Pro Clean gets untracked

Showing new coach Marcel Zwolman they haven't given up the ship, Pro Clean Shiner Hogs doubled the score on Milton Chrysler-Dodge 4-2 in Milton Industrial Hockey League action Sunday night at Milton Sports Centre.

Fish and Game news

The non-resident fishing licence will be increased from \$10.75 to \$15 per season, the Ministry of Natural Resources has announced. The four-day licence will be raised to \$8 from \$6. The licence for Canadians who don't reside in Ontario will be raised to \$6 from \$4. The increases have been in effect since the first of this month.

These increases are necessary to help cover the rising costs of managing Ontario's fishery programs. The additional costs to non-residents are expected to increase revenue by \$2.5 million.

The Ministry says the costs of managing the fisheries amount to about \$13 million annually.

The Ministry has also announced new regulations for bow hunters. Natural Resources Minister James Auld says you would not use a .22 calibre rifle to hunt big game because they are underpowered and for the same reason he doesn't want bow hunters to use underpowered equipment that would maim and not kill.

Some of the new regulations are:

- 1) Crossbows must have a draw length of one foot.
- 2) Arrows and bolts must be equipped with a head that has at least two sharp, unserrated, barbless steel, straight cutting edges.
- 3) The head must not be less than seven-eighths inches at the widest point.
- 4) Arrows must be at least two feet in length.
- 5) Longbows (including compound bows) and recurve bows, when used for hunting deer, must have a minimum draw weight of 40 pounds and a draw weight of 49 pounds when hunting moose and bear. Crossbows must have a draw weight of 100 pounds for hunting deer and 119 pounds when hunting moose and bear.

The use of archery weapons has increased dramatically since the early 1970's. The ministry is asking hunters to use equipment which kills quickly and in a humane fashion.

This still has not been a good winter so far for skiers and ice fishermen. Ice conditions are good one week and poor the next after our heavy rains.

Some parts of Lake Simcoe are good with a lot of operators in full swing. After phoning a reputable hut operator we found lake travel is tricky and should not be attempted without reliable information. Lake Nipissing is in full operation, except out from North Bay. The south shore is good with limited catches of pike and pickerel.

Again, ask for information before leaving home. Lake Erie has broken up around the Long Point and Peacock Point areas. So stay away for a while. Things are bound to get better.

Don't forget the Halton Sportmen's Club's big Wild Game Supper and Awards Night this Saturday. There is a lot of work attached to this night so please help the fellows who have been doing all the work for years.
