Aeros win a game lose Marty Seeds

Milton Aeros treated hometown fans to some good news Friday night — they won their first game of the season with a convincing 7-4 win over Dunnville Mudcats, fellow cellar-dwellers in the O'Donnell Division of the OHA Int. B loop.

The victory felt hollow, however, when the Intermediates lost their veteran defenceman Marty Seeds early in the third period. Seeds was kneed along the boards and fell to the ice, unconscious. Attempts to revive him failed and he was rushed to hospital, where he was kept overnight. The injury resulted in a concussion and he'll be missing from the ranks for about 10 days. Seeds is always a stalwart on the rear line, and is now in his eighth season with the club.

Bright lights for the Aeros were forwards Lorne Lesuk and Dave Norton, who scored

all seven Milton goals. Lesuk counted four, Norton three.

Norton took his turn first, tallying all three in the first period while linemate Lesuk collected assists on two of them with aid from Bob Baker and Paul McCann.

Lesuk took over in the second with his first two, adding two more in the final period. Norton claimed an assist on one of them, Bill Bryant was in on two, and Doug Fry, Seeds and Doug Heslip counted single assists.

Referees assessed 17 penalties, including two major misconducts to Dunnville's Shane Selby and game misconducts to Dave Murphy of the visiting team.

Jim Lockhurst was great in the Aeros goal, shining in the first two periods as Mudcats scrambled around the net.

The shoe was on the other foot Sunday when Aeros travelled to Smithville with just 10 players. Aeros did well in the first two periods but ran out of legs in the third, and fell 7-4. It was their sixth loss in seven games.

Pat Devlin was outstanding in the net and Milton actually led the game 3-2 at one point, but Smithville tallied five in the third stanza.

Dennis Longpre, Doug Heslip, Paul McCann and Steve Bronzewski notched the Milton tallies.

The Aeros also met league-leading (7-7) Rockton Real McCoy's Thursday, and dropped the game 5-3. No club in the league has yet to outscore the McCoy's, but Aeros management feels they can be beaten, and look forward to proving the boast at their next meeting.

Dunnville returns to Milton next Friday, Milton visits Paris Monday, and Smithville is here Tuesday. Friday's game will be followed by a graffiti dance, 10 p.m. to 1 a.m.

Coach Carl Hymers feels the club is exceedingly strong in goal, with Lockhurst and Devlin currently sharing the role. He and John Hall are currently working on imports and waivers, and may add some new blood after Dec. 1 when Georgetown Raiders announce their cuts.

Milton tallies came from Rick Griffiths, Bill Lynch, Brett Patterson and John Hicks. Hicks also assisted on two of the goals.

Flyers only got 14 shots at the Cougar goalie.

Burlington led 3-2 after one period, added six in the second and three more in the final period to Milton's two.

Flyers were away Tuesday and travel to Barrie this Thursday. They'll host Dixie this Friday at 8 in Memorial Arena. Acton hosts Flyers next Wednesday and returns to Milton Friday, Nov. 28.

Badminton Club joins fast league

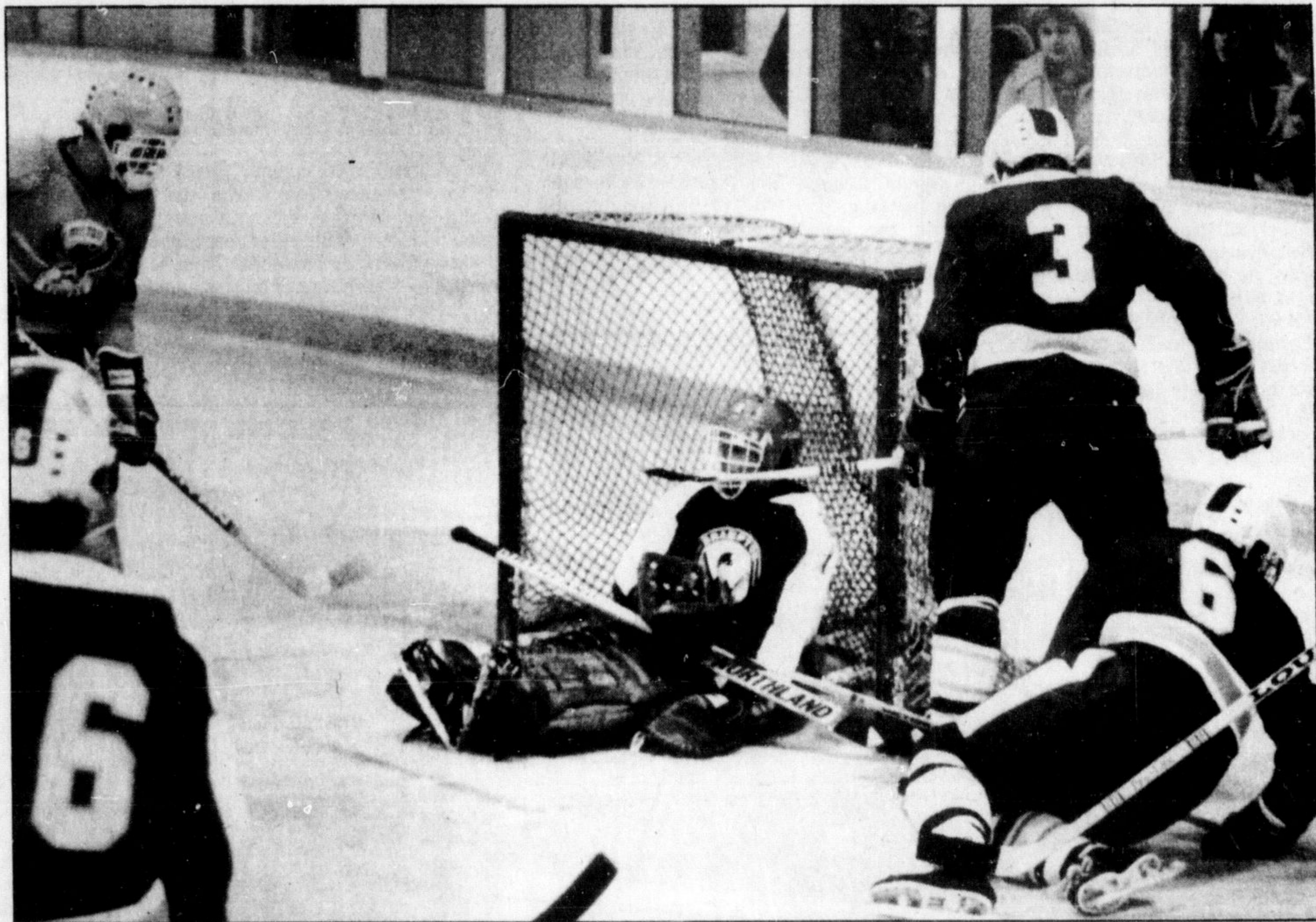
