With spring, come the sales people: roof repairs, magazines, dirveway pavers, and more. Milton Chamber of Commerce has already had complaints about sales organizations from local residents, and issued its annual spring warning again this week: Check it out before you sign anything.

Chamber secretary Margaret Burgess reports one telephone sales firm attempted to represent itself as a member of the Chamber last week. A check of Chamber membership lists shows the firm is not a member.

Someone was solicited by phone and asked personal questions about pension cheques and money in the house. Don't answer such questions, hang up immediately, she suggested.

There are many legitimate sales groups, she said. If in doubt, check them out with the Chamber or Better Business Bureau. Companies also need a town licence to sell door-to-door in Milton, so be sure you ask to see any sales person's licence.


