

# We're tightening up on people who abuse Unemployment Insurance.

Most people getting unemployment insurance play by the rules. But some people don't seem to know that they can't take a job and collect benefits without telling us they're working. That's why employers are being asked to send us the starting date and Social Insurance Number or extracts from computer payroll tapes for each employee they hire or rehire. This information is crosschecked with the Social Insurance Numbers of people receiving unemployment insurance benefits. Only cases of potential abuse will ever surface. After investigation, anyone found receiving benefits to which they are not entitled will have to repay them.

It may be an honest mistake. Some people forget or don't understand they must tell Unemployment Insurance and report their total earnings when they start

Social Insurance Numbers of newly-hired employees are now being cross-checked with those of people receiving unemployment insurance benefits. Only cases of potential abuse will

a new job. In that case, repayment is all that's required. But, a penalty or prosecution may follow when the new system detects people wrongly collecting benefits.

If you are collecting unemployment insurance benefits, and start a new job, please say so on your UI claimant report card.

The 4-H Homemaking Club program is open to young people between 12 and 26 years of age.



Police commissions in recent years have been trying to cut back on one of their major costs by introducing smaller police vehicles, while at the same time police associations, which represent the cop on the street, have been fighting to keep the larger cars for safety and other reasons.

The solution reached by the Halton Regional Police is to introduce small Volares and AMC station wagons, for headquarters staff, the Criminal Investigation Bureau, Youth Bureau and Identification Bureau, while keeping patrol officers in the standard sized cars.

Ryall, who has served on the board of directors the Halton Police Association, estimates one-third of the force's fleet could go to the smaller cars.

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
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
