

**PROPOSED WASTE DISPOSAL SITE FOR LANDFILLING**  
Regional Municipality of Halton  
Town of Milton

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has received an application by the Regional Municipality of Halton for approval of a proposed waste disposal site for land-filling to be located on Part of Lots 6 and 7, Concession VII, New Survey, Geographic Township of Nelson, County of Halton now in the Town of Milton, Regional Municipality of Halton, more particularly in Parts 1 to 5 inclusive, on Plan 20-R-4617 for Registry Division of Halton (20). The proposed site is known as Site "F".

By a notice dated the 17th day of September, 1980 and published in this newspaper the Environmental Assessment Board announced that it would, on October 15, 1980, conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it could make recommendations in respect of the proposed waste disposal site.

When the Board convened on that date, it was advised by counsel present that there was an order of the Supreme Court of Ontario prohibiting it from holding a hearing in relation to the project until the Minister of the Environment makes an order he is now required to make under section 35 of The Environmental Assessment Act, 1975.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Environmental Assessment Board will reconvene on November 12, 1980, at 10.00 o'clock in the morning, local time, in the Auditorium, Halton Centennial Manor, 185 Ontario Street South, Milton, Ontario.

TAKE NOTICE THAT if the Board determines upon reconvening that the Minister has ordered that the hearing shall proceed under The Environmental Protection Act, 1971, the Board will proceed with the hearing at that time.
