to start. Parking attendants began turning away cars before 8 p.m. and only those who had parked on the street or in a ditch half a mile away and walked were gained admittance. The OHA had sent Devorski to keep

the game in control and avoid an ugly scene as happened in the preceding The tension filled the air before the

game. Fans, which were roughly equally divdied between the teams, were strangely quiet. Then as Rockton's Lou Nistico led his

squad out of the dressing room and onto the ice, the tension began to relax.

"I thought if we came out hitting," explained Nistico, "we'd beat them. We just didn't take advantage of our aggressive play in the second period.


"They (Milton) had more players who wanted to win than we did. In this series, the best team won. Anytime a team beats you twice in your own rink, they deserve to win."






