

Cancer fund goes \$5,000 over the top

Representative of the many groups which have donated funds to the Cancer Society in the name of Terry Fox's Marathon of Hope, were three people at the Milton Cancer Unit's annual meeting last week. Christine Strang and Student Council President Randy Smith turned over about \$1,000 representing the efforts of the students and teachers at Milton District High School, and Susan Nilsson were there with a cheque for \$9,287.24, collected through McDonald's Restaurant as various groups ran for Terry Fox. Accepting the money is Cancer Society Treasurer Audrey Brush.

At the annual meeting held Oct. 21, members of the Milton Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society were pleased to show a return of \$27,404.91 from their regular campaign funds for 1980. Included in the total amount were funds collected from the sale of daffodils. The goal set by the Unit was \$22,225.

An award was presented to Campaign Chairman Carol Kerr for the effort made during this campaign in reaching and extending the goal. Len McNeil, President of the Milton Unit, presented this award received from Ontario Division.

During the business meeting, Treasurer Audrey Brush reported the total income for 1980 was \$48,311.30, of which \$6,034.50 was realized from In Memoriam receipts.

Service to patients Chairman Ruth Garber reported there were seven new mastectomy patients in the last year.

The number of patients who received services were 27, excluding mastectomy. Forty general visitations were made and 88 ladies attended the breast self examination clinic held

in May. During the year 334 two-way trips were made to Hamilton and Toronto with patients, for a total of 9,670 miles.

Projects and Activities Chairman Greta Platt reported her committee had been busy again this year, knitting and sewing various items for cancer patients. Seven packages

were sent to Princess Margaret Hospital, Toronto containing magazines, paperbacks, etc.

Education Chairman Donna Elliott reported that kits on the harmful effects of smoking were now installed in all the schools.

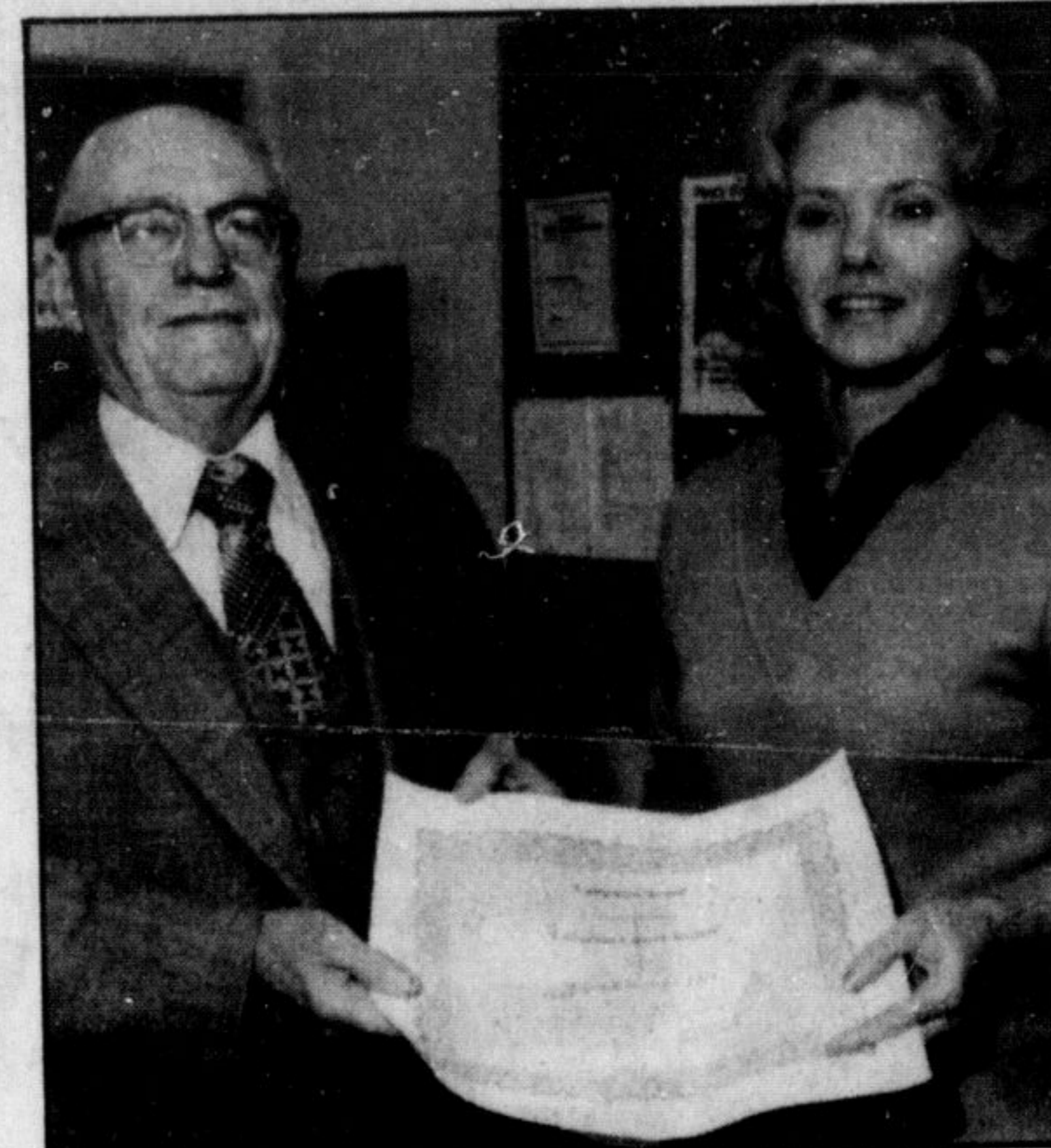
President McNeil thanked everyone for

their efforts during the last year and handed the chair over to the incoming president, John Stewart. Mr. McNeil will still be involved with the Unit and will become Education Chairman for Central Counties District. Mr. Stewart stated

he was looking forward to the challenge.

Bill O'Connor, District Director was present at the meeting and stated that the 1981 objective will be up nine per cent.

President Stewart reported this figure will be set at the next meeting.

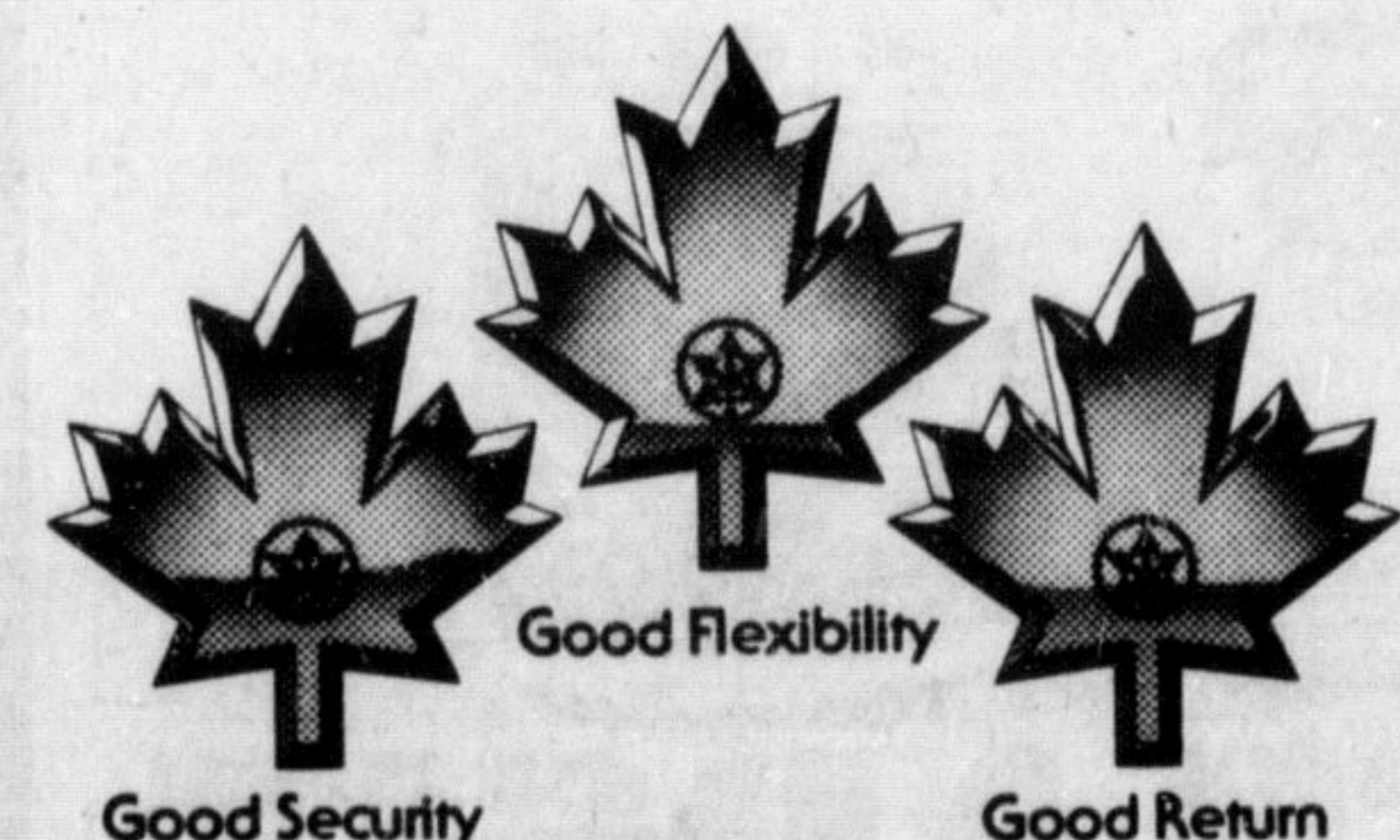
