

Easter at Hillcrest is an 18-hour vigil

On the evening before Easter the early Christians gathered together for a time of prayer and reading in preparation for the coming celebration. Following this tradition, the community of Hillcrest United Church in Hornby undertook a vigil reading of the New Testament.

Commencing Saturday, Arpil 18 at 12 noon and continuing through until 6.32 a.m. Sunday morning, they read all but the last eight chapters of Revelation.

In the weeks prior to Easter many members of the church signed up to read, while others arrived to listen and with nerves enthusiasm came forward to active participate in the readings. 
