

# Regals make it three in a row

If exhibition games were any indication which unfortunately they usually are not, the Milton Fifth Wheel Regals should reverse their last year's record in junior fastball play.

The Regals rolled to their third exhibition-game win, by trouncing Guelph Oaks of the Grand Valley Junior League, by a 16-0 score Sunday night at Rotary Park.

This win followed on the heels of their convincing 25-1 win over Hornby Juniors, last Thursday at home.

In the Hornby game, Karen Vickery and Sue Harey combined to limit the visitors to a pair of safeties, while setting down eight of the opposition on strikeouts.

Regals meanwhile tallied 17 hits in the game, with Lori Morton, Linda Gehrke, Shirley Burra, Carolyn McCarty and Kim Woodhall each collecting a pair of safeties.

Milton continued to get strong pitching in Sunday's encounter with Guelph as Diane Gilmour and Shelley Cook set down the Oaks allowing only a second-inning single during the game.

They were aided by strong defensive play by their team-mates, who turned three double plays behind them.

Cook helped pad the Milton total with a fourth-inning grand slam home run.

Pacing the Regals' 19 hit offence was Debbie

Milburn who had a perfect 5 for 5 night, including two doubles. Kim Woodhall and Linda Gehrke each chipped in with a pair of hits.

Milton's management have expressed early satisfaction with the young club and feel they will likely hold their own with most teams in their grouping. Pitching and defence look more than adequate, while the offence continues to impress.

Milton looks for Oakville and St. Catherines to be the dominant club in their league with Hamilton and Six Nations as unknowns at this time, Dundas looks improved and the new Lowville entry will likely take awhile, before jelling.

# James wins two events in Halton track and field

Ian James captured two events to lead a parade of 11 track and field athletes from Milton District High School into the Peel-Halton championships next Tuesday.

James broke a Halton record in the junior boys long jump with a leap of 6.76 metres and added a first in the triple jump at the Halton region championships Monday at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium.

Final results were not yet tabulated but Milton finished near the bottom in the 15-school championships.

The top athletes from the Peel-Halton championships advance to the regional meet May 28 and can move to the provincial championships June 6-7. All events are at

Centennial Stadium. Milton received some fine performances from the midget girls team which will send four athletes and narrowly missed sending the relay team. The top six athletes and top three relay teams move on the Peel-Halton championships.

Debra Jackman was third in the long jump, Cindy Funk was third in the shot put, Carmelina Crisci was fourth in the 100-metre sprint and Nadine Morby finished fifth in the 3,000 metres. The girls relay team was fifth.

The senior team will send two, one athlete for track and one for field. Toni Chambers was sixth in the 3,000 metres while Janet Rerech was sixth in the long jump.

On the boys side, Milton

Acheson was the sole midget to advance by virtue of his sixth-place performance in the shot put. The junior boys relay team was fifth.

In senior boys, three runners finished in the top six in six different events to qualify.

Roy Poloni led the contingent with a third in

the 3,000 metres, a third in the 1,500 metres and a fourth in the 2,000-metre steeplechase. John Phelps finished one placing ahead of Poloni in each of the 3,000 metres and the steeplechase to qualify in two events while Peter Schmidt was fifth in the 1,500 metres.

# Pay television near

After more than five years on the drawing board awaiting government approval, pay television may be operating in Canada by next year.

Halton Cable Systems general manager James Magee and program director John Ollivier say pay television is now a subject under heavy discussion at the Canadian Radio and Television Commission, CRTC, special committee hearings in Ottawa.

Subject of the meetings include the extension of television service to northern and remote communities now receiving poor service, satellite distribution and pay television. In a brief presented by the Canadian Cable Television Association, the problem of providing adequate service to the remote areas of Canada can be solved through Cable's satellite and pay television proposals.

Pay television will offer an additional service to customers with a selection of commercial-free current movies, live concerts and night club acts in the monthly package.

The programs in the package will be repeated throughout the month. The service will be an estimated additional \$10 to \$12 monthly. Funds generated

from pay television will go towards promoting and developing Canadian programming and local talent as well as a 50 cent subsidy per pay television subscriber, which would cover the cost of programming, packaging and satellite delivery to remote areas.

The Cable Television Association represents some 311 cable television licensees spread throughout Canada. As a whole they represent about 3.8 million subscribers.

Magee said they are hoping for a positive response from the CRTC to the Halton Cable submission. "Over five years ago the idea of pay television was alive in Canada: since then nothing has happened but pay television is now alive and well in the United States," he said.

Recently Halton Cable Systems installed the first satellite receiving dish and 300 ft. antenna in the county. It is now transmitting House of Commons debates with clarity for testing purposes. However, they are awaiting CRTC approval for further use.

"Here's hoping they'll cut some of the red tape like they did in the United States and we can get along with things," Magee said.
