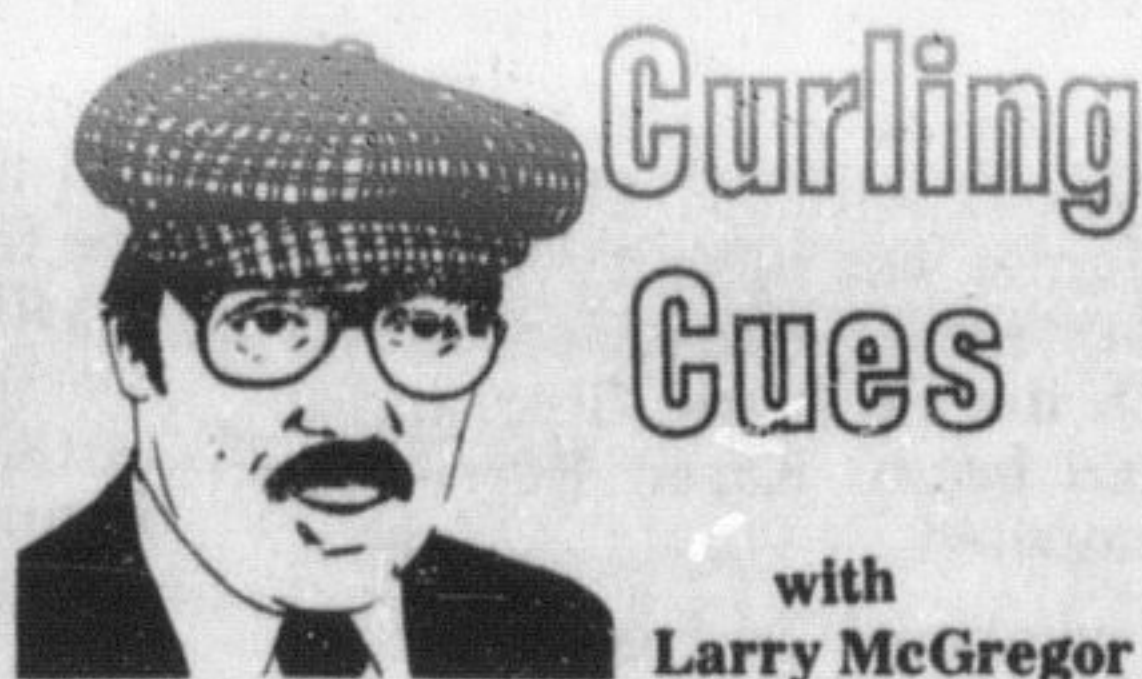


Brooms in the closet 'till next year

Steady Stevie helps Armstrong to win Town & Country event

That's how Nancy Leachman summed up the achievements of the trophy-winning rink in Milton's Town and Country Bonspiel last week.

The Town and Country, a week-long, three-game affair marks the end of the curling season in Milton, and it proved a fitting conclusion for skip Bob Armstrong, who capped a very successful season by capturing this year's event.

Joining Armstrong on the championship rink were the aforementioned Ms. Leachman at vice, 'Steady Stevie' Leachman at second, and Anne Armstrong (not to be confused with Sifton) at lead.

Walzing through their draw undefeated, the Armstrong collection totalled more points than any other rink, thereby ensuring their names go down in history as '81 champs.

Not quite as accustomed to winning as some of the other rink members, Steady Stevie spent most of the post-game celebrations drooling over the trophy, trying to visualize how it would look on his mantelpiece.

Draw A

Draw B

To give credit where it's due, Craig Kerr spared for Jim in his third game, miraculously keeping the perfect record intact and enabling the Livock foursome to wind up fifth overall.

Draw C
Dandy Don Sifton, the pre-spiel favorite in his own mind, came through in mediocre fashion, winning his draw and finishing fourth on the totem pole. Joining Mr. Sifton for the week's activities were his wife Katie at vice, and Don and Sandi Hearn at second and lead.

Draw D
You will no doubt remember a column of a couple of weeks ago where it was mentioned that Barry McKay, fresh from a conquest in Gananoque, was the new force to be reckoned with in mixed curling. Well, the McKay magic is continuing.

Finishing right behind the leaders in third place, Barry's crew of Joyce McKay and Doug and Marg Hopkins won their three games in convincing style. Now the question remains - can anyone stop McKay?

Draw E

Draw F
Undoubtedly the toughest draw in the spiel - the winner of this one had some real shooters to gun down. And it seems fitting that Doug Wingrove, curling in his last spiel as an active member of the Milton Curling Club, went out in style, riding roughshod over the competition, winning his three games, and ending up in second place.
