Nine years' safe driving

Driving defensively should be the goal of all drivers. For Milton's posties it is a pet project.

The national post office is a member of the Canadian Transportation Safety Association and is encouraging all of its employees to hold an accident-free driving record.

On Friday three members of the Milton Post Office were honored by postmaster Cal Hart and supervisor Stu Metcalfe with pins for their efforts.

Receiving recognition were Frank Fellow of Kilbride, for four years of safe driving; Irene Roberts of Cambridge, three years; and Don Wilson of Milton, two years.

"The awards are designed to treat driving as a profession," explained Mr. Hart.

The local post office recorded two accidents in 1979, both with minor damage and no injury to anyone. There has been one accident this year, also of minor consequence, he said.

Good Halton crops predicted

Area farmers appear to be heading for good bumper crops this year, according to the Halton Agricultural Representative.

Only winter wheat has had trouble with some farmers reporting yields as low as five to 15 bushels per acre, said Henry Stanley.

However, some others are getting 50 to 60 bushels to the acre, he added.

With good yields occurring with poor ones, the cause of the problem is not apparent, he said.

Root rot has been the problem in most cases and the incidence is higher in fields where winter wheat has been repeated, the agricultural representative said.

Most of the spring grain crops were planted late because of early

season wetness, so a late fall is needed to complete the growing and harvest season, he said.

The past month, with a lot of heat and rain, has been good and local farmers may get good corn prices with drought problems in the US, he added.

Barley and oats could see yields in the 100 bushel per acre range.

Hay and pastures have grown well this year, meaning a lot of cattle feed, but there will not likely be any reduction in beef prices in the short run and they will climb.

Shoot red fox suspect rabies

A red fox suspected of having rabies was shot and killed by Halton Regional Police in Milton Sunday.

The animal was first seen running near Thompson Rd. and Main St. E. and was later spotted on Graham Bell Ct., Cabot Trail and Woodward Ave.

Police said the fox appeared overly friendly and followed neighbourhood children.

When Constable Vaughan Ashley arrived at one of the homes and attempted to confine the animal, it bit him on the shoe.

Fearing the fox might be rabid, and unable to catch him, he shot the animal.

The carcass was removed by the Halton Hills Animal Control and sent to Ottawa for examination by federal authorities.

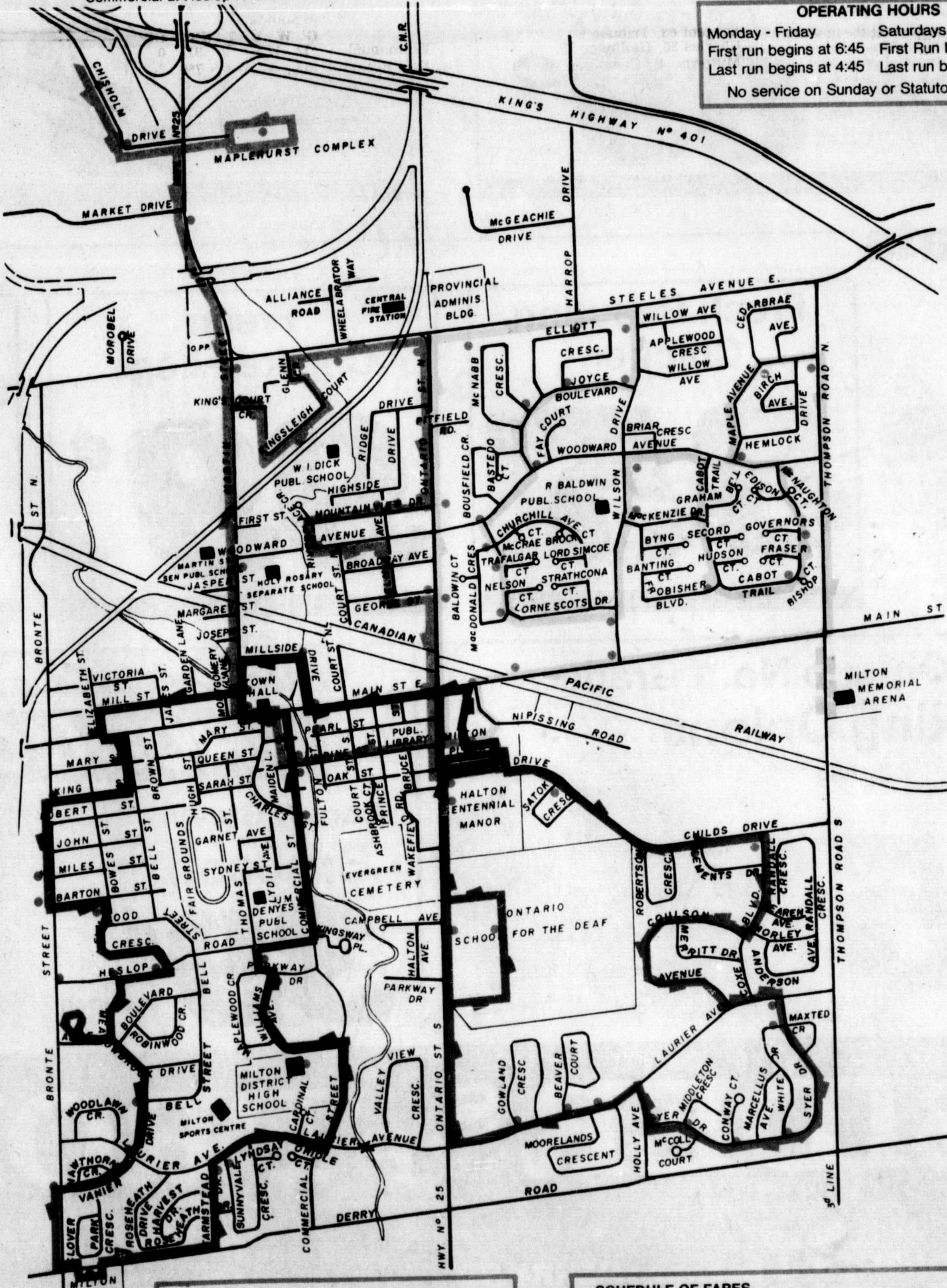
