

## Divers sharp in weekend meet

In just their first year of diving, two divers have come up with outstanding performances at the Ontario Winter Diving Championships Sunday at Burlington Centennial Pool.

Sharon Dobson and Jackie Keyworth placed third and fifth respectively in the 11-12 years 'C' category against 18 other girls. Divers came from Thunder Bay, Ottawa, Windsor, Hamilton and Markham Scarborough to compete.

Dobson was third with 81.65 points achieved with three dives: a back layout, a back somersault pike position and a front layout 1½ turn.

Keyworth scored 71.40 points for fifth place doing a back layout, front 1½ somersault and an inward pike.
