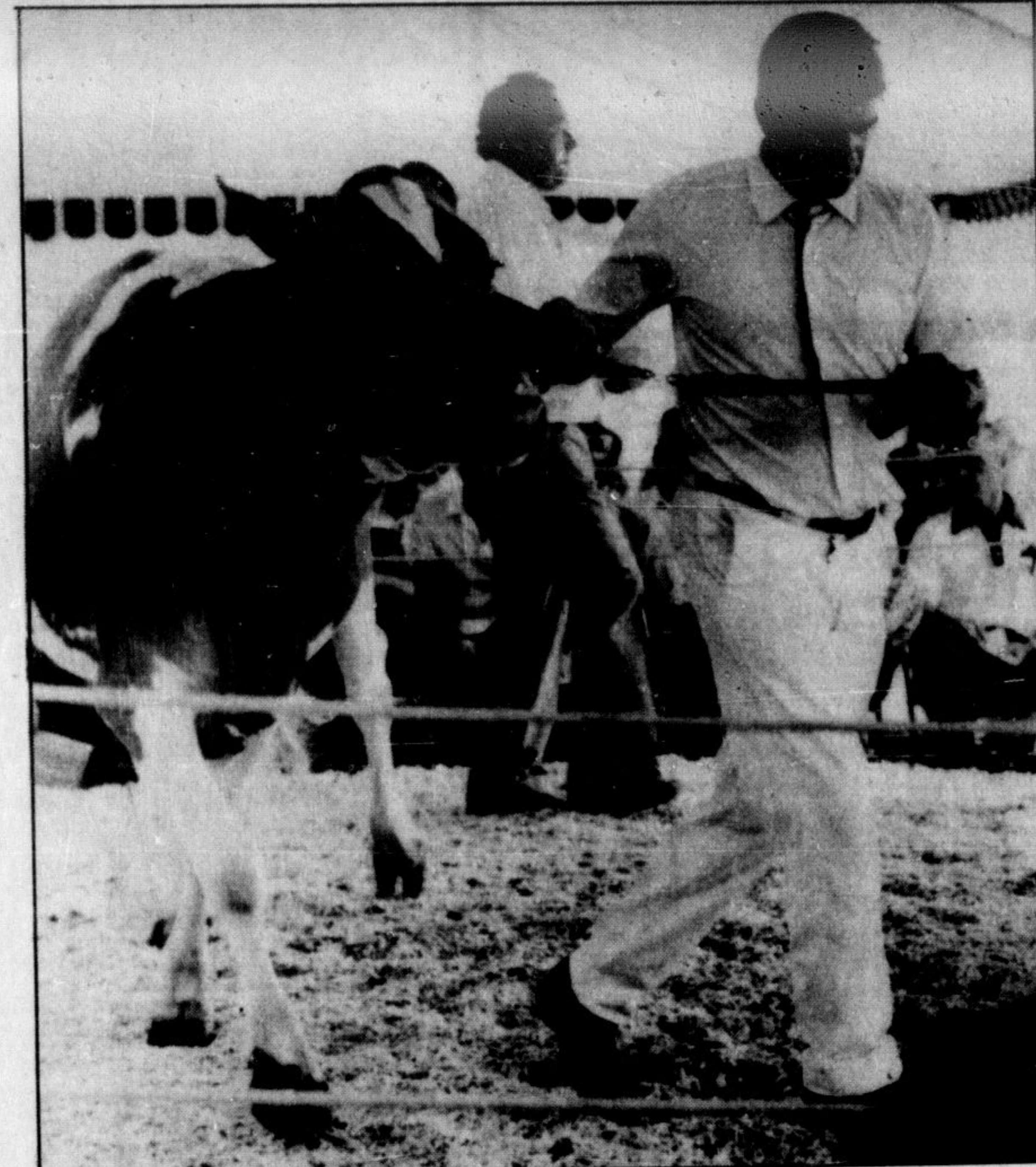


Cattle sale nets \$144,000

There was no bull at the Ontario Guernsey Classic sale Wednesday afternoon, but cows, heifers and calves were auctioned to the highest bidder. Bulls aren't in much demand these days according to John McNabb who hosted the 26th annual sale at his farm in Halton Hills. Artificial insemination is now the most popular technique in the propagating of cattle.



Buy me: John McNabb's farm at Georgetown played host to the 26th Annual Ontario Guernsey Classic at which 49 cows, calves and heifers were auctioned. The sale pulled in a total of \$144,000 Wednesday afternoon as buyers from across the province gathered at Callumlea Farms, about 300 in all.

John B. Merryman of Sparks, Maryland in charge of pedigrees at the sale said it was the largest to be held this year in Canada and the second largest in North America in reference to the day's sales which totaled \$144,000. One of the three excellent class cows sold for \$6,100, the top bid at the sale which attracted dairy farmers from across the province. The weather on Wednesday was also excellent and the largest crowd ever turned out, about 300 in all. Each year a different farm hosts the classic managed by the Guernsey Cattle Breeders Association of Ontario. Callumlea Farms owned by Mr. McNabb who holds a position on the Association's board of directors was the choice this year. Mr. McNabb converted his tool shed into a cattle stable to house the 49 cattle which brought an average sale price of \$2,945. The sale also served as a summer social event for Association members beginning with a complimentary buffet Tuesday evening at Callumlea Farms which attracted 150 guests. The McNabbs' daughter Marilyn was at the sale in her official post of Miss Guernsey.

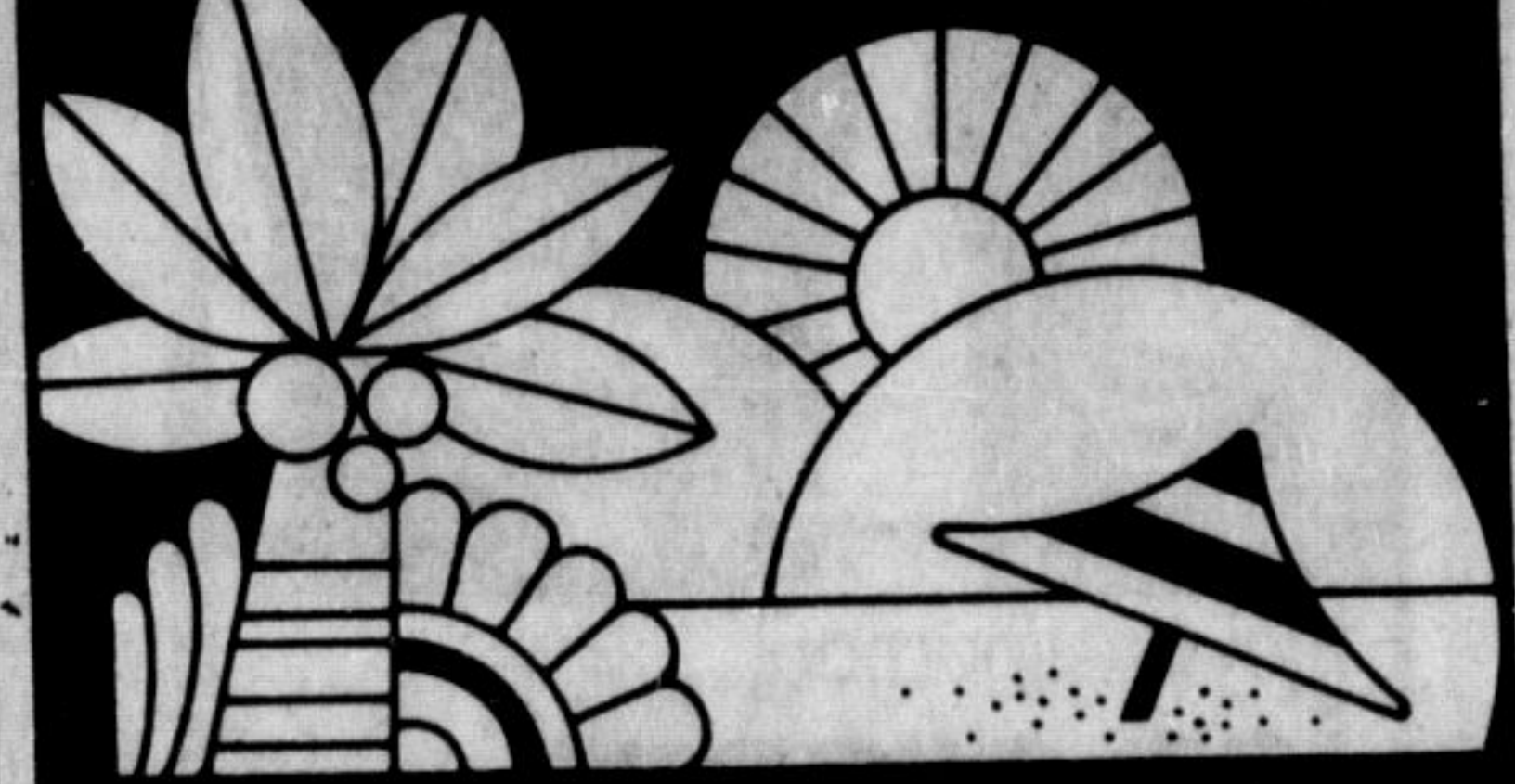
