

# Fifty-five attend Milk Committee annual, present prizes

Fifty-five milk producers from Halton met Feb. 4 at Hillcrest United Church, for their annual meeting, under the Chairmanship of Bruce Nixon, Norval.

Jim McCague, Alliston, a director on the OMMB stated that there were 255 new milk producers in Ontario last year.

On Feb. 1 the price of milk was increased.

This was deserved by the farmers based on the cost of production formula.

Prior to this increase, Prince Edward Island was the only province in Canada with a lower milk price than Ontario.

Advertising has stopped the drop in butter production which is close to 10 lbs. capita.

Dwight Bennett, Spencerville, an OMMB

Director, discussed the new Dairy Herd Improvement Corporation.

As of April 1, this Corporation is taking over from the Ontario Government the recording of milk production. This will allow an increase in new producers to have all their cows recorded with an expected increase of 150 herds over three months.

## Pork producer meet

The annual meeting of the Halton-Peel Pork Producers' Association was held Feb. 3, 1981 at Campbell's Cross Hall, Campbell's Cross.

Paul Simmons, Swine Specialist discussed the prospects for 1981. He felt

that the market is past the period of very low prices but prices will still vary widely during the year. He predicted a \$70 to 75¢/cwt. market during the first half of the year with prices rising to at least \$80¢/cwt. in the last half. Paul stressed the continuing need for top efficiency.

The Board is also trying a direct bank payment system for hog cheques and promoting tighter contagious disease controls.

Richard Thompson, a pork producer from Listowel, gave an interesting presentation on his swine operation. He outlined many innovations he has developed.

## Servicentre in Hornby

Residents in the Hornby area will be advised the town does not object in principle to the creation of a gasoline service centre and restaurant near the Trafalgar Rd.-Highway 401 interchange.

Mid-Trafalgar Developments Limited is seeking a change in the Parkway Belt regulations to put in a "Traveler's Service" facility. The 5.91 acrea site with 473 foot frontage on Trafalgar Rd. would also have an office of 3,600 square feet, gasoline pumps and service bays.

he said, the company is only seeking relief from the parkway belt regulations to attract potential buyers of the site.

Mr. Johnson said notifications must go out to residents in the area for their comment and that it should be stated the station might be open 24 hours per day.

He said these comments would have to come back and be analyzed before the town could send a notice to the province asking for Mid-Trafalgar to be given a dispensation.

Eric Alderson and Howard Malcolm, Directors to the OPPMB gave a report on the Board's 1980 activities. A total of 4.2 million hogs were sold in 1979 in Ontario and 20 per cent of our Canadian Prok was exported with a favourable ratio of nine pounds exported to 1 pound imported. Halton's 131 producers marketed 21,232 hogs in 1980 with Peel's 111 producers marketing 11,583 hogs.

The board is developing a code of practice for swine operations in case of future political pressure by animal welfare groups.

Presently, these groups are promoting unreasonable restrictions to livestock operations in Europe.

Don't bother to remove old acoustical ceiling tiles that need replacing. By installing new tiles over the old, you'll get an extra layer of insulation.

Place a slice of bread on the bottom of a salad bowl and salad prepared in advance won't become soft and soggy. Just be sure to remove it before adding the dressing.

And chicken fried in advance? And chicken fried in advance won't get soggy if wrapped in foil pierced with holes to allow steam to escape. Pop it in the oven for reheating.
