A potpourri is a mixture of petals, herbs, and spices which is not only visually attractive when stored in a glass jar, but delights the olfactory senses with its fragrance.

When the ingredients are crushed to a powderlike consistency and tied in a piece of fabric, it is known as a sachet.

bead". As the bag was worked with the fingers, the perfume was exuded.

Egyptian kings had large quantities of roses placed in crocks and buried for future use.

They were the first to experiment with what the French later designated as "potpourri" or "rotten pot", not a very pretty name for something so sweet smelling.

The name describes the moist method of making potpourris which consists of layering fresh petals, herbs, roots, spices and leaves with oils until they rot.

After a curing period of several weeks the mixture exudes an extremely pleasant aroma.




For library speakers
