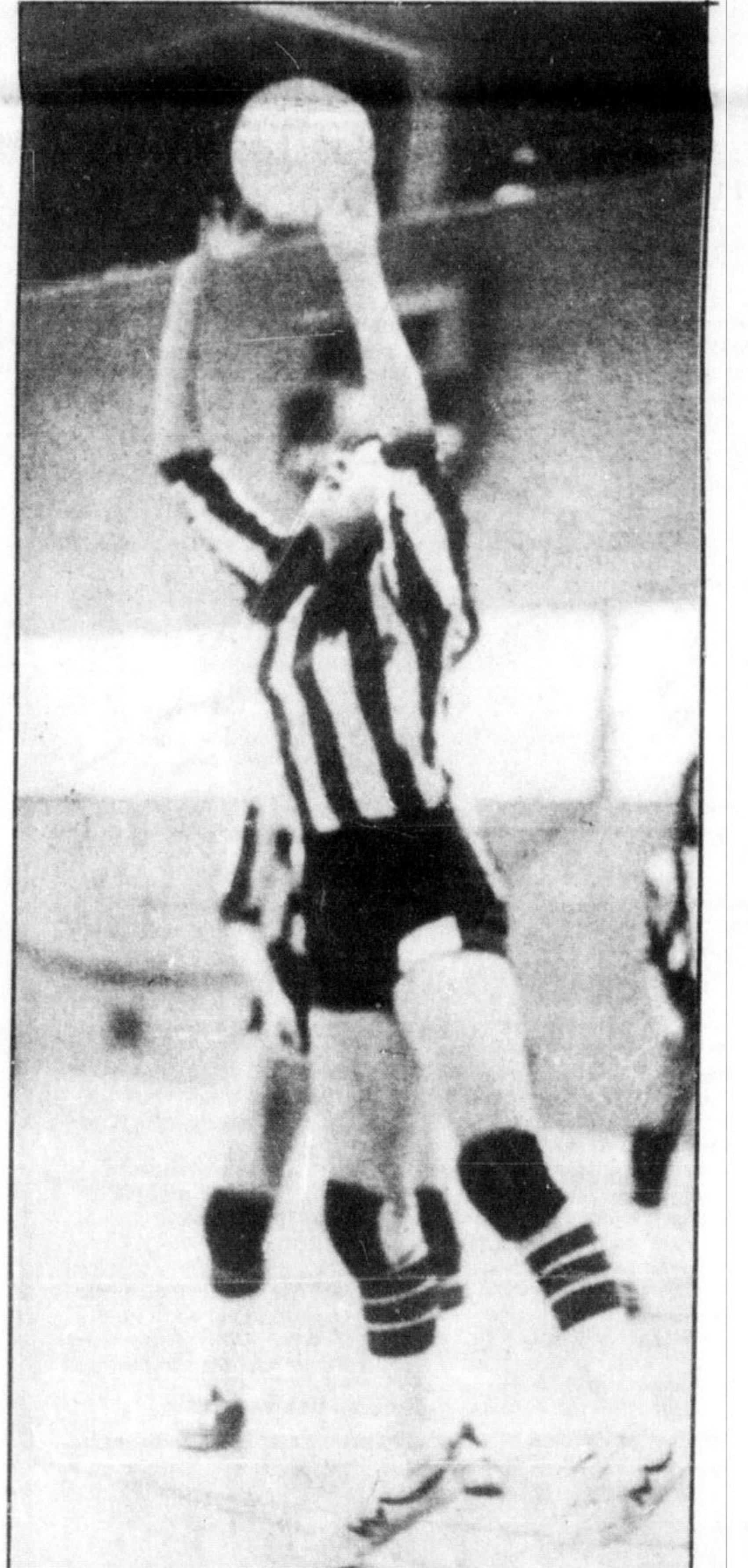

## Masson testing Hawaii run

While some marathon runners find Boston and Tokyo more to their liking, Larry Masson has chosen perhaps a better locale for only his second marathon of his life—Honolulu, Hawaii.

Masson and his wife Joan are currently in Hawaii beginning a two-week vacation. The holiday will be interrupted Sunday when Masson and a friend from Banff, Alberta will be running around volcanoes in one of the prettiest marathons in the world.

The 28-year-old runner ended his job last week as a police officer in Cambridge to take a position as the administrator for the Bezek Centre, a Christian religious retreat north of Campbellville.

In between the two jobs, the couple decided to take a holiday in Hawaii where Masson could run in the marathon.

While the couple was on holiday last winter in Banff, they met up with Ron Addington on a ski lift who enticed Masson to run in Hawaii.

"He said he'd like to run but he didn't want to run alone so he convinced me to go," said Masson.

Masson runs about 50 miles a week over the country roads near the religious retreat. He said he hopes the change of jobs will allow him to control his running and diet better.

"Shift-work on the police force was a problem because I had to weigh 160 lbs. I had to eat like a horse to keep my weight up. I hope to up my mileage to 70-80 miles a week."

His first marathon was the Toronto Police Marathon over the summer. He accomplished both goals, to finish and to run under three and one-half hours. He bettered the time by one minute.

The race in Honolulu gets underway Sunday at 6 a.m. while it's still dark. The hot temperatures during the day dictate the early start. About 8,000 competitors are expected.

However, Inglis says he hasn't made up his mind either way and may not even attend practice tonight.

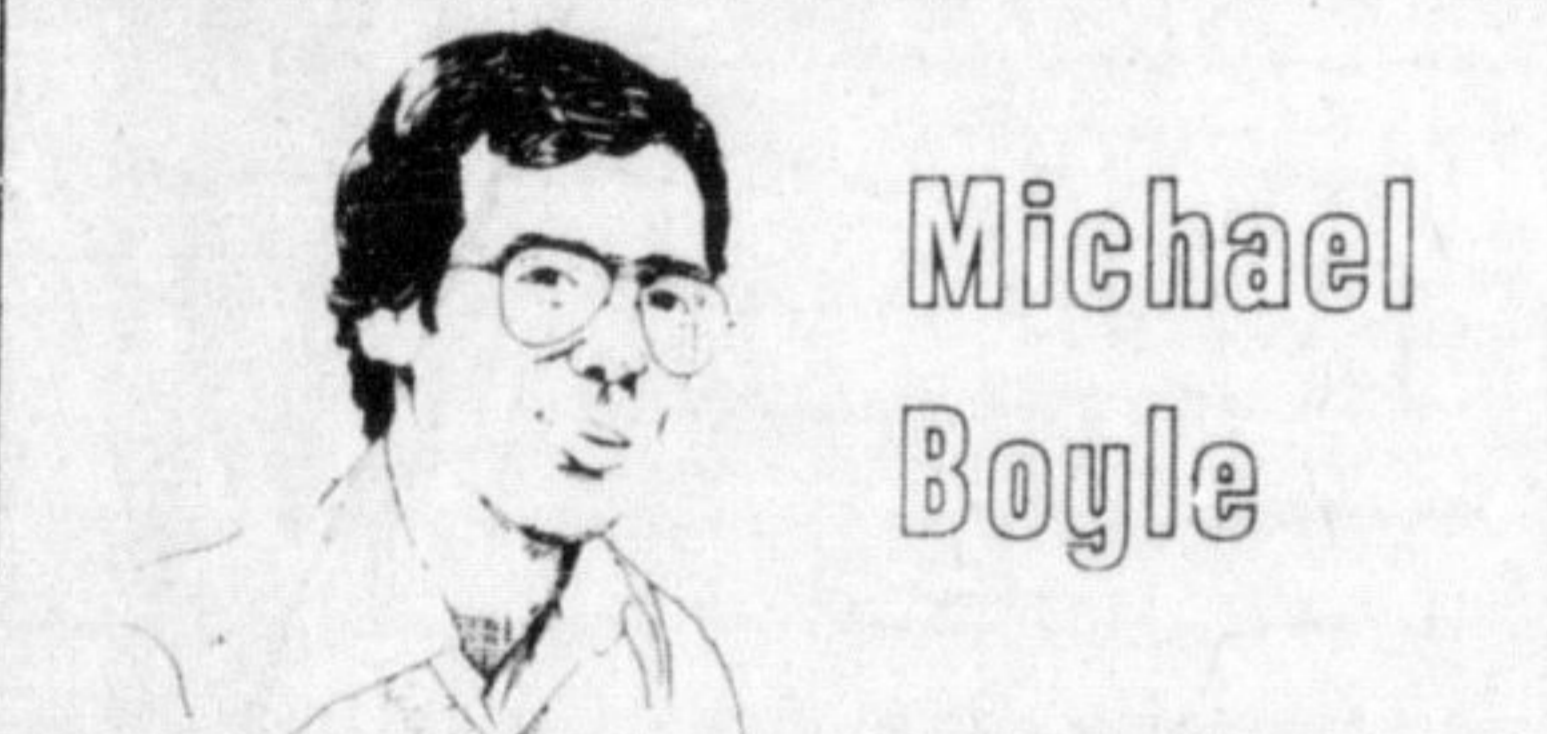
"I don't know anything about the team," said the Georgetown native. "And I surely haven't given a commitment to coach the team."

The senior boys' basketball team of Milton District High School bowed out of the Kawartha Classic tournament on the weekend in the second round.
