

Full speed ahead for indoor program



Soccer talk

After the dust cleared last week, Milton Youth Soccer Club found the extra gymnasium space they were seeking. In addition to the space they already had, they have now been granted the use of Martin Street School on Saturday mornings and the small gym at Milton District High School for Thursday evenings.

The additional space means the club can accommodate all those who had registered for the winter program. There are still some places vacant in some of the sessions, particularly in the older age groups. Anyone interested in registering should contact Jim Jones at 878-8305 or Trevor Preddy at 878-7560.

Anyone planning a holiday in the next month or six weeks should note MYSC summer registration dates are February 27/28 and March 13/14. Registration after these dates will involve a hefty late registration fee, if indeed the space is available.

Late registrations cause the organizers considerable problems once teams and schedules have been set up, hence the late registration fee. This year no exceptions will be made so be forewarned and get along to one of the registration sessions.

Pineview Soccer Club has not set their registration dates but these will be decided at an executive meeting this week.

However, they do have a Level One coaching clinic set up for either Feb. 21 or 28. Anyone interested in attending the course should contact Martin Boettcher at 878-7013.

The Ontario Soccer Association recently circulated a paper on long-term planning for discussion at the district level. One problem the OSA experiences is lack of feedback from the grass-roots level of the

game. The paper outlines the goals of the OSA in both technical and non-technical programs. In order to determine if these goals are realistic and relative they are asking some questions of the soccer community.

In connection with the clubs the OSA wants to know if the present age breakdowns are satisfactory, where future growth is going to take place and if any swing is occurring from competitive to recreational games.

The question of communication is recurring at all levels of the game and the OSA asks if it should communicate down to the individual player. Knowing the problem a club has in communicating with its members, I think this would be an impossible task.

The OSA frequently has problems communicating with the district associations which are the first step down the ladder and I think this is where they should start. After all, most people learn to crawl before they walk. To try to communicate from the provincial level right down to the individual would be like trying to run out of the womb.

Another area involves the services which the OSA should get involved with its affiliates. Five areas suggested are administrative guidance, co-operative fund-raising, production of literature, resources and educational seminars. These do not seem unreasonable although I wonder if co-operative fund-raising is practical.

Fund-raising needs local commitment and I question whether this will be forthcoming where the program is coming from outside and all the proceeds are not being retained by the club.

Should the OSA be more active politically? Can they help in negotiations for more fields and other facilities? This is going to be a very important area in the next few years as the game continues to grow.

The greatest area of growth is going to be at the adult level as all young players now involved graduate to the senior ranks. Adult players need full-sized fields for full-length games making a great demand on existing facilities.

These are only a few of the questions being considered in the non-technical area. Next week I will outline some technical areas covered in the paper. If you have any strong feelings on any of the subjects raised, please call me and I will see they are passed along the pipe line.

Aeros battle back

In a strong comeback effort, Milton Aeros battled back four times to earn a 6-6 tie with Dunnville Mudcats Thursday in Dunnville.

The tie left both teams in the same state. Mudcats lead Aeros by a single point in the race for third place. Aeros also have a game in hand.

It was a strong effort by Aeros who went with just nine skaters compared with Dunnville's 17. Superb goaltending by Aeros' Pat Devlin, especially in overtime, contributed greatly to the draw.

Aeros didn't lead in the game and rallied from a three-goal disadvantage at one point. The shots on goal were in Dunnville's favor by a 42-40 margin.

Aeros battled back from disadvantages of 3-2, 5-3 and 6-5 throughout the game. Milton's goals were scored by Doug Fry and Steve Bronizewski with a pair apiece while singles went to Billy McGilloway and Doug Heslip.

The tie came on the heels of a 7-4 loss Tuesday night to Rockton Memorial Arena. Rockton remained on top of the league with a 22-3 record, five points ahead of Paris 29ers who incidentally will be in town Friday for a game against Centur, at Milton Sports Centre.

Rockton broke a 1-1 first-period tie with two goals in the middle frame and held on the rest of the way to secure the victory. Doug Schoenfeld, Bob Baker, Paul McCann and Bronizewski fired Milton's goals.

The team held a successful fund-raising dance Saturday night with a turnout of 280.

by 1984 to the Olympics. Of the Canadians, which start tomorrow morning at eight with figures, Parker says, "I think I'll do well."

He sounds exasperated with the judges though. "There's so much politics involved. I've skated well and gotten half-assed marks. That's suppose to be changing though. I have the potential to be third or better if I skate my best. But I just want to get the marks I deserve."

Other than that Parker adds his major competition is Brian Pockar of Calgary, Canadian champion three years running and Brian Orser of Pennington. Parker isn't sure if Pockar is competing this year—rumor is he's stepping down—but Orser who slipped past him to capture the junior championship two years ago in Thunder Bay, is a brilliant freestyle skater and a good jumper. Orser finished ahead of Parker last year.

But then says Parker, "I've really worked hard. I've been pushing figures (in training) but free skating is my strongest event."

"It's been a long week, though, between the two (divisional and national) competitions. I'm very tired. "Skating isn't sissy stuff, he con-

tinues. "A lot of young figure skaters, at public school age, drop out because of peer pressure. People think it's for girls, it's for fags, or it's silly because it's not hockey."

But not in six hours of skating a day, says Parker and you soon change your mind. "It's a lot of hard work."

Parker started skating when he was eight years old, first in hockey then in figure skating. Later he joined the Action club.

In his second season he picked up the first trophy for most improved skater. From there Parker moved to Guelph to gain more ice time and to Hamilton three years later.

One more move was in the making, to London and coach Caughell. He moved with Caughell to Kitchener.

He finished fourth and fifth in his first two showings at the Canadian junior championships before losing to Orser in 1979.

He finished seventh last year in his senior level debut. "Last year in my interviews with the press, I told everybody I didn't expect to do well," says Parker. Then he summons up his newly acquired self-confidence and adds, "This year, everyone is going to have to look out."

Parker is on his way.

T-Birds opened the scoring with an unassisted goal by Sean Davidson with 46 seconds left in the first period. Dundas replied with a goal three seconds from the end of the second to tie the game.

With just over two minutes left in the game the T-Birds got down to business with two goals to sew the game up.

The first came from Davidson, assisted by Darren Shaw and David McGuire, and the second from Todd Horne, assisted by Ed Morgan and Davidson.

T-Birds entertained Mississauga North Stars in an exhibition game at Memorial Arena Saturday and fought their way to a 6-1 win over the top MTHL club.
