

# Dickens considering two teams next year

margin with a goal from Muir and Ramsay.

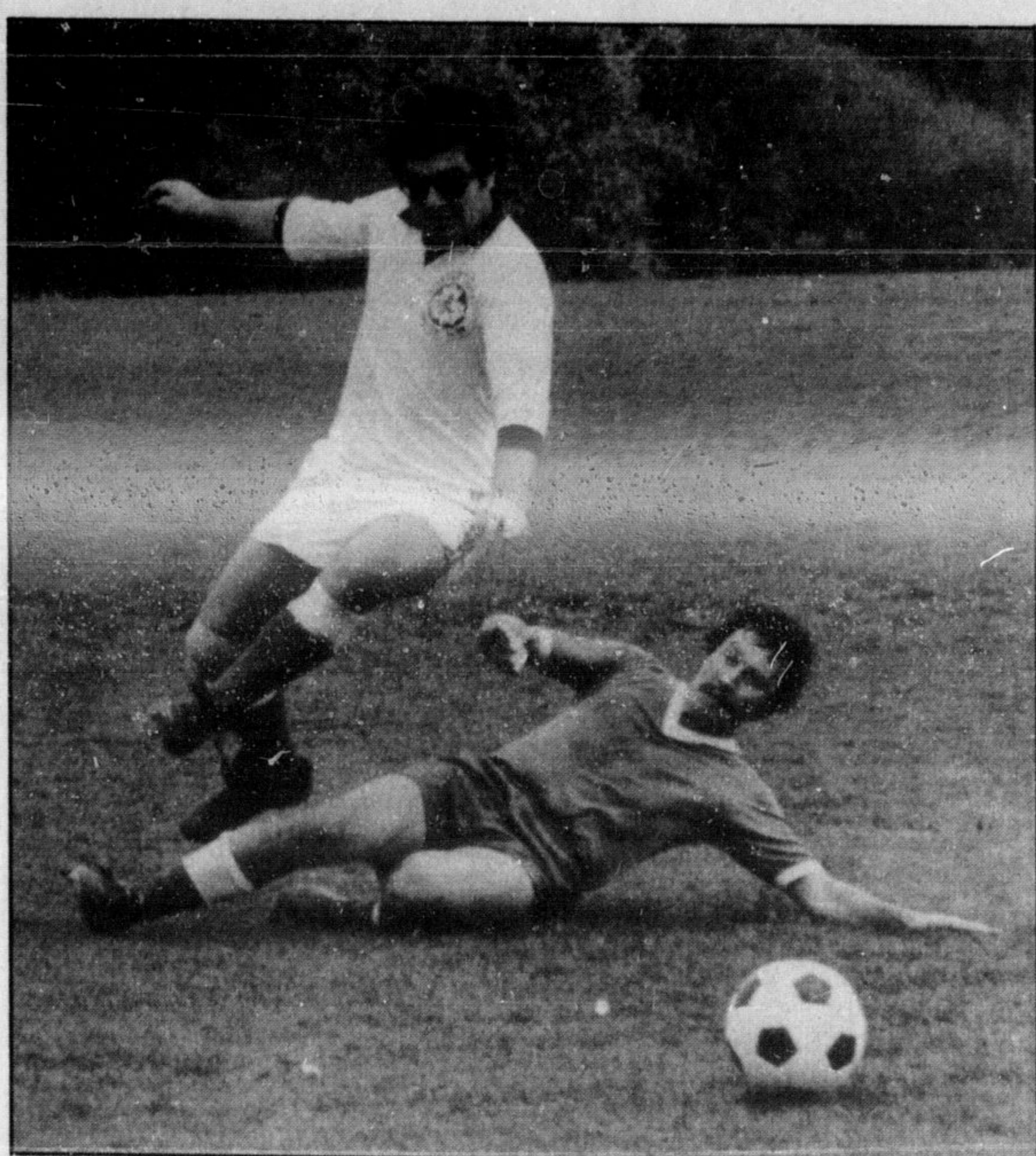
