### Police yearbook

The Halton Region Police Association is planning its first yearbook.

The book is due to be released in May in conjunction with Police Week and will feature articles, pictures and material on the activities of police officers and social events.

The publication will also include some historical features, according to Bill Gall, association president.

"The main aim of the project will be to preserve the history of the Association and give us the opportunity to share us and the force with the public we serve," explained Norm Ryall, chairman of the yearbook committee.

He said the Association plans to publish 5,000 copies of the book for free distribution throughout the region.

Money made through the sale of advertising will go towards two community projects.

Half of the expected \$4,000 revenue will be given to the Ontario Society for Crippled Children.

MDHS students delivered the boxes of food Friday afternoon to Meals on Wheels recipients. Afterwards, Mr. Curry treated the students to a turkey dinner.

### Can attend...

Regional councillors can attend staff meetings but they shouldn't expect to take part or vote on recommendations.

Milton Councillor Bill Johnson was told that is all he can expect to do at the staff level; even though he complained to council that he had been told he "wasn't invited" to a recent meeting of the technical staff of the Solid Waste Management Committee.

That committee was recently re-organized extensively after Mr. Johnson complained the eight staff members on it were outvoting the three regional councillors.

The committee, which is charged with mapping the future of Halton's waste disposal programs, was changed so that staff members lost their voting privileges and two more councillors, Ron Planche and Mike Armstrong, were added.

Mr. Johnson told regional council last week he had to drive 40 miles to attend a technical meeting and had been told to leave.

He said he felt it was his right as a regional councillor to attend any meeting he feels necessary as part of his regional responsibility.

consensus to standing committees and council where regional members can then discuss the issue and accept, amend, or vote down the suggestions.

Although this is the regional view on staff committee meetings, as expressed by Chairman Jack Raftis, Mr. Johnson did get some support.

Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett said that any staff member at Oakville who told him to leave would in turn be told to leave his job by Mr. Barrett.

Oakville Councillor Laurie Mannell said he thought members should go to meetings because it is the only way to keep a grasp on information which never rises to the council level.

### Dies in car crash

A 22-year-old Milton woman died early Saturday morning, just two days before Christmas as a result of injuries received in a car-bus crash last Wednesday.

Dead is Jaye Macmillan of 26 Main St., Milton.

Mrs. MacMillan was a passenger in a car driven by 22-year-old Sherry Sim of 6472 Trafalgar Rd., Hornby.

Miss Sim is reported in good condition at Hamilton General Hospital.

According to Halton Regional Police the tragedy occurred Wednesday at approximately 4:30 p.m. on Appleby Line south of Four Sideroad, when Miss Sim lost control of her car and slid into the path of a school bus driven by Nora Pyke of Burlington.

The two vehicles were travelling in opposite directions.

The bus driver and two Burlington youngsters received minor injuries.

Milton police officers attributed slippery and snow covered road conditions to the collision.

The Milton Fire Department was called to assist with the rescue of the two victims.

She is survived by her husband, Jack.

Kevin Poirier, 17, of Toronto was picked up by Metro Police.
