Whether the MYSC is not approaching the matter correctly, although Trevor Preddy has spent many hours conversing with the other parties, or there is some different policy applied by the Board of Education in t he North District, the situation with regard to the use of gymnasiums is very different to that in Oakville and Burlington.

Although the MYSC had been led to believe they could use both W.I. Dick and Robert Baldwin schools on Friday evenings, they have been limited to the use of W.I. Dick. Efforts are still being made to obtain the use of Robert Baldwin, which is not being used for any other purpose on Friday evenings. If this is not forthcoming, we will be looking into the matter further.

Meanwhile, all the children who registered for the winter program are being accommodated at W.I. Dick. But the club has had to put a very definite stop on any additional registrations. My apologies to anyone who went to Robert Baldwin last Friday evening as a result of what they read in this column. The information was given in good faith.

As well as the indoor accomodation problem, MYSC directors had some more bad news at their meeting last week. Equipment Director, John Saunderson, reported that orders had been placed for 1981 equipment but the best prices he could obtain were considerably higher than last year. The executive intended to retain the same registration fee for 1981 but are going to need another look at this in light of the cost of equipment.




