Poloni sets a school first

Wins at Peel-Halton and goes with Bernabei to OFSSA

Roy Poloni established a first for a Milton cross-country runner when he sped his way to the top spot in senior boys at the Peel-Halton championships Wednesday in

Poloni moved out of the pack at about the

one-quarter mark and led the rest of the way outdistancing Doug Smith of Georgetown in a reverse finish of the Halton championships the previous week at

It marked the first time a runner from

Milton District High School had won a Peel-Halton title in recent memory.

Poloni is just one of two Milton runners to qualify for the provincial championships as coach Bert Vella's gamble to stack his better teams didn't pay off.

Poloni won the Peel-Halton race marking the first time a Milton runner had won at this level.

Vince Bernabei will join Poloni in London this weekend for the Ontario championships. Bernabei finished eighth in junior boys. Vella was unsure whether or not to move Bernabei up to senior in an attempt to qualify his team and it looks like he made the right decision. Bernabei's placing couldn't have qualified the team and he would probably not have qualified as an individual.

"I wasn't displeased with the way things turned out," explained Vella. "Some of my hopes were longshots and with injuries we couldn't come up with the performances."

The senior boys finished fifth (the top two teams qualify) while the junior girls, the other Milton team with an outside chance,

were fourth.

In other boys' results, Steve Davies was 29th, Peter Schmidt 35th and Dave Nolet was 39th in senior. The top midgets were Mike Belvedere 39th, Glen Faulknor 42nd, Mike Van Wart 59th and Charles Jarvis 111th. In junior, Norm Rose was 51st, Jens

Francksen 65th and Scott McColeman 74th. On the girls' side, Denise Worth barely missed qualifying with an 11th-place finish in junior followed by Lynn Copeland 21, Tracey English 28, Corinne Kollman 38 and Lynda Wingfield 42.

In senior girls', Renee Nolet was 33rd, Brenda Ryan 44th, Laurie Zions 51st and Sheila Willows, a midget running up two groups, was 54th.

For the second year in a row, Georgetown dominated the meet taking five of the top six team titles. Actually, it marked a poorer showing than last year when the school won all six titles and five of six at OFSSA.

Milton was saddled with killing off three minors and a major and succeeded on each occasion even scoring one shorthanded which tied the game early in the first per-


"We had our chances," said Milton coach Dawson Ellison. "We had better all-out efforts from everyone."
