Trophy winners

As you have already probably read about our Wildlife Dinner and Awards night, I will not enlarge on it. If you didn't catch the winners' names then I have listed them for you.

The ladies' trophy for the largest fish was won by Lorna Merritt, who won it with a 7 1/2 lb. coho salmon. Deimar Coulson won the speckled trout trophy and Lorne Lyons got the largest whitefish at 4 lbs. 8 oz. John Smith won with an 8 lb. 2 oz. lake trout, Jim Sales won the smallmouth bass trophy with a 2 lb. 12 oz. fish.

Vic Tomlinson caught a 4 lb. 8 oz. largemouth bass to win the trophy and Jim Sales also won the trophy for the largest coho salmon. Lorne Lyons won the brown trout trophy with a 12 lb. 4 oz. fish.

When it comes to the big ones, Jim Smith is always in there. He caught a 16 lb. 6 oz. rainbow trout. Jim also won the trophy for the biggest game fish. There was no entry this year for pickerel.

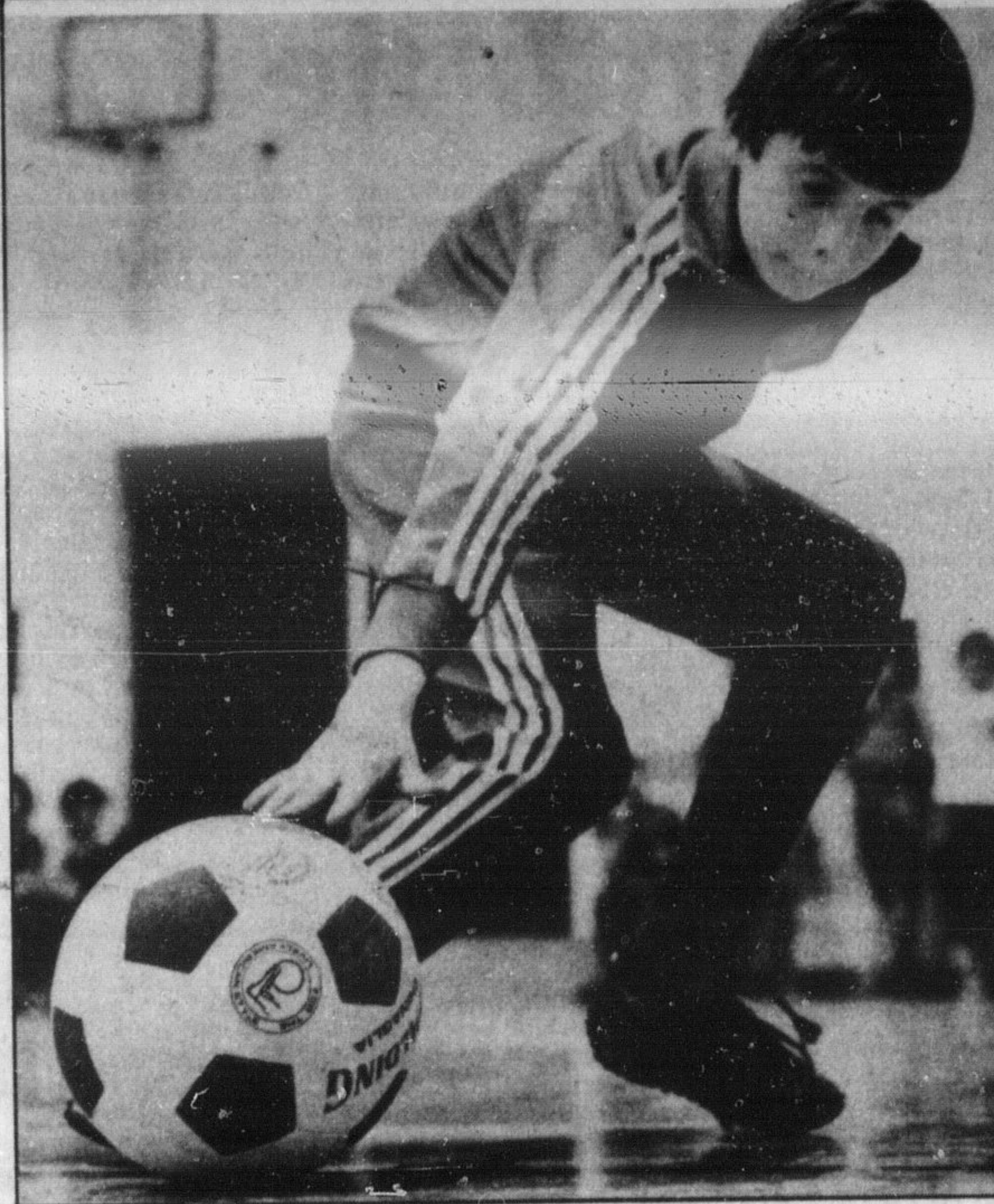
Fishermen beware! You are not the only one who is after our game fish. There are thousands of other creatures after our fish also. Loons catch fish better than any fisherman and gulls are also good at catching fish. Cormorants, kingfishers and ospreys are among the few of nature's fishermen.

Birds preying on fish is not one-sided. Fish often feed on young waterfowl and pike have an enormous appetite for young ducks. Muskies can catch and eat young ducks up to a pound in weight.

Black bass prey upon young ducks in shallow water and the goosefish, a marine coastal fish with enormous jaws and an voracious appetite, dines regularly on ducks, gulls and other water birds. Perhaps fishermen should take a lesson from nature's fishermen.

Chances are you started fishing with a cane pole, bobber, hook and bait and you had a terrific time catching fish. Then you moved on to more sophisticated equipment and probably caught fewer fish.

We think artificial lures just aren't as effective as the real thing. Try watching a large blue heron for a while and you will see he does not move, makes no noise and has all the patience in the world. Try his tactics some time when things are dull. Make no noise, sit still and let your bait float naturally.

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Novice skiers are top priority in future Glen Eden ski plans

Improving facilities for novice skiers at the Glen Eden Ski Hill will be a 1981 priority of the Halton Region Conservation Authority, the HRC's inaugural meeting has been held.

HRC Conservation Areas Information Advisory Board Chairman Peter Abbott said the success of the ski hill so far this season has "brought renewed demands for larger buildings and more ski lifts, hence it will be imperative for the new advisory board to get down to work as soon as possible in order to establish development priorities for the ski area which can be met before next season."

One top priority which Mr. Abbott said "cannot be ignored" is a major increase in the opportunities for the first-time skier.

"The beginner slopes at Glen Eden must be regraded and new lift equipment installed if we are to provide instructional areas sufficient in size to meet today's requirements, and slowed so as to permit new skiers to learn the basic first steps of alpine skiing under controlled conditions," he said.

Mr. Abbott said the improvements have "been needed for some time."

He said the decision to include \$50,000 worth of capital expansions and \$90,000 for better ski lifts has already paid off handsomely.

"This winter has more than justified the investments as skiers have flocked to the area and total attendance has already soared past last year's total," he said.

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Region funds urged

The Halton Children's Aid Society is urging the Region consider a grant to Parents Anonymous organizations.
