

Prepares to launch Heart Fund

This year's Heart Fund campaign in Milton will run throughout the month of February, campaign chairman Fran Frampton announced this week. The 1981 goal for Milton and district is \$10,000. Last year, \$8,600 was raised.

Mrs. Frampton, of 281 Halton Ave., has just taken over the chairmanship of the Heart Fund. Previous chairmen Barb Richardson and Phyllis Gorman, while still active in campaigning, are not heading up the drive this year.

"I give them a lot of credit for organizing the Heart Fund campaign so well," Mrs. Frampton said. "I am just following their campaign, and they have given me a lot of help."

A committee of five friends is helping her — Anne Ptolemy, Joan Roberts, Gladys McKersie, Ginny Galipeau and Julia Yoshida.

The Heart Fund flag will fly at Milton Town Hall throughout the month of February.

Donation jars will be set up in local stores.

The week of Feb. 9 to 15 is Heart Week and Sunday, Feb. 8 will be Heart Sunday.

About 20 captains will supervise hundreds of canvassers who will call on every door during the month. Some local doctors and lawyers will be approaching their peers for donations.

Again this year the Royal Bank will be accepting donations for the Fund.

Mrs. Frampton said although this is her first year as chairman, she has been canvassing for the Fund for several years. She once worked in a heart laboratory at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto and was secretary to a cardiologist for a few years, so she knows what heart disease is all about.

Viet visitor

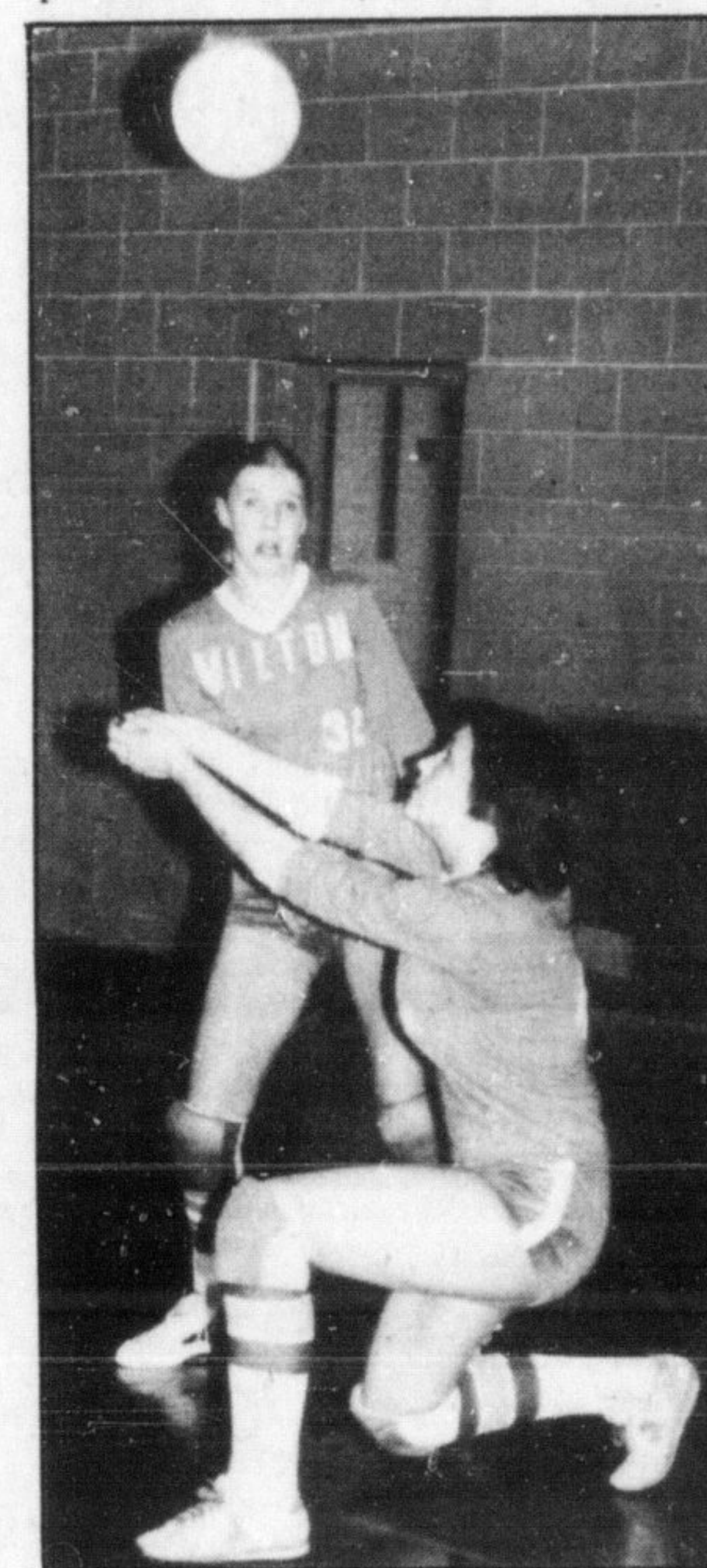

No new director in post

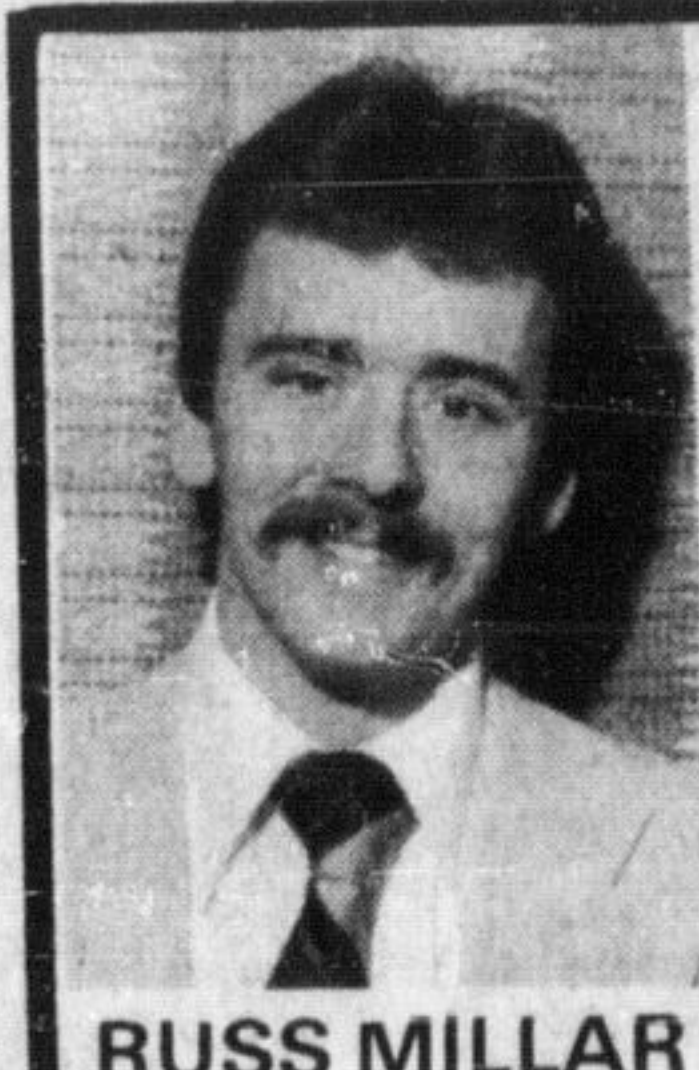
Halton Region may turn to a consulting firm to try and find a replacement Business Development Director.

Former Business Development Director

Bill Marshall left Halton Region in October and the region published the vacancy in the Globe and Mail and trade journals.

There were 40 applicants, which brought a

short list of five. These five were interviewed by the four mayors, but no consensus on a clear winning candidate could be arrived upon for one reason or another. Regional Personnel Director Dennis Camm has suggested Halton spend \$12,000 to bring in a specialty placement firm to recruit a replacement.



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Town backs charter bid

Milton Council will support a Halton Hills charter service in seeking an application to take customers outside the boundaries of Ontario and into the United States.

Tyler Transport Limited had decided to make an application to the Ontario Highway Transport Board after the company had been forced to turn down a number of charters.

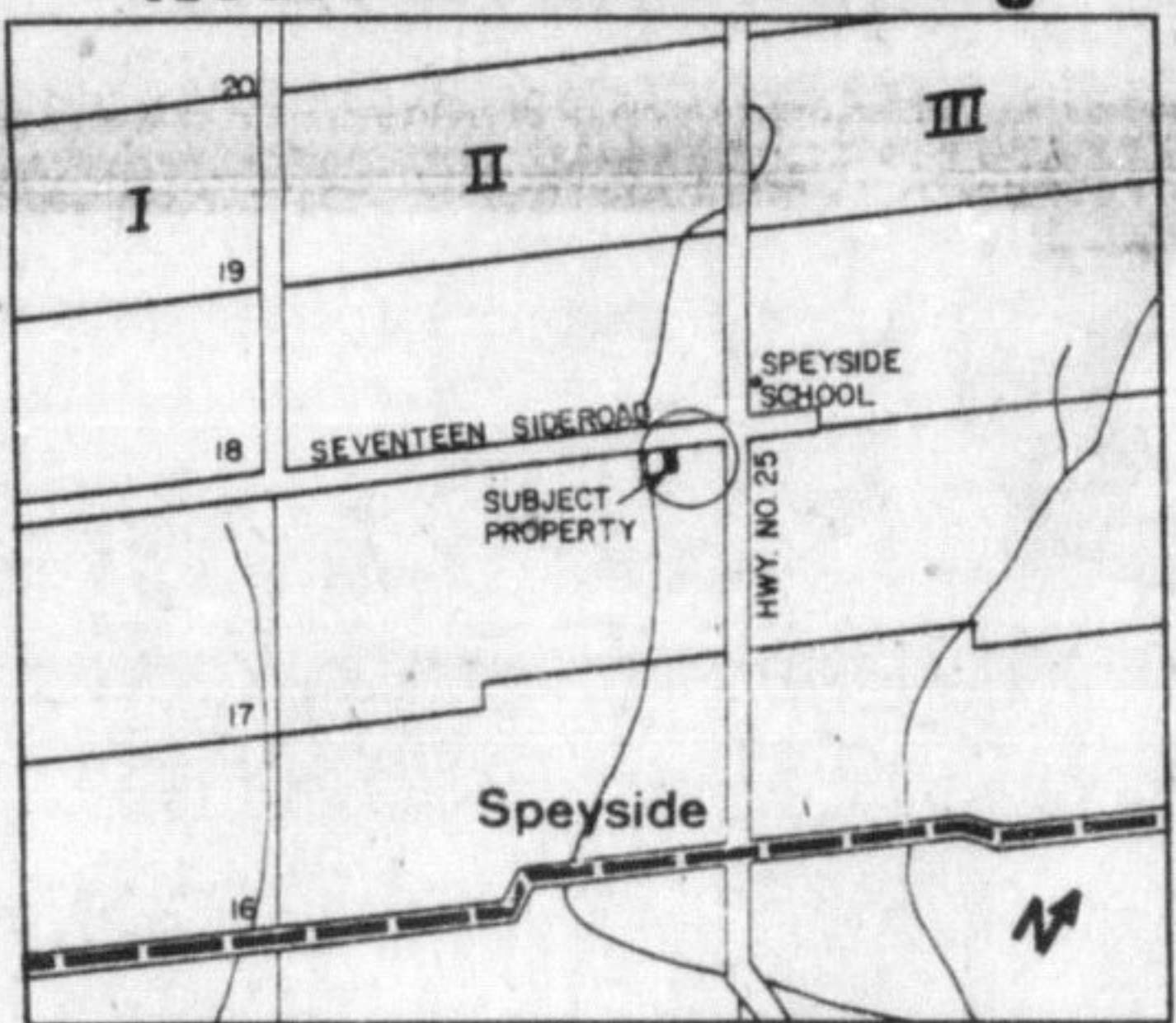
But the firm noted no other company in Milton and Halton Hills is licensed to do the job, so an application was made.
