

Squirt reps accepted into Robbie tourney

MILTON YOUTH Soccer Club held its meeting for rep coaches last week and it seems all teams are getting things sorted out.

There are a few changes of sponsors for the rep teams this year. Misco Data take over as sponsors of the squirt team, the Pop Shoppe name will be carried by the minor atoms and Belvedere Floor Coverings by the major atoms.

Ontario Tree Fruits continue with their support of the minor mosquitos with another new sponsor, Koski Glass, taking over the major mosquitos. Minor Peeewees will play under the Purolator Courier banner—hope they can live up to the Purolator name and get things done fast.

Charlie Cropper's minor bantams are sponsored by Corbetts in Milton who are returning for yet another year.

John Sanderson was "flying high" last week as his squirt team had been accepted for the prestigious Robbie Tournament in Scarborough over the Victoria Day weekend. John and his sidekick, Danny Cameron, have been working hard to get this first-year team into shape and this news is great encouragement for both them and the boys to keep at it.

The Robbie is certainly the best-known tournament in Canada and maybe in the whole of North America. It also has a very high standing in Europe and I understand there will be more than 20 teams coming over from Europe for this year's tournament, although I doubt that there will be any squirts amongst them.

It is very encouraging to see a Milton team accepted for this tournament and this is an indication of the progress which MYSC is making in becoming recognized in the soccer world.

MYSC's annual coaching clinic goes on Sunday, April 26 and Sunday, May 3 at Milton Sports Centre on Laurier Avenue. There are programs at both Level One and Level Two and anyone interested should

Six local youth clubs met in Acton last week to discuss the possibilities of running a combined recreational league at the older age levels.

Such a league would enable all boys to play at their own age level and also get more interesting competition with more teams taking part.

It looks like there will be a peewee league comprised of three teams from Milton and one each from Pineview, Georgetown and Hillsburgh.

In bantam there will probably be a six-team league with two teams each from Milton, Georgetown and Hillsburgh.

The bantam teams will be allowed to include two or three junior age players which will help to get a game for the few boys who have registered for this age group in Milton.

Milton's senior soccer clubs also started to get organized last week as the Inter-County League met at the Italian-Canadian Club.

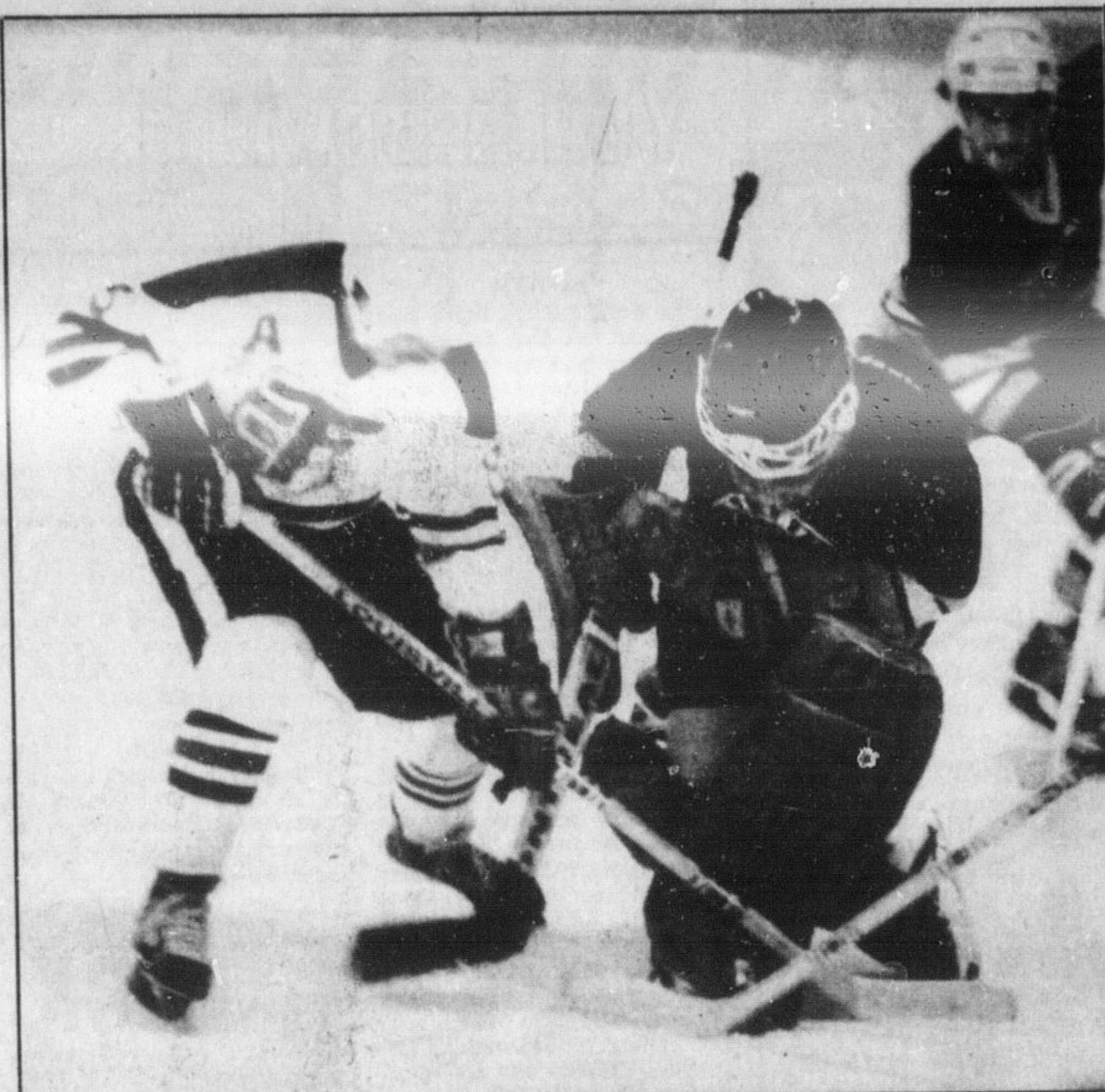
The league will operate in two divisions for 1981 with Acton, Georgetown Eagles, Georgetown Mariners, Georgetown Meteors "A", ICCM, Alpini and Brampton Olympia making up the first division.

The second division will include Georgetown, Ajax, Milton Schwartz-Weiss, Georgetown Varian Vikings, Georgetown Meteors "B" and a team made up of last year's Milton Rangers and Rockwell.

Milton is strongly represented on the league executive which is made up of one representative from each team. Tom Farr, who was with Rockwell last year, was elected president. Hugh McCauley from last year's Rangers organization is the new secretary and Bill Zianthos of Georgetown Meteors is the treasurer.

The Inter-County League will be operating as a recreational league and affiliating with the Peel-Halton Soccer Association which will keep them in good standing with the local referees.

Werner Bauer of Schwartz-Weiss tells me that they will be playing at a new ground behind the Boyne Community Centre this year and that they open their season during the first week in May.

at several levels. Cougars advanced to the final round with a 4-1 series victory over St. Michael's Buzzers.

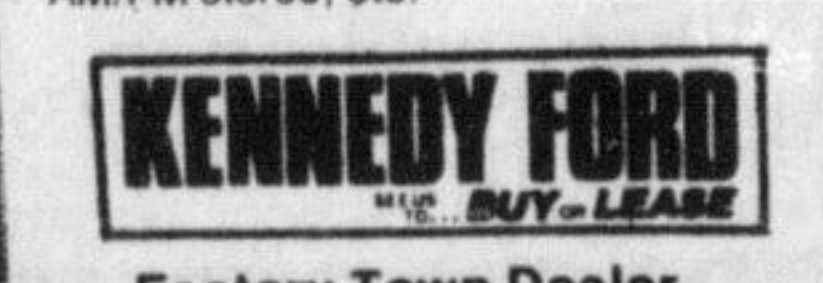
