The Halton Conservation Authority will open specific areas within its property for deerhunting this

A three day hunting season for whitetail deer was recently proposed by the ministry of natural

resources and approved by Halton region. According to a report by the Conservation Authority the deer population in this area has risen substantially and has created many problems for local farmers, as well as a jump in the number of cardeer road accidents.

Chudleigh Apple Farms in Milton reported a \$20,000 loss due to deer damage, as did also Environs Nurseries, west of Milton.

Robert Edmondson, wildlife biologist for the Authority said the hunting will be carried out in areas of Kelso, northern parts of Hilton Falls and Crawford

Limits will be set on the number of hunters allowed in each area. Hunters will be required to contact the Authority

for permission to hunt on their land. The Ministry will have checkpoints established throughout the Region where deer can be taken for

examination. There will also be a large contingent of conservation officers within the region during the three days to check on hunters and answer any landowner complaints.

The last hunting season in Halton for deer was held

This year's hunt is expected to result in a harvest of 100 to 120 deer. The hunt will be held November 3 to 5.




