

Milton Then and Now

Dr Clarkson Freeman earned great respect

For more than forty years Dr. Clarkson Freeman played an important role in the town of Milton. His ability as a doctor, his efforts as a citizen, and his pioneer background earned great respect for him in the community.

His grandfather, William Freeman, was a loyalist who supported Britain in the War of the American Revolution, and gave up his home in Elizabeth Town near New York to come to Canada about the year 1800. Dr. Freeman's father, Isaac Freeman, and his uncle, Clarkson Freeman, both served under Sir Isaac Brock in the War of 1812-14. In 1818 his father settled on Lot 1 in the first concession north of the Dundas St. in Trafalgar Township.

It was rugged pioneer existence at first as Isaac chopped down trees by day to clear his land. Log heaps were burned at night as wolves howled around the area. Born Feb. 26, 1827, Clarkson Freeman was the sixth child in the family. After attending the nearby common school for seven years, his father happened on the fact that, among many other things, he had not yet learned how many roads there were in an acre. It was decided at once that he should stop school and learn to become a farmer.

Nevertheless Clarkson Freeman still wanted an education. At his farm work he always had one of his books with him so that he could study in every spare minute. One day he took a rest under a tree beside the corn field and turned at once to his studies. Discovered in the act by his father, it was decided that he should pursue his studies as he would never become a good farmer. Pleased by this the boy promised that he would

earn his own way—a promise he kept.

He had learned more in private study in one year than he had in seven years at the common school. He spent another year in the common school, then for a year he walked to Palermo to attend the classes of Andrew Hall in the Grammar School there. He then became teacher of the common school at the Boyne, and studied as a private pupil of Rev. Charles Reede. While studying for university entrance he decided to become a doctor. Intense studies damaged his vision, but after a successful eye operation he continued. He graduated as a medical doctor in 1853.

He started to practise in Lowville, and apparently lived in Cumminsville, a neighbor community of Kilbride. He married Elizabeth Martha Cobban, the eldest daughter of Milton's first resident medical practitioner, Dr. James Cobban. One of the windows in the chancel of Grace Anglican Church is a memorial to Dr. and Mrs. Freeman.

In 1854 Dr. Freeman became a partner of Dr. Cobban and in October of that year he moved to Milton. Apparently his office and residence during 1854-5 were "adjacent to the English Church" on Main St. In January 1856 it was noted in the Champion that he had moved to his "new brick residence on Foster St." The continuation of Charles St. south of Queen was called Foster St. in those days.

Dr. Freeman's new home was located on two lots which Dr. Cobban had purchased from Hugh Foster in 1854. By April 1857 Dr. Freeman had become Coroner for Halton County. In 1860 as a

result of his illness the Freemans went to Europe for an extended vacation during which the doctor was an interested visitor at many of the best hospitals in England, Scotland, and France. He recovered his good health and resumed his practice here.

Toward the end of the American Civil War Dr. Freeman volunteered for service as a surgeon. During the final spring campaign he was with Grant's army of the Potomac at Petersburg, Richmond, and in subsequent rapid advances.

Toward the end of 1861 Dr. Freeman purchased a part of Lot 11 in the third concession, Trafalgar giving a mortgage for \$2000 as part of the purchase price. All accounts indicate that his medical practice was a good one. This seems to be confirmed by the fact that he cleared off this mortgage within a year. In 1877 he purchased Lot 12—two acres on the south side of Main Street.

Older residents will remember Buck and Morley's butcher shop, Jack Roper's grocery store, the Bell Telephone office, and Stan Fay's plumbing shop which were located there in later years.

Dr. Freeman was a prominent worker for the Conservative Party in Dominion government elections. From 1879 he was the surgeon of the Lorne Rifles. Starting in 1870 he was Mayor of Milton for three years. While in office he worked hard in the town's campaign to bring the services of the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific railways to this town.

Dr. Freeman died suddenly March 2, 1895. All business firms in town closed on the day of his funeral which was delayed to allow his son, Dr. W. F. Freeman, to reach here from Rock Springs, Wyoming. The service was conducted by Rev. P. T. Mignot of Grace Church.

Second Sheridan season starting

The Sheridan International Summer School of Animation will hold its second season at the Trafalgar Road Campus from May 19 until August 21.

The program was devised to accommodate students from around the world who apply to attend the regular three-year classical animation program.

Since preference for admission is given to Ontario students, international students don't normally get the chance to take advantage of Sheridan's facilities, faculty, and well-deserved reputation in this field. But last year 14 stu-

dents completed their first summer of study. To qualify for a regular Sheridan diploma, they must return for another two summers of intensive study.

Students applying to the program must have two years of post-secondary art experience or education, and must be fluent in English.

Tuition is \$400 for Canadian students and \$800 for foreign students. Supplies will cost about another \$500 and there is no additional lab fee.
