Horticultural Notes

Wildflowers are featured

Frank Krenshaw of the Metro Toronto Parks Department spoke to the March meeting of Milton and District Horticultural Society on wildflowers and their cultivation.

Mr. Krenshaw illustrated his talk with excellent color slides of native wildflowers, many of which have marvellous names such as Enchanter's Nightshade, Turk's Cap Lily, Dutchman's Breeches, Joe Pye Weed, Indian Paintbrush, Shooting Star, and Doll's Eyes. Other colorful names include animals such as Goatsbeard, Harebell, Butterfly Weed, Cranebill, Fleabane, Henbit, Catnip, Viper's Bugloss, Squirrel Corn, Skunk Cabbage, Adder's Tongue or Dogtooth Violet.

Because this area is so rich in varieties of wildflowers, gardeners have many types with which to experiment in the home garden. Some plants have quite specific cultural requirements and successful cultivation can be difficult, he

said. Golden Corydalis, for example, requires rocky limestone soil while Spring Beauty requires moist humusy soil. Yellow Lady's Slipper, Bunchberry, and Wild Lupine all need a low pH or acid soil with oak leaves and pine needles for mulch. Others, however, such as Solomon's Seal, Herb Robert, Trillium, Dame's Rocket, Native Phlox, Foamflower, and Wild Ginger can take quite readily to taming in the garden.

Of special interest at the meeting was a delightful collection of applehead and cornhusk dolls crafted by Jean Robertson. Five very elderly applehead ladies, dressed in shawls, bonnets, and long dresses, were on display. Two cleverly dressed applehead men were a grandpa in plaid shirt and cords, and a sugaring-off habitant in tuque and turtle-neck sweater. 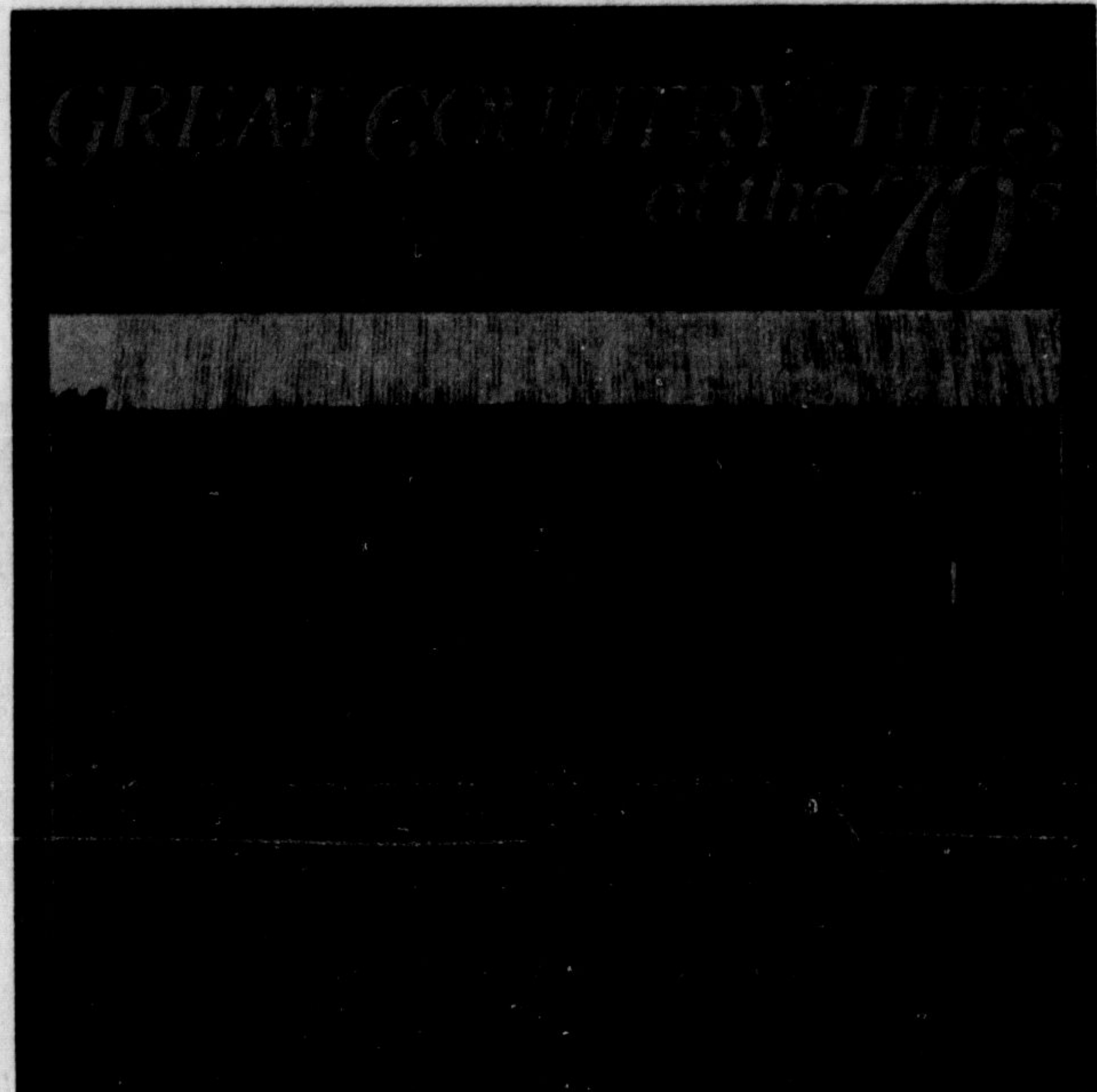

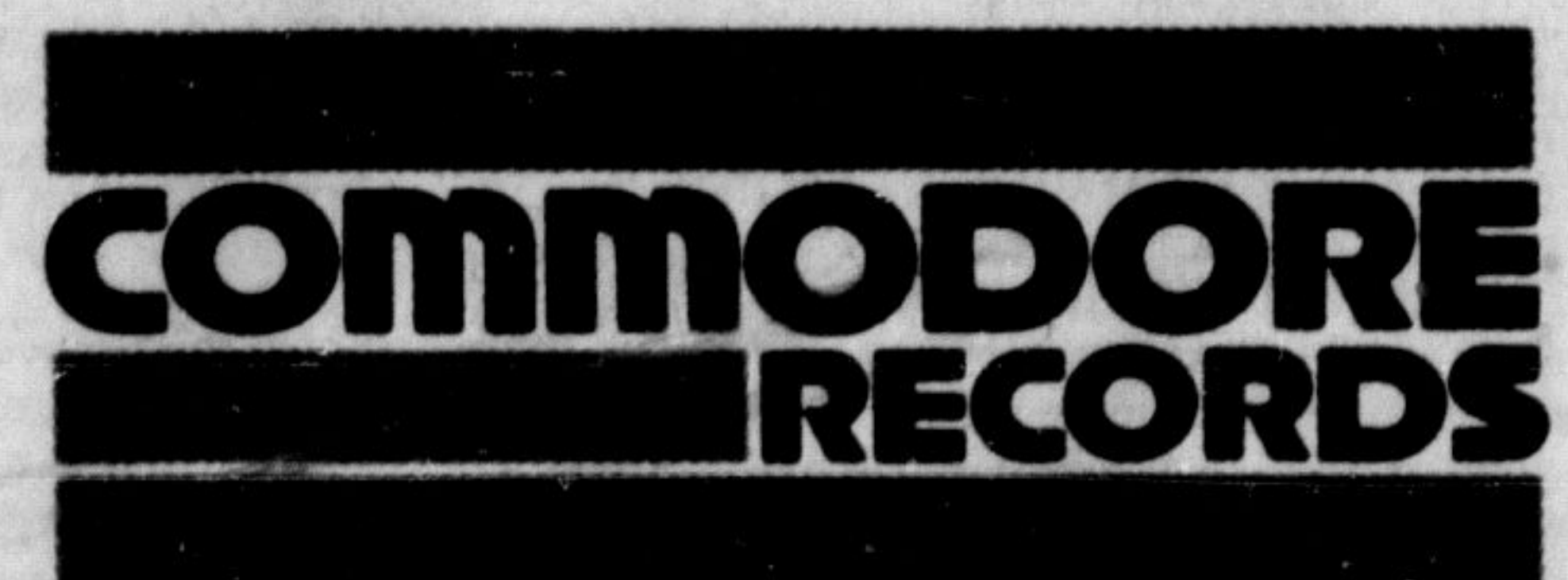
