Salmon fever—there is only one name for it. Everyone seems to have it. They came from Thunder Bay, North Bay, London, Kitchener, Windsor and Kingston. They all have one thought in mind—to catch one of the beautiful silver coho salmon. And catching them seems to be no big problem these past few weeks.

The salmon in the first three weeks in September have been about one to one and half miles off Bronte Creek and about the same distance out for the Credit River. The salmon are schooling for the final run up Bronte and Credit rivers to spawn and die, thus finishing the final stage of their lives.

The fish are not all being caught by fishermen from distant places. Local anglers are getting their share.

Delmar and Jimmie Coulson were out earlier this month and caught three lovely fish. Ted Moore, Chris Heath and Harold Coulson caught four fish recently just to name a few local boys.

If you wish to see fish being weighed for the Toronto Star's Salmon Hunt, go to the Bronte pier between 6-8 p.m. any night. Bronte is one of the official weigh-in stations where fish are electronically weighed and fishermen are presented with duplicates of the official tags which entitle them to the many draws in the \$125,000 contest.

Everyone seems to have been busy this past month catching fish.

Al Lewis and Dennis Seguin went to Dunchurch and had a nice catch of pickerel and pike. Vic Tomlinson had a week of his holidays with his family in the Bay of Quinte area and caught some pickerel in the three-pound range and one four lbs. seven oz. smallmouth bass and a nine lb. pike.

Our fishing director Jim Smith, usually a productive fisherman, has yet to catch a coho but don't bet against him getting a trophy fish before the contest ends. There have been nine good fish caught from Jim's boat. The largest fish entered in the contest so far are: Coho 16.88 lbs.; Chinook 15.02 lbs.; Lake trout 4 lbs.; Rainbow trout 9.42 lbs.

Keep Saturday Oct. 4 open for a mammoth Turkey Shoot at the Halton Sportsmen's Club on Steeles Ave. starting at 9.30 a.m. The shoot will feature trap and target shooting and lucky-card shoots for those not wishing to shoot. 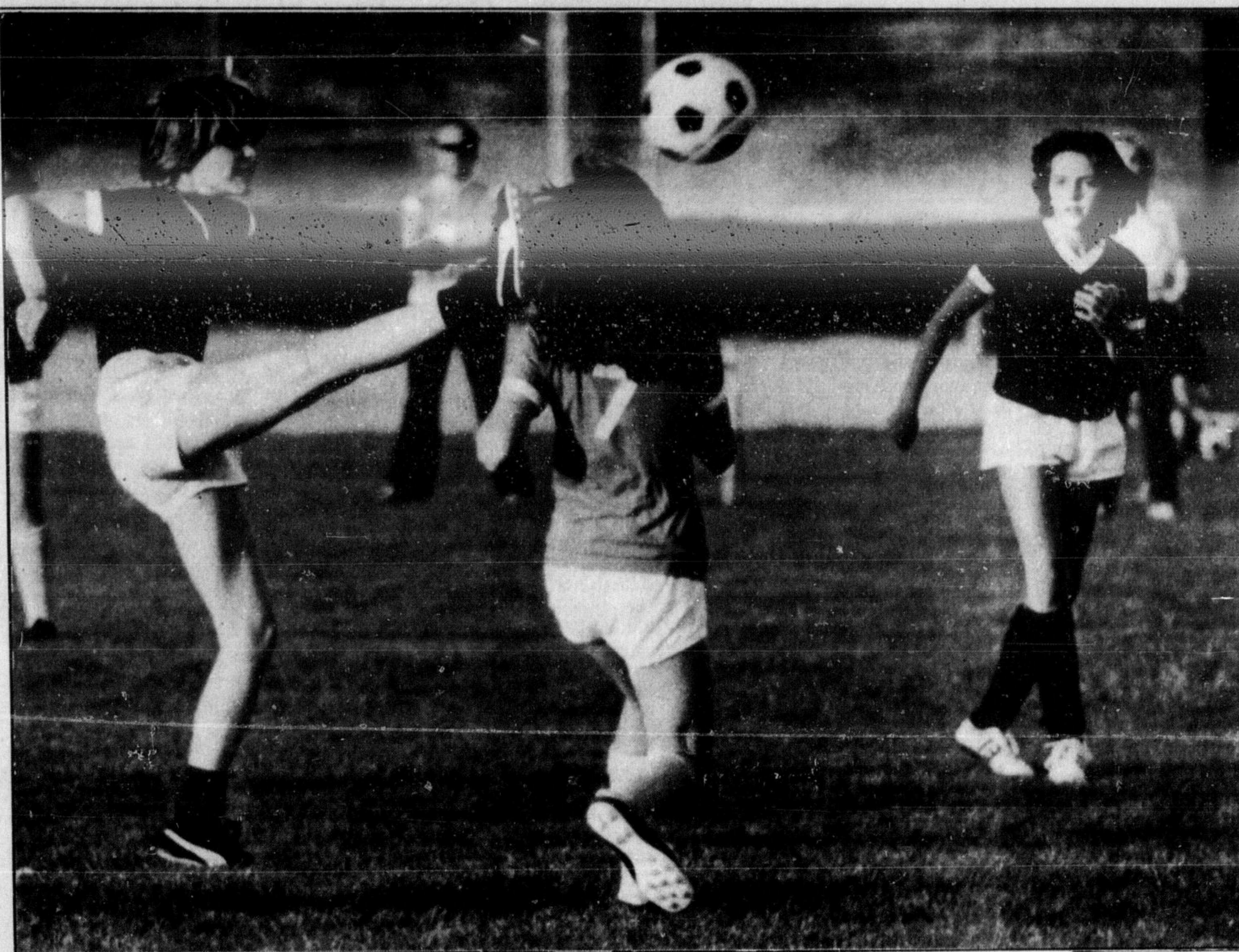
