VALENTINE'S DANCE

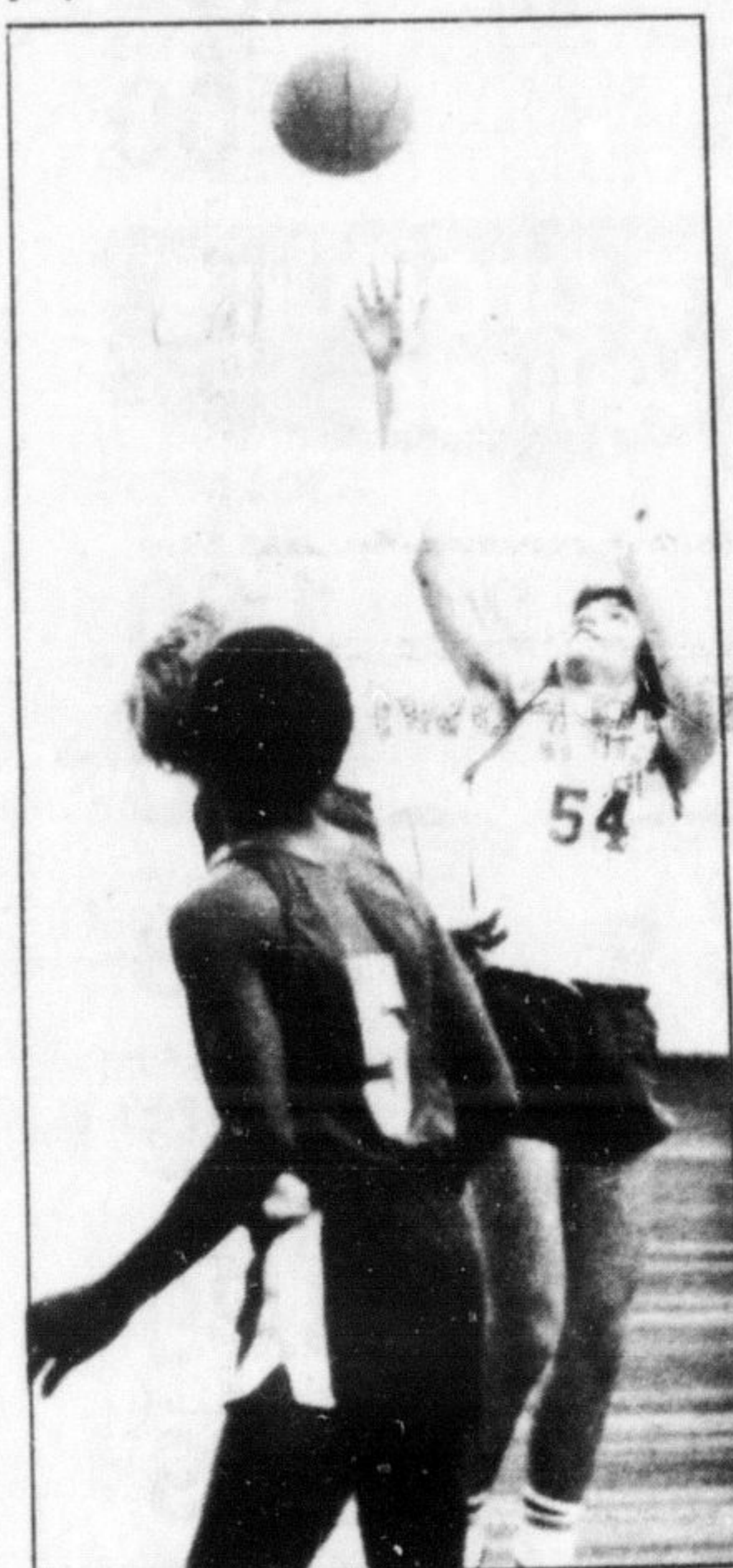

The seniors were definitely not prepared to play. They were called out of class at three o'clock and many had to



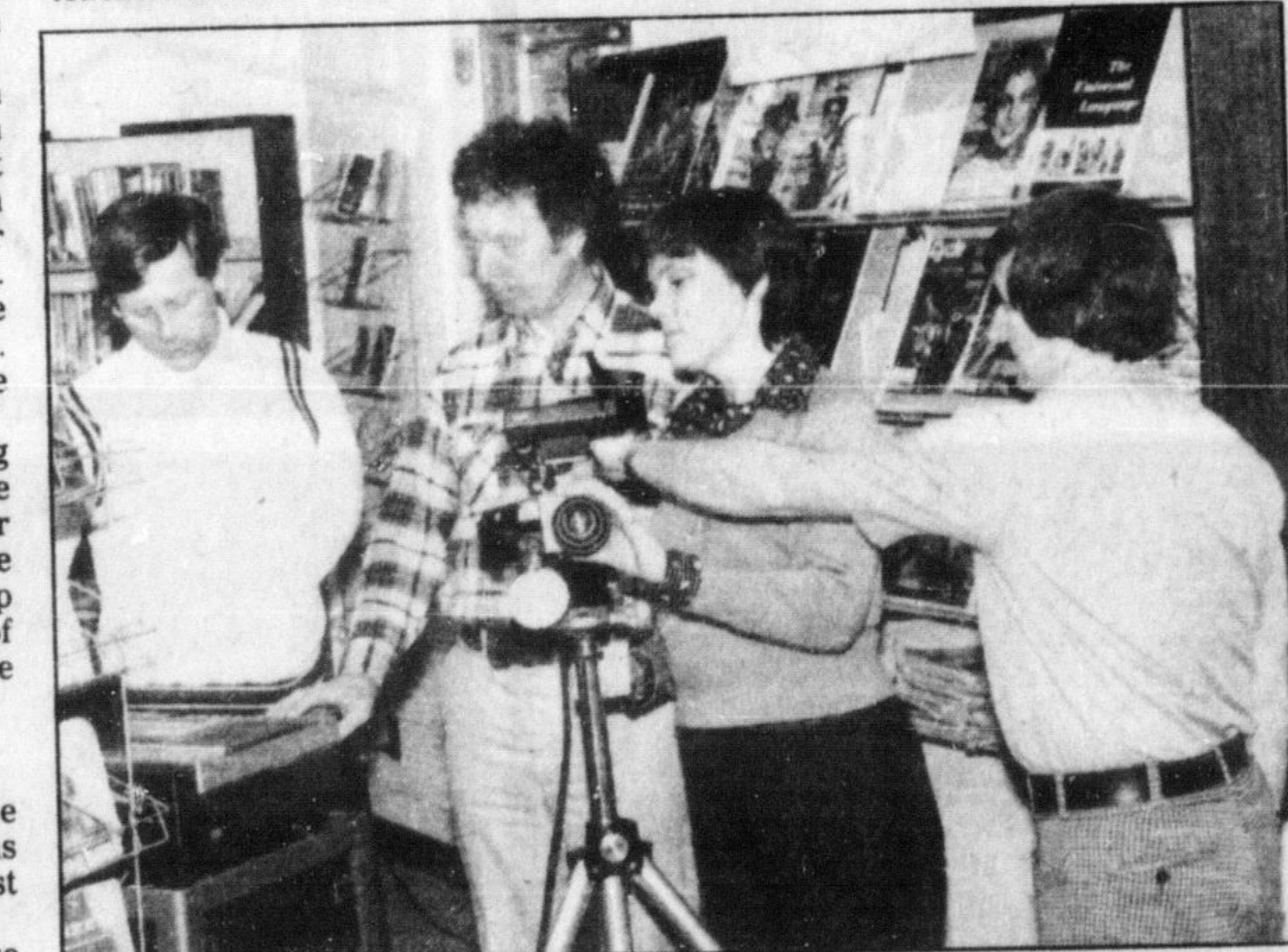
Order of the Eastern Star

Teachers go back to school

Friday, Feb. 6 was a Professional Development Day for elementary school teachers in all of Halton. There were numerous classes at Milton schools for teachers from the surrounding area.



At Sam Sherratt Public School, there were 12 workshops running throughout the day. The workshops ran for half a day each, and in almost all cases, teachers moved from one school to another for their morning to afternoon sessions. The workshops ranged from Visual Arts Painting and Colored Solutions, to Uses and Abuses of Tests and a publisher's display. While a great deal of the workshops consisted of lectures, in some cases there were activities in which the teachers had to participate. At W.I. Dick School there was a TV production course which taught the teachers how to use TV equipment and incorporate subjects such as math and language into television projects for children.

Ask reinstate property right

Oakville Real Estate Board is concerned about the action taken by the Canadian Constitution Committee, in removing the right to own and enjoy property from the proposed constitution. The Board, which covers Oakville, Milton and Acton, has urged its members and the 25,000 Ontario Real Estate Association members to insist to all federal and provincial MPs that the amendment "everybody has the right to life, liberty, security of the person and the enjoyment of property and the right not to be deprived thereof, except in accordance with the principles of natural justice," be reinstated.

President Maurice Park said "it is a basic right for all people in a democratic country, as Canada is, to own property. To remove this basic right is the first step toward a totalitarian state." The basic rights of all Canadian people to own property must never be taken away, he added. The Oakville Board also urged all property owners to join the fight.
