Peewee selects take second title

For the second year in a row, Milton peewee selects captured the championship at the annual Four-Town Select hockey tournament on the weekend in Streetsville.

Milton downed Orangeville 6-2 in the opener before edging Streetsville 2-1 in the final to cop the title. It was the first time since 1969 any Milton team won back-to-back titles at the Four-Town tourney.

In their first game, the selects scored four goals in a span of two minutes and 51 seconds of the third period to outscore Orangeville 6-2.

Milton opened the scoring in the first period with Alan James scoring his first of four goals assisted by Steven Ralph. In the

second period James scored again, assisted by Rich Brodie and Ralph.

Orangeville came back to score two quick goals to tie the game at 2-2. Then Milton goalie Tom Hill came up with the save of the day, stopping a two-man breakaway and the momentum changed back to Milton.

James scored two more goals with single markers going to Bill Simpson and Brad Wells. Assisting on those goals were Chris Wakely, Alan Dariou and Don Vandenheuevel.

In the championship game, goaltending was still a big plus for Milton. This time Ron James played an excellent game

between the pipes.

Milton out-skated, out-shot and out-hustled a stubborn Streetsville team to win the championship.

Milton again opened the scoring late in the first period with Alan James scoring on a pass from Wakely. In the second period Rich Brodie scored what proved to be the winner on assists from Bill Simpson and Kevin Gervais.

Streetsville came back to score their only goal late in the third. With Milton playing a man short, Streetsville pulled their goalie but a determined Milton team kept them off the scoreboard.

Much like last year it was a team effort. Strong goaltending of Tom Hill and Ron James, the checking of the defencemen Jon Griffiths, Ted Poulton, Dave Langlois, Chris Wakely, Rich Davies and Paul McCutcheon, and the playmaking of the forwards Brad Wells, Bobby Warwick, Don Vandenheuevel, Bill Simpson, Kevin Gervais, Alan Dariou, Steven Ralph, Rich Brodie and Alan James paced the win.

Coach Larry Scott said he was proud of the effort of the players and noted his team was the only peewee select team to use all 17 players, which supported his stand on team play rather than having one superstar.

With no time remaining on the clock, Streetsville's Scott Johnston scored to tie the game. But referee Randy Hipson ruled no goal due to the fact time had run out. But Dave Coburn, the back referee felt time was still in when the puck crossed the line even though he was stationed at the Blue Line.

To break the deadlock both referees asked timekeeper Roger Graham for his opinion who ruled time was still in. The goal counted and the teams went back for a 10 minute overtime period.

Again Milton controlled the play but

could not beat David McIgan, the Streetsville netminder.

With three seconds left and the puck supposedly frozen the clock was stopped anticipating a whistle. The puck came loose and a Streetsville player poked the puck in.

Milton was sent home to play the consolation final against Orangeville who were beaten 5-2 by Georgetown.

Playing with just nine skaters and eventually losing one with just one period gone, Milton tried but playing short-handed for about 13 minutes in the first two periods fell behind 4-0 on four power play goals before Steve Duguay scored on a beautiful rush to break the goose egg.

Although playing full strength for most of the third period, Milton could not find the range and eventually just ran out of gas.

Special mention to Steve Marshall who played goal superbly although suffering with a sore back. Defence man Alan Nicholson and Jeff Feenstra who played about 90 per cent of the game, also forwards Roddy O'Donnell and Steve Duguay.

Milton Grant Haulage minor bantams outplayed but failed to outscore Riverside losing 3-1 and were eliminated in the semi-finals of a tournament in Harriston, near Listowel on the weekend.

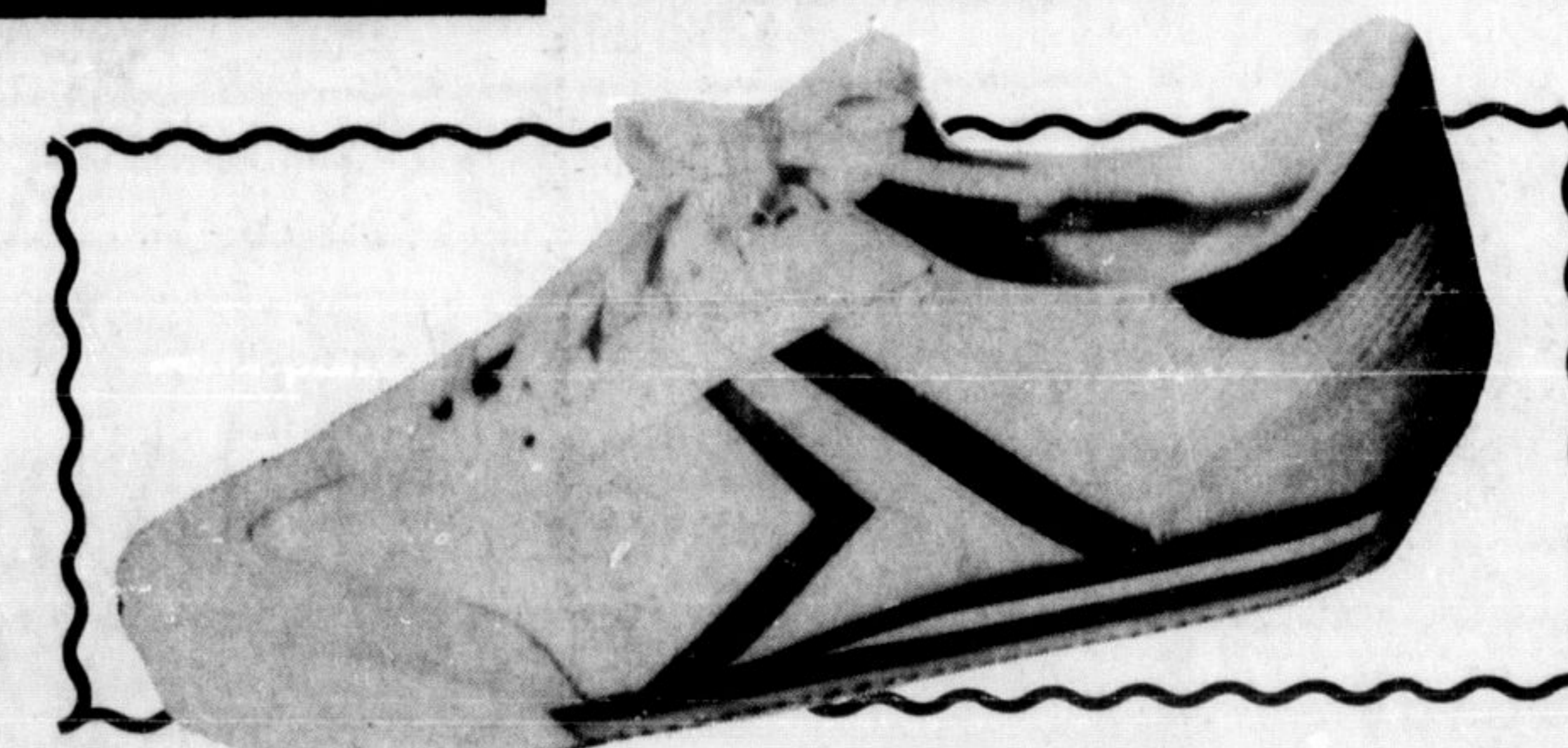
