The Society also judged local industrial firms, commercial concerns and service stations, and singled out the tops in each class for certificates.

Bob Bell, Agricultural Representative for Peel Region, judged the homes. "He was very impressed with the quality of all the homes visited, and also expressed his pleasure at the quality of the landscaping throughout the town," said Burke McNeill, Secretary of the Horticultural Society.

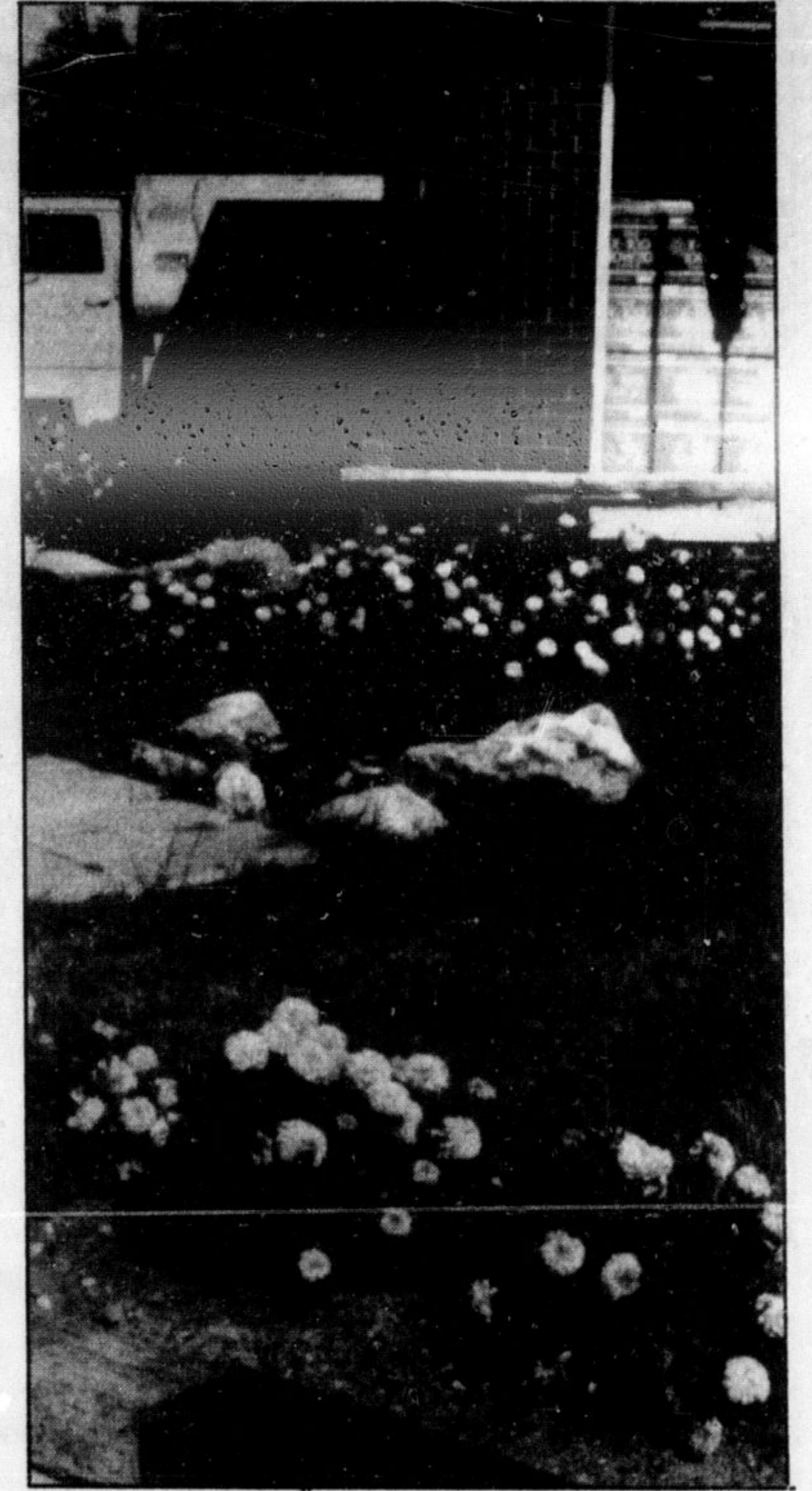
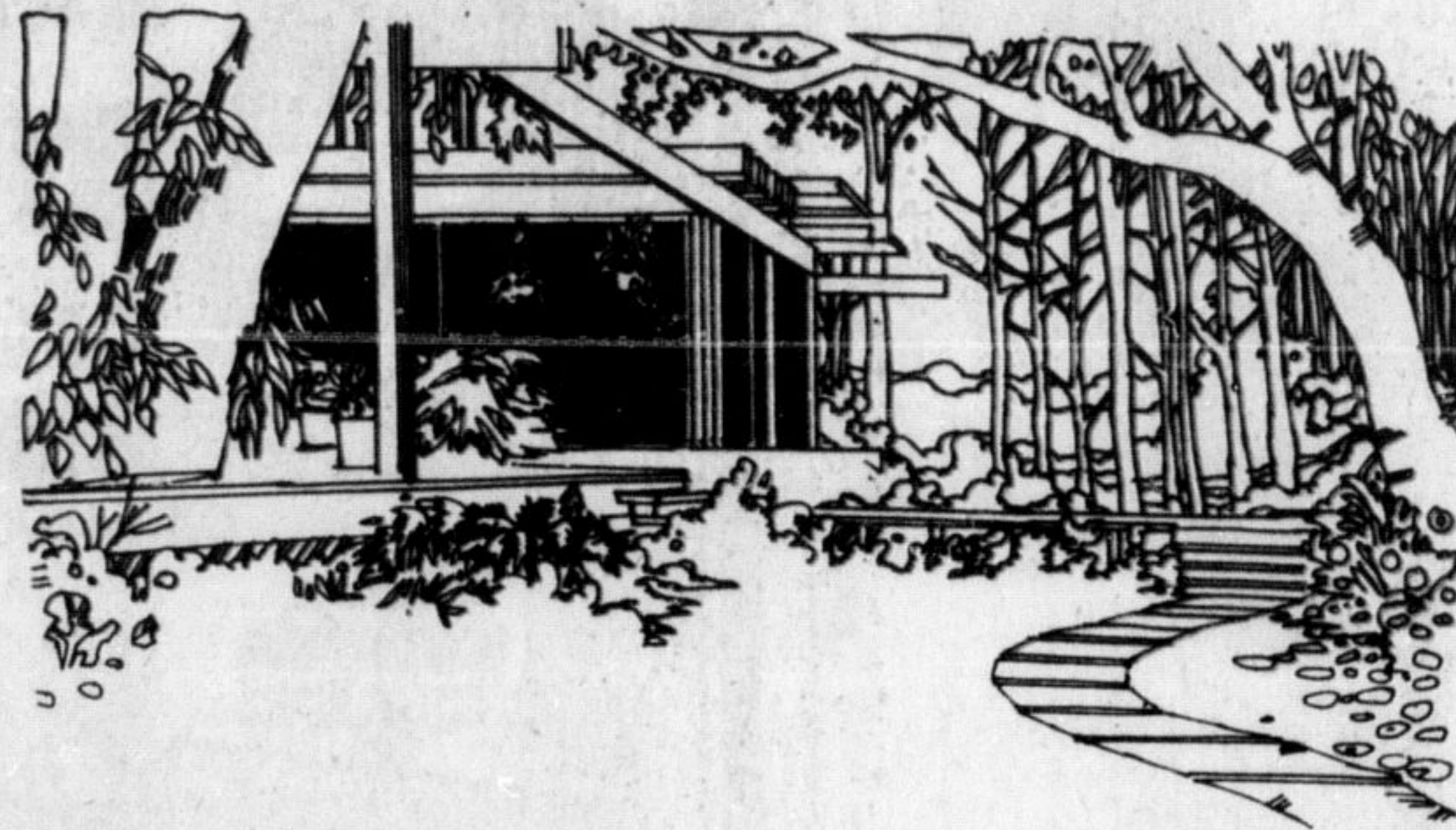
Service Stations — Bell Bros., Martin St. Honorable mentions, Northend Datsun, Bonin's Esso.

Mr. McNeill said the judge saw great improvement in the businesses' beautification programs, compared to last year. "It is encouraging to the Horticultural Society and the Town of Milton to see this improvement. It is hoped that more of the commercial businesses in town can see the benefit of the use of plants to make their premises more inviting to the public.

"With the improvements planned for Main St. in the coming years, it is the hope of the Horticultural Society that more merchants will be encouraged to consider using a few plants to add to the landscape scene.

He pointed out that firms which received certificates last year were not given first prize again this year, although in certain cases there was no question last year's winners were still tops in their class. "To encourage others, the award was given to others."

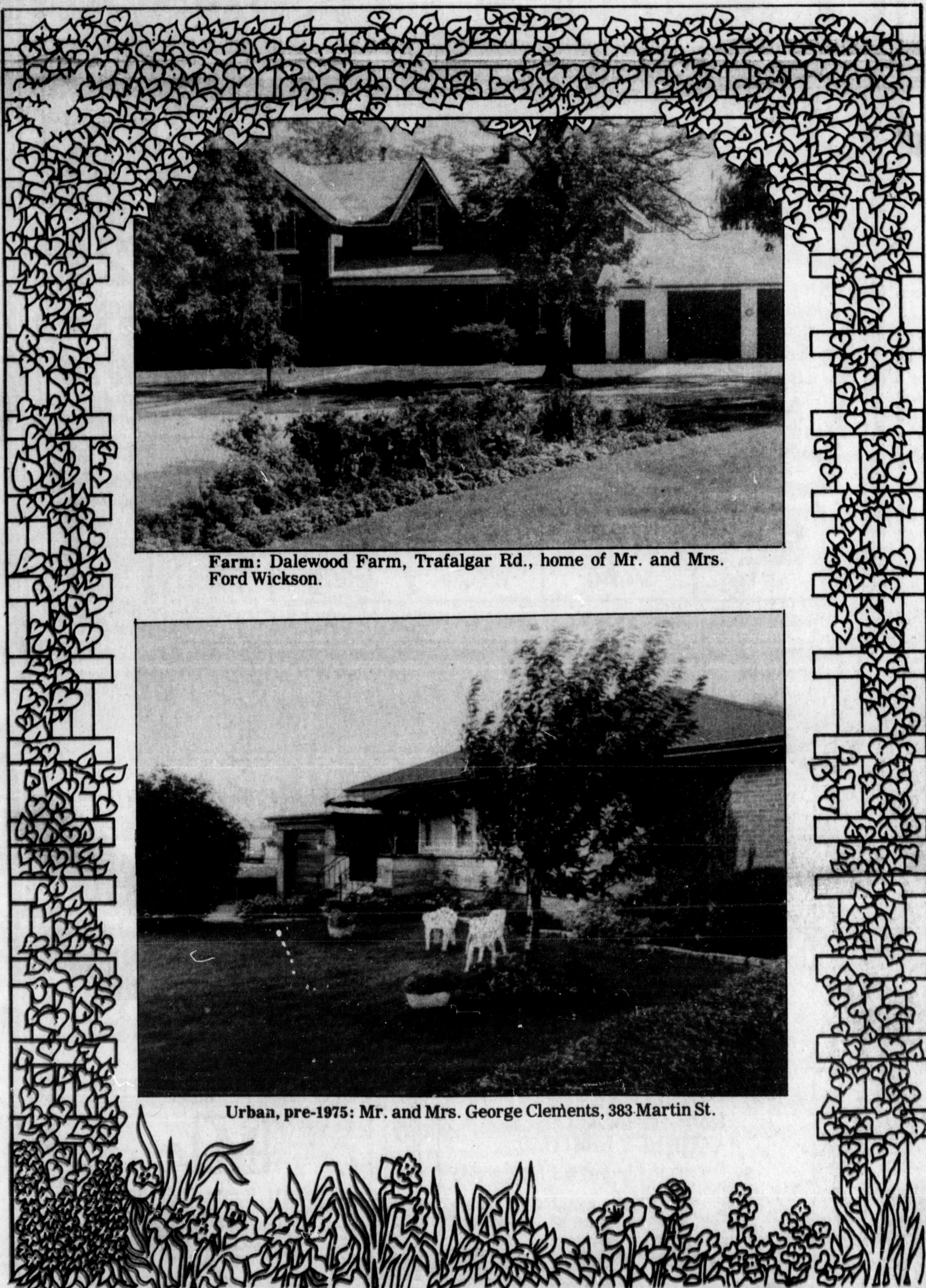

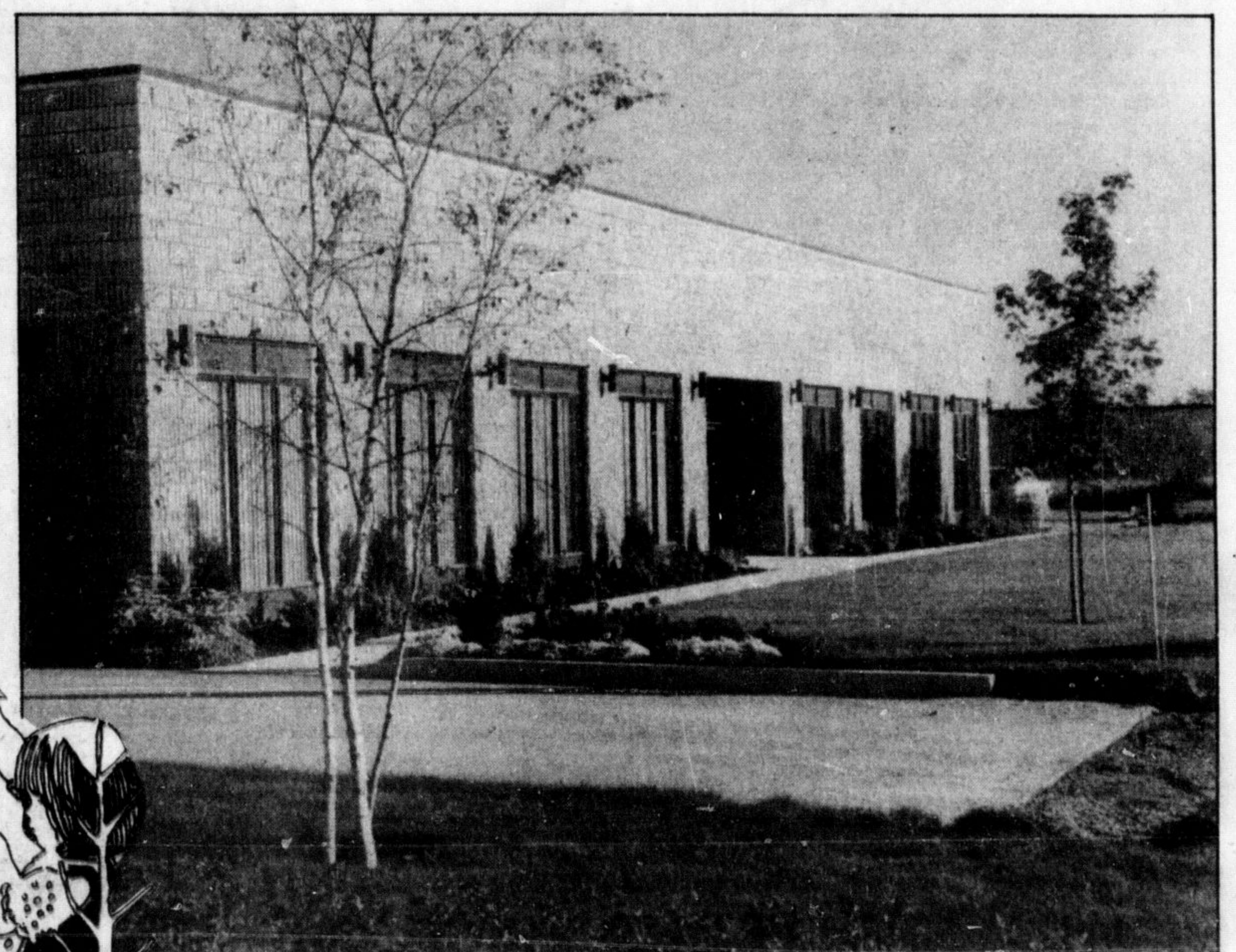
