World Religion Day will be observed by Canadian Baha'i communities on Sunday, Jan.

Lecally, the day will be sponsored by the Milton Baha'i communit.

Milton and surrounding communities are invited to attend a series of lectures given by authorities on various religions sponsored by the Baha'is of Eramosa. Baha'u'liah, the prophet-founder of the Baha'i faith pointed out that all barriers preventing the unity of humankind are manmade. While men divide, God unites. He stressed that man must abandon his prejudices that divide and learn to see himself as a citizen of the world.

Baha'u'llah indicated that religious, raciai, political, economic and patriotic prejudices are the primary cause of world disunity and war. The Baha'i faith is dedicated to the uniting of mankind everywhere.

Frederick Edwards died Dec. 16, 1981 at Milton District Hospital. He was 70.

The appeal followed allegations against the doctor by a man who took his wife to the host ital suffering from abdominal pains, only to be told the doctor would not see her until the


The patient was then taken to Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital where she was treated for torn ovaries.


Evidence presented at the hearing showed this was the fourth such allegation against Dr. Tam in the last three years.
