From the Federation of Ontario Naturalists. an article edited by Ron Reid, comes some interesting news that you probably have all heard about by now. Hunters and fishermen at least should be aware of the much needed revision to Ontario trespass legislation with two new laws that came into effect in September.

Recognizing that public access to private land is a delicate and often emotional subject, as evidenced by the recent difficulties of the Bruce Trail, so the petty trespass act has had some changes made.

First, it will be easier for a landowner to enforce his rights. Tougher fines, up to \$1000, along with the ability to recover the cost of associated damages and court expenses, and the authority for police to arrest trespassers even after they leave the premises, will all help to curb irresponsible trespassing.

Secondly, the law is clarified to assure owners that they will not be responsible for the safety of users of their property, unless they are receiving payment,. This also means that hikers must take the environment as they find it, and assume whatever risks are present as their own respon-

sibility. Finally, the new law standardizes the posting of property, so that red markings mean no entry, and yellow markers mean some activities are permitted. Owners can also use symbols as fishing, snowmobiling, or hunting are specificially allowed or prohibited, without affecting other uses. Farm lands, orchards and young plantations are automatically closed unless marked otherwise.

All this will not solve the trespas problems overnight—there will always be a few bad apples in the barrel who abuse the right and the property of others.

The whole story is, fellows, we have to pull up our socks and, as we have always preached, the motto of our club is: "Get Permission."



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
