

Second registration coming in two weeks

Many people seem to have missed the Milton Youth Soccer Club registration last weekend. The club registered a total of 408 players Friday evening and Saturday at Milton Mall.

This total was made up of 18 senior ladies, a new group this year, 77 girls and 313 boys. In addition there are some 100 players already registered as part of the winter indoor program.

It is unfortunate many people do not think about the summer sports until hockey is finished. This creates considerable problems for the summer sports administrators in scheduling and setting-up teams.

MYSC will be holding a second registration the weekend of March 13-14, at Milton Mall.

Friday evening registration will be from 6-9 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. After this, late registrations will be charged an additional \$10 fee for each player registered.

It is interesting to see the senior ladies have already signed 18 players. They will be playing in a similar loop to the girls. It looks as though they may have to cater for a second team if there are any more players interested in taking part.

MYSC announced the appointment of three new directors this week. Jim Wanless will be taking over as girls' convener, Jim McKenzie becomes director of scheduling and Ernie Crowe will be acting as peeewee convener.

Last weekend, the Ontario Soccer Association Annual General Meeting took place at the Skyline Hotel in Toronto. Some 300 voting delegates from across Ontario gathered to review the association's 1980 operations, hear plans for the future and elect an executive for 1981.

It was another year of spectacular advance in soccer in this province as registrations increased significantly and results on the field proved we are the leading soccer area in Canada. Several Ontario players also assisted the Canadian national team to advance to the second round of the World Cup and will, undoubtedly be with the team in Honduras in November when they will be attempting to move Canada into the final 24 teams to take part in the final tournament in Spain in 1982.

There were the usual mass of proposed constitutional changes to

be considered but nothing of great significance to local players was put into effect. Probably the only thing is a reduction in senior recreational team registration fees for 1982.

In the elections for the executive there was no change. All the retiring members were re-elected, Bill Hoyle as president, Bob Owen-Turner as treasurer and Tom Wilkinson, Lewis Edwards and Joe Agnew as directors-at-large.

The membership obviously thought the executive had done an excellent job in 1980 and gave them a resounding vote of confidence.

There were other candidates for all the offices, except that of treasurer, which is a very healthy sign.

As well as the AGM there were two seminars held Sunday, one for coaches and the other for administrators. Several MYSC officials attended these seminars and reported they found them interesting and informative.

The OSA is planning another administrative seminar in this area Saturday, March 21. This will cover registration matters in detail and many other topics.

Applications are available for the Blizzard Summer Soccer School. A couple of players from Milton took part in this program last year and found it most enjoyable and educational.

This program is run by Dick Howard, a former professional and international player who is now one of the best qualified coaches in Canada.

It's on to Timmins

For a time, it looked like they might not make it.

But in the end, experience prevailed leading the senior boys' basketball team of Milton District High School to a 57-50 win over Humber College of Bolton Wednesday at Milton. The victory qualified Milton for the provincial championships later this month in Timmins.

Staffed with several starters from last year's provincial finalists, Milton Mustangs rebounded from a lull in the third quarter. Mustangs saw their eight-point half-time lead dwindle to a single point at 42-41.

However, Mustangs regrouped and changed their defensive strategy back to a zone press which worked effectively in the first half. The squad's strategy paid off immediately when it started the Bolton squad, resulting in many steals and fast breaks.

Perry Martin led the Mustang offence with 21 points while court general Jeff Lambe (who played an outstanding game both ways) and Jeff Defreitas netted 10 points. Tom Galloway and

Kevin Houldcroft chipped in with six points.

Mustangs have their work cut out for them in the provincial championships March 19-21. Last year, the squad was led by Paul Van Oorschot, the towering centre who controlled the play whenever he was on the floor.

Although this year's edition of the team contains many players from last year, it's clear to all concerned, the squad will need to hustle and play some of their best games to do well.

Mustangs will enter the tournament as underdogs. In addition the team hasn't played a large number of exhibition games against opponents they will face at Timmins.

Milton advanced to play the Bolton school when Georgetown District High School decided to forego a playoff game against Milton to represent north Halton.

Mustangs dropped the first game of their two-game series by 15 points but won the second game by 12 points. Financial reasons coupled with Mustangs' one-sided victory in the second game prompted Georgetown to withdraw from a playoff game.
